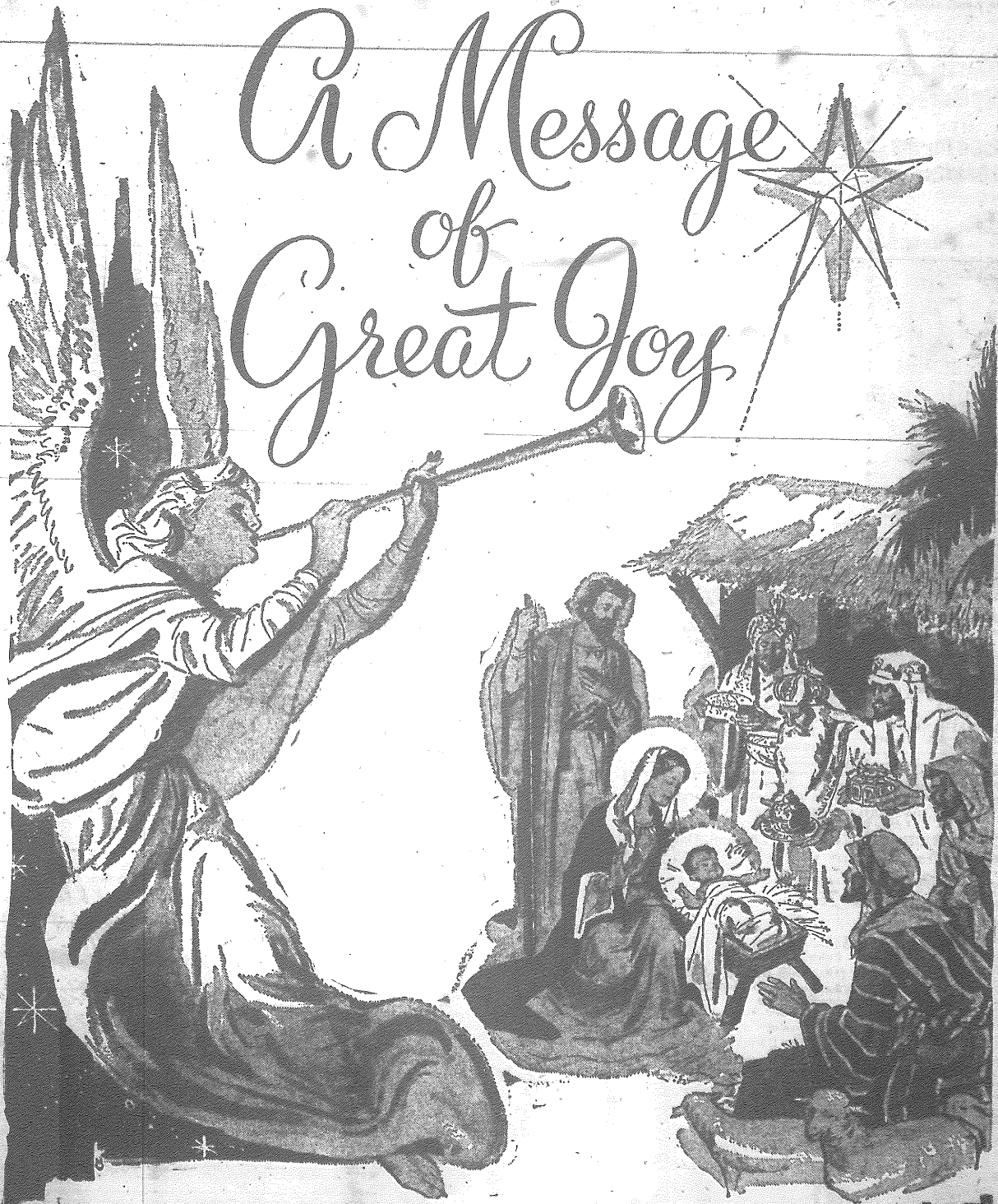

The District Board of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind is under the chairmanship of Mr. E. S. Linkletter. Vice-chairman is Mrs. H. Bird; Secretary - Mrs. R. M. Duke and treasurer, Mrs. A. Sundmark.

A booth of Blindcraft goods at the Agricultural Fair in August aroused much interest and a good number of sales were made. Through the kindness of Mr. B. Brennan, a Board member, Blindcraft articles may be obtained at his jewellery store on Main St. S.

The Fall campaign for funds was under the chairmanship of Mr. G. Landry, and the canvass itself was in charge of Mrs. S. Burris and her committee of Mrs. J. McLeod, Mrs. H. Bird and Mrs. H. Wolfe. The success of this drive for funds is due to the many canvassers who worked so hard and so willingly, and to the general public for their generous support.

Talking books are being gradually transferred to tapes instead of records. Some of the advantages of tapes are: easier handling by blind persons, easier shipping, shipping at less cost.

The Eye Bank is a comparatively new venture. Anyone wishing to do so may sign a card willing their eyes after death so that a blind person may have sight. Anyone wishing to do this, please get in touch with any member of the local Board.

The aim of the C.N.I.B. continues to be prevention of blindness, and service to persons already blind.

(d) to help develop better, happier and more useful citizens.

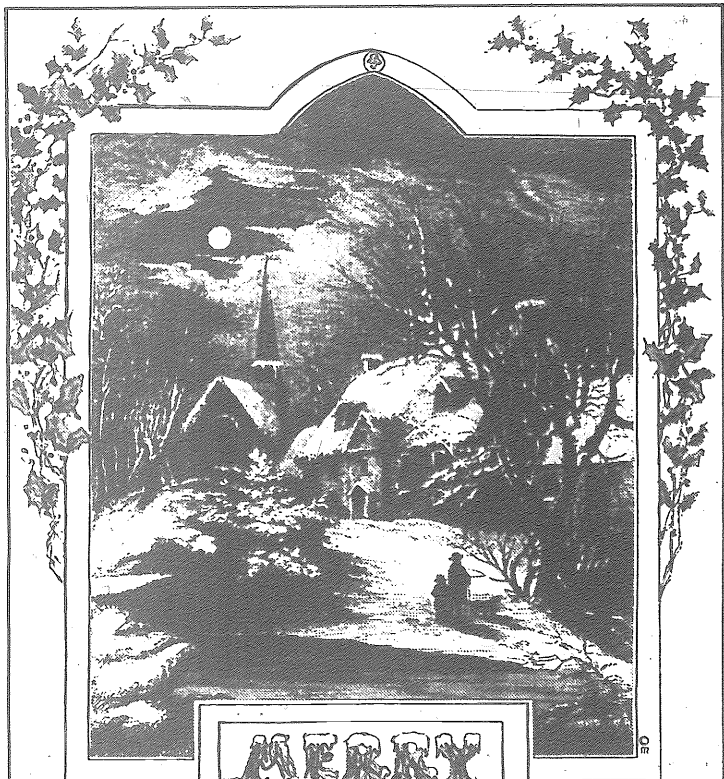
With these objectives in mind, the Rideout Branch arranges its meetings for the year. These meetings are held in the homes of the members, on the fourth Tuesday of every month.

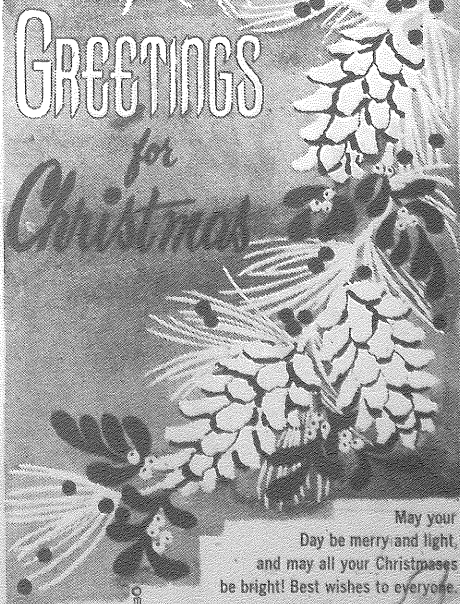
Holy Tree Blooms Every Christmas

Every Christmas, the phenomenon of the blossoming Holy Thorn Tree occurs in England and Washington, D.C.

Faithfully on December 25th, a tree called the Holy Thorn or Glastonbury Thorn blooms in the ancient English town of Glastonbury. Sometime during the same month, an off-shoot of the same tree bursts into bloom in Washington's Cathedral of the Close.

According to legend, two days before Christmas 63 years after the birth of Christ, St. Joseph of Arimathea neared Glastonbury, carrying with him the Holy Grail used at the Last Supper.

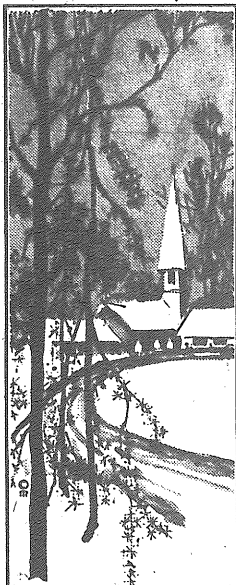

The great horse is named Slepner, and the Dutch children fill their wooden shoes with hay for him. This gives him energy to get St. Nick to every house.

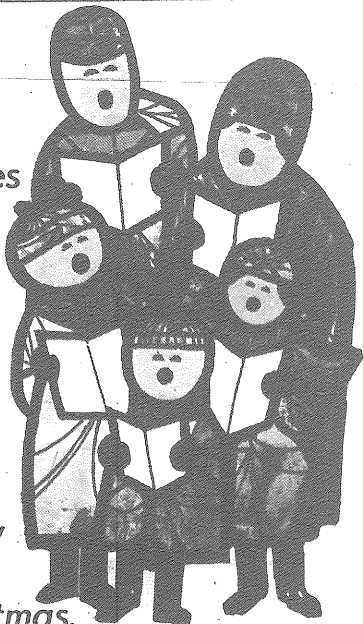

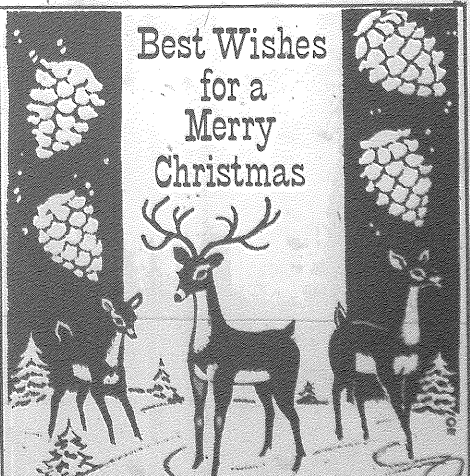

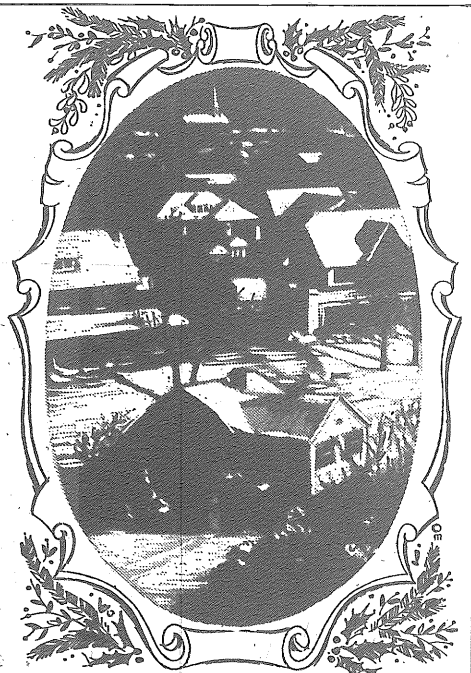

THE MIRACLE OF CHRIST'S COMING

We at Bethesda look back gratefully upon the year that has passed since we first occupied our new church on December 22nd, 1963. We shall not soon forget that, although there was much about the church that was still incomplete, perhaps because there was much still incomplete, there was a glowing warmth in our celebration of the Nativity of our Lord last year.

Some might claim that this warmth was felt because so many had worked so long and so ardently to prepare a place for His coming. They had done more than anyone had ever imagined their best could be. Here was a reality which but twelve months before had seemed no more than a dream troubled with nightmarish discouragements.

But running more deeply, although probably not keenly defined in the minds of those who worshipped here, was the sense of kinship with Bethlehem itself. Certainly a stable does not fit man's concept of the proper place for the world to receive God. Bethlehem was not ready for Him either.

And all of this suggests and points to the deep and abiding mystery that mankind was not ready to receive Him. The flesh of humanity, even the flesh of Israel, though disciplined for generations in the vocation of vicarious suffering, was not prepared

to receive him. Even His closest disciples would leave Him to suffer alone and forsaken. Yet the word was made flesh and dwelt among us. And we saw His glory - glory as of the only begotten of the Father - full of grace and truth.

The miracle of His coming does not await, nor depend, upon our readiness. His coming made a stable more splendid and enduring than any king's palace; His coming and His abiding make the Church for His people, no matter how inadequate and makeshift our preparations may have been: His coming is to sinners, wretchedly unprepared and unworthy, sick and helpless, and bringing forgiveness, He makes them whole; He makes them Saints.

"But when the fullness of time came, God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under the law, that He might redeem those who were under the Law, that we might receive the adoption of sons, and because you are sons, God has sent the Spirit of His Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba, Father."

We would not have planned it this way, but thanks be to God that the fullness of time for our redemption did not depend upon our preparedness but upon God's faithfulness.

Children's Aid Society Has Year of Service to District

The year 1964 has been a busy and interesting one at the Children's Aid offices in Kenora and Dryden. New Social Workers joining the staff during the year were Mr. Peter Loutit, Dryden, Mr. Jack Copeland and Miss Denise Tumpance in Kenora. In addition, the Society now has a full time bookkeeper in Kenora and a full time secretary in Dryden.

At the beginning of 1964 the society had a total of 196 children in care (approximately 80 per cent of children are of Indian heritage), seven of these were on adoption probation. For the first eleven months of 1964, (statistics for the complete 12 months are not as yet available), the Society admitted 154 children, 112 of these were eventually returned to their own parents. During this time 26 children were discharged from care. Six became old enough to go out on their own, some were placed in institutions and for other reasons they became independent of the society's care.

During this eleven month period, twenty-eight adoptions were completed and there are currently 65 children on adoption probation. Twenty-five Indian children - many of them who are five to eight years of age and who were unadopted in the immediate area, are now being adopted by excellent Indian families at the Pikanigilum and Sand Lake reserves. The Society currently has children on adoption at Port Arthur, Beardmore, Manitouwadge, Toronto, Hamilton, Newmarket, Woodstock and in Indiana, U.S.A. Reciprocally, they have several children on adoption in our area who are from Winnipeg, Fort Frances, Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa and other locations.

During the first eleven months of the year the Society was asked to be involved in 42 cases of unmarried parents, and 112 family situa-

tions where evidence of neglect was apparent.

At the end of November the Receiving Home (Kin Haven) was temporarily closed because of the resignation of the houseparents. The future of Kin Haven will be left in abeyance until the new Board of Directors takes office late in February.

A new clothing system was started in 1964 for the foster parents and children. Prior to the change, all clothing was purchased by voucher and all merchants in the area handling clothing are familiar with these. Now the foster parents receive a monthly allowance to purchase clothing for the children in the same manner as anyone else. The new method is proving to be most satisfactory. Other improvements, too numerous to itemize, have been made to better the program.

The Children's Aid Society anticipates 1965 to be another year filled with problems, unexpected events and tragedy, but they expect with this there will be much joy and happiness. With the continued support of all citizens in our community they hope to play an important part toward improving conditions for families and especially to help the young neglected children find fulfillment in their lives.

Kenora Public School Board Reports For Year

Some of the educational services which the Board has focused its attention upon are the establishment of a senior public school in September, 1965; introduction of an oral French programme on an experimental basis, effective January, 1965; the purchase of all instructional supplies for pupils which will be partially effective January, 1965 and in full operation by September, 1965; the installation of a smoke detector at Central School; the centralization of administration under a Supervising Principal - Business Administrator; the implementation of a speech survey; and voluntary student accident insurance.

The estimated budget for 1964 was \$660,974, of which approximately 35% was met by provincial grant. The breakdown is as follows:

- Teachers Salaries - 61.5%
- Debt - 11.3%
- Operation of Schools - 9.5%
- Maintenance Dept. - 6.0%
- Administration - 3.9%
- Instructional Supplies - 3.5%
- Capital from Current funds - 2.5%
- Contingency - 1.2%
- Auxiliary Service - .6%

GOOD RULES FOR A FIRE-SAFE CHRISTMAS



PREVENT FIRES FROM STARTING

- Nine out of ten of all home fires could be prevented if you.
1. Kept matches away from tiny hands and encouraged adults to smoke safely (and never in bed);
 2. Stopped misusing electricity by improper fusing, overloaded circuits and defective wiring and appliances;
 3. Had your heating equipment and chimney annually cleaned, inspected and defects repaired;
 4. Used fire-retardant roofing;
 5. Never allowed gasoline, benzine, naphtha or similar volatile flammable liquids in the home for any purpose (Never use such flammable liquids for dry cleaning or to kindle a fire)
 6. Kept rubbish and unnecessary combustibles regularly removed from your home.

PREVENT FIRES FROM SPREADING

Fire can spread with astonishing speed from floor to floor, through hollow partitions and up stairways (see sketch at left). Existing buildings can be made safer by:

- Using fire resistive materials wherever possible;
- Cutting off basement from first floor by heavy door;
- Plastering basement ceiling with cement or gypsum plaster on metal lath*;
- "Firestopping" hollow partitions at floor levels (especially basement)
- Installing automatic sprinklers in the cellar.

If the garage is part of the house it should be separated by masonry walls or at least by metal lath and cement or gypsum plaster*. Any door in these walls should be a fire door, but access to the garage should be preferably from outside only;

Have an approved fire extinguisher of the right type available. Maintain it in operative condition. Understand how to operate it.

*Or other plaster and plaster base of approved type



WHAT TO DO IF TRAPPED IN YOUR HOME



If you think there is a fire, don't fling doors open, but feel doors for heat.



If door is hot—block with furniture or mattress (preferably wet) to keep out smoke and gases.



If trapped by fire, remember that the air is usually better near the floor.



Don't jump from upper-story windows except as a last resort. Wait for firemen.

HOW YOU CAN FIGHT A SMALL FIRE SAFELY

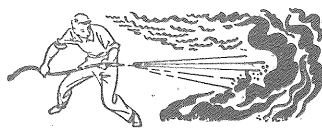


After calling fire department, size up fire, aim proper type extinguisher directly at burning object (not the smoke or flame). Stand near a door so a burst of flame cannot trap you; if the fire is in a small room fight the fire from outside. In electrical fires,

turn off current if you can, but by using the proper type of extinguisher you will keep from suffering electrical shock. Food or grease burning

on the stove can best be put out by putting a metal cover on the burning pan or kettle.

Buy only approved extinguishers. You should have at least one dependable fire ex-



tinguisher. But always seek the advice of your fire chief before buying any fire extinguisher. These devices are not uniform in effectiveness and some are designed for special conditions and classes of fires. Pails of water and garden hose are useful. However, to use hose there must be an inside faucet to which it can be readily attached.



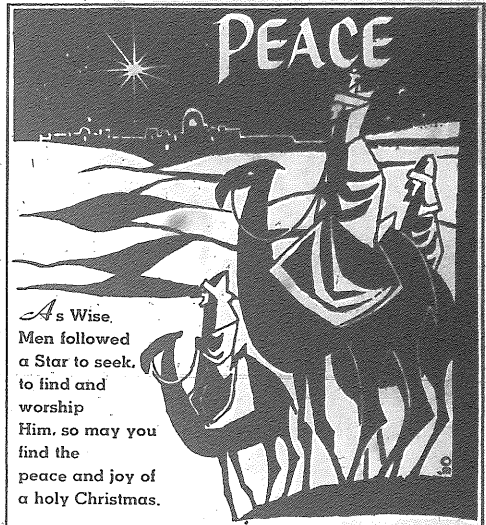

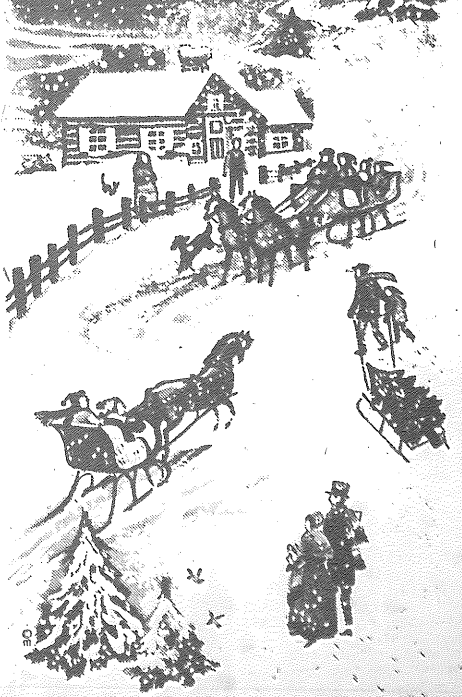

10,000 People View Showings Of Film Council

The Kenora Film Council is a member of the Northwestern Ontario Film Federation. This Federation serves ten Film Councils and committees from Kenora to Manitowadge. Fourteen blocks of ten films each circulate monthly and reports indicate enthusiastic and vigorous promotion of educational film use throughout the area.

Ten of the newest and best films are selected each year for the "Film of the Month" program. One of these films is assigned to each area for a month and receives special promotion, thus bringing to the attention of film users good films that might otherwise be unnoticed.

Appreciated immensely is the time and effort that Will Dougall, National Film Board representative, devotes to keeping the Federation vigorous and active.

The Kenora Film Council played host to the Northwestern Ontario Film Federation annual meeting which netted a wide attendance in Kenora on May 2nd. It included a film evaluation workshop conducted by Community Programmes representative R. Lavack, and a dinner speech by Mr. Bruce Stewart, audio-visual co-ordinator of the Kenora Public School Board, who described the rather startling array of equipment and aids offered in the schools of this community.

The Kenora Film Council showed 408 films to nearly 10,000 people during 1964, making a total of 251 showings. Films are shown weekly at Pinecrest Home for the Aged. 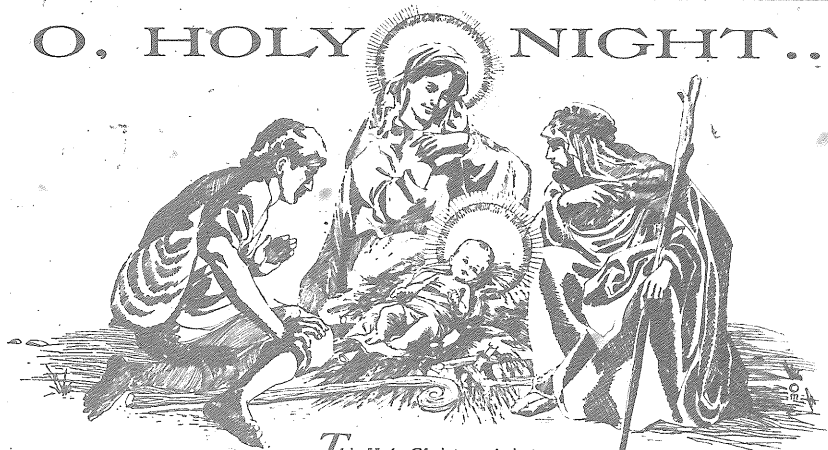

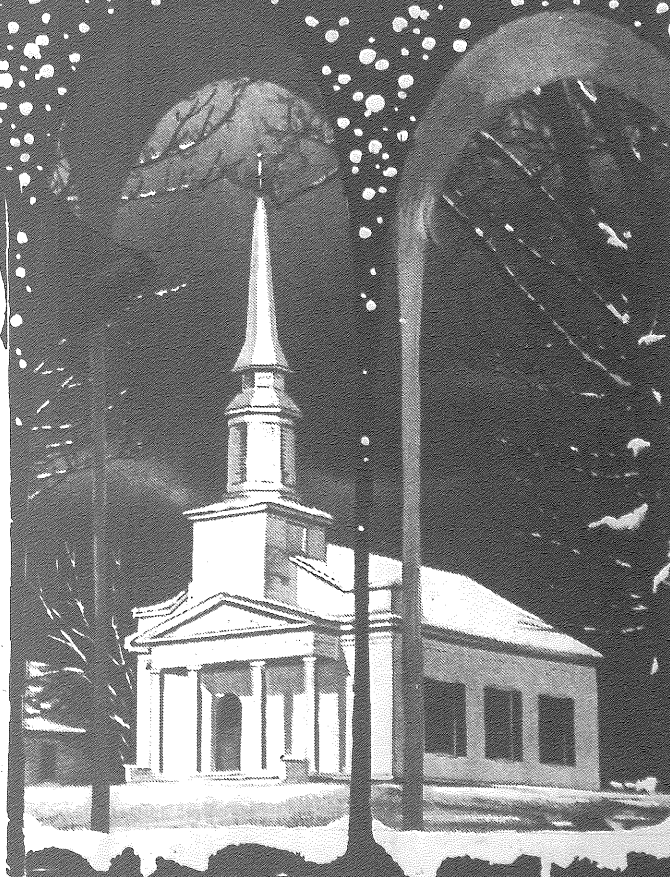

Here's What They Do To Drinking Drivers:

TORONTO — Police throughout the world will, as usual, be somewhat less than Christian (i.e. Charitable and Forgiving) towards drinking drivers this Christmas!

With some few exceptions, they will clobber the drinking driver with season's greetings, and best wishes made of fines, licence suspensions, and jail terms.

Mostly, of course, because they happen to have our own safety at heart!

Police attitudes over Christmas and New Year's, in various countries, were checked by the public service division of The British Motor Corporation of Canada Limited.

These were its findings: Red China, oddly enough, where

Mao, not Santa, wears the fur-trimmed red union suit, is the only country where there positively won't be one impaired or drunk driving charge laid!

Even if Red China believed in Christmas, which it doesn't, or celebrated New Year's at the same time we do, which it also doesn't, this would hold true.

Since Red China assumes that all drivers are abstemious, it has no such charges as impaired or drunk driving!

At the other extreme in San Salvador, which has one simple, sobering solution to the problem of the drunken driver — whether it's Christmas, New Year's, or any other time of the year:

Execution by a firing squad!

The survey revealed that the drinking driver at Christmas and New Year's is primarily a U.K., Scandinavian, and North American problem. In most other countries, the festive season is primarily a religious holiday — a time for comparatively quiet observance among family and friends. Any whoop-up is done at New Year's and the police in those countries treat drinking drivers just as they would at any other time of the year.

Which means they throw the book at them!

The same applies in the U.K., Norway, Sweden, Denmark, the U.S., and Canada, where Christmas — and especially New Year's — is often apt to be more rollicking than religious.

In only one city — Calgary, Alberta — did the survey reveal any attempt on the part of police to make special allowances for the New Year's drinking driver.

A special "Courtesy Squad" in Calgary, mobilized on lightweight motor-scooters, answers calls from partygoers, bundles the scooter into their car-trunk, and chauffeurs them home.

In some other cities throughout Canada and the U.S., service and other public-spirited clubs offer chauffeurs as a New Year's public service — and in still others, enterprising individuals and companies offer "safe-home" service, at a price! In Vancouver, a scooter-driver allows party-hopping motorists three calls for \$10, and in Toronto, a towing firm clumps an Austin Mini to your bumper and drives you safely home for \$1.75 plus 25 cents for each mile after the first three!

Whatever the special arrangements, or lack of them, in your town this festive season, BMC offers this scientific "rule-of-arm" for elbow-bending drivers:

Based on alcohol content in the blood, and providing you have eaten and rested recently, it suggests that a man or woman of 100 pounds is impaired after having consumed four normal-sized drinks, four bottles of beer, or four glasses of wine in any one hour.

If you weigh 120 pounds: five drinks; 140 pounds: roughly the same; 150 pounds: six drinks; 160 pounds: roughly the same; 170 pounds: roughly the same; 180 pounds: seven drinks; 200 pounds and over: eight drinks.

If these drinks were not taken within one hour, simply deduct one drink from the total number of drinks for each hour that elapsed before the first and last drink.

And remember: This consumption-scale means that you are impaired, by law — and incapable of the proper control of your car!

According to Dr. Morton Shulman, Coroner for Metropolitan Toronto, 1 in every 2 driving fatalities — during the Christmas season and throughout the entire year — is the result of the most lethal drink known to motoring man:

The gasoline and alcohol cocktail!

Citizens should check with their respective churches for times of services.

you. They saw what was in their hearts to see. That is what we always see. In any given situation, we see what we bring to the seeing, what we are prepared in heart and experience to comprehend. Our eyesight depends mostly on our insight. Many things we miss in this world, do not see, not because they are not there but because we do bring them the eyes, the insight to comprehend. The obscurity is not in the thing we see but in the unprepared eyes of

the seer.
 So we come again to Bethlehem. Here in the first chapter of St. John's Gospel is a man telling us what he saw. There are no words ever penned by mortal man which contain profounder depth than these opening verses of John's Gospel. He is trying withal his soul to interpret the meaning of this strange event, the mystery of Christ's coming which we call "The Incarnation". He is having quite a struggle with it, as all men who wrestle with words who try to make words say what words can not say and express reality which the instrument of language can not reach.

"In the beginning . . ." that is how he starts, and carries our minds back into the infinite distances, back before there was anything at all. In timeless eternity there was this word, and this word was life; the deathless, creative Life of God. And now this Life of God has become light in the world. "The word has been made flesh. We have seen it. It is a light shining in our darkness, and the darkness can not grasp it or comprehend it. "That is what he saw in Bethlehem, and all the writers of the New Testament with him. "We saw His glory!"

I want you to look at these three great words he used - Life, Light, and Glory. "We beheld His glory." Not everyone who went to Bethlehem saw that. Not everybody who keeps Christmas see it now. Thousands of people missed Him when He was here, did not see or understand Him. Millions of people miss Him now. He is still a light shining in our darkness, and the darkness can not grasp or comprehend. Look at these powerful words - Life, Light and Glory. They are not just poetry. They are man's history from the beginning, the steps of his long struggle in the darkness from Life to Light to Glory. For these are the three levels on which men live - the level of sensation, the higher level of perception, and the highest level of comprehension.

Millions of people among us this year will keep Christmas, join in its festivities but will be no more interested in Christ, in what He really is than if they were beings without a soul and nothing more. "His light is shining in the darkness, and the darkness can not see."

Our age has witnessed the triumph of the mind. We have seen the brawn man decline and the brain man come to power. We exalt the intellect, have almost worshipped it, set it up on the highest throne and some claim it is all the light we need. But some day we shall see that it was idolatry to make the intellect supreme because it has decided limitations. There is a whole range of truth beyond its seeing, great realities which it can not grasp or comprehend. What can the mind tell us about the things that matter most, the ultimate realities? What does it even know about music or Christmas music? It can put the sound together, analyze the mechanics but music moves in a higher realm of spirit, calls to something in us deeper than mind and reason.

Some people are disturbed when some scientists can not believe in God or accept Christ. In fact that should disturb us! The scientist is a brain, an intellect. And it takes more than intellect to comprehend the Infinite, or anything. Ask a scientist what he sees in a diamond and he will tell you, it is crystallized carbon, and it is. But ask a young woman who has received one from the man she loves and you can bet on it, she sees more in it than crystallized carbon. Ask a scientist what a Christmas tree is, and he will analyze it exactly. But a poet saw something in a tree that mere intellect would never imagine:

I think that I shall never see
 a poem-as lovely as a Christmas tree,
 a tree that looks at God all day
 and lifts its leafy arms to pray.

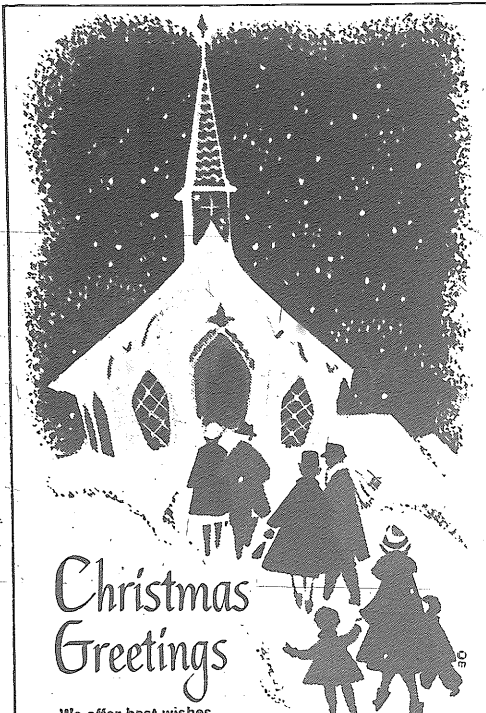

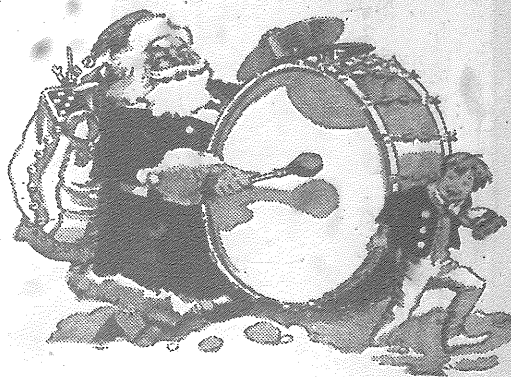

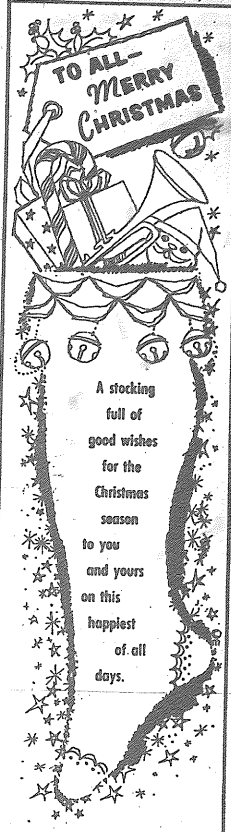
Mr. C. Milliard brought the members up to date on the building program at the last meeting with the following:—

Providing that the necessary funds can be raised it is hoped that the building program will get started in the spring of 1965. The planned building will be of concrete block with an overall size of 30 ft. x 60 ft. A covered entranceway on to 1st St. South, an entrance to the west and also to the north. It will contain 2 dressing rooms, 2 bath rooms, a caretaker's storage room, a kitchen, a main hall and a smaller hall for meetings, etc. with a folding wall to separate it from the main hall.

The building is planned in two stages. Stage one will consist of the northerly half of the project, housing two 12' x 12' dressing rooms; two 4' x 8' washrooms, a 5' x 12' caretaker's storage; 20' x 13' main hall; 15' x 11' canteen (which will be converted into a kitchen in stage 2.) If it should be necessary in the future to enlarge the facilities, stage 2 can be commenced. This will be a 32' x 30' addition on the south side enlarging the main hall, converting the canteen to a kitchen and enclosing the small hall with a folding wall. The entire west wall of the proposed building will be glassed in to enable the patrons to watch winter sports.

It is hoped that this will provide an insight into the work as planned by the building committee to date and that in the near future when people are canvassed it is the hope that the residents of the area will get strongly behind this project so that the youngsters of today and tomorrow will have suitable housing for planned and supervised recreation.

St. James Church Christmas Message

As a young boy I remember vividly another boy who was a grade ahead of me at school, and the day when he introduced me to the world

of "long division" in the kitchen of our home. It was a revelation of something I had not known and it was a joy when I finally understood or found the key.

At Christmas, there is a parallel, until we find the key we are blinded by the symbols with which man tries to express the truth of the Incarnation, the Birth of Christ.

The symbols are not at fault it is just that often we cannot see beyond them. As young people we associate Christmas with holidays; hockey; skating; snow crunching under foot; coloured lights; groups of people singing carols; a Salvation Army Kettle; a Creche on the Church grounds; Christmas trees and the warmth of the family circle.

Then the truth comes to us, unless once again we are blinded by the beautiful girl or the handsome fellow sitting in the pew in front of us at our Christmas Eve Communion, or if we have moved on in life we may be exhausted by all the preparations for Christmas day. The truth that the Church in its wisdom has preserved through the centuries, the evangel or Gospel or God news to be proclaimed in a special way at Christmas. For the Epistle and Gospel for Christmas are not the stories of His birth from St. Matthew or St. Luke, but rather from St. John and the Letter to the Hebrews. God is He Who speaks:

"God, who gave to our forefathers many different glimpses of the truth in the words of the prophets, has now, at the end of the present age, given us the truth in the Son. Through the Son, God made the whole universe, and to the Son he has ordained that all creation shall ultimately belong. This Son, radiance of the glory of God, flawless expression of the nature of God, himself the upholding principle of all that is, effected in person the reconciliation between God and man and then took his seat at the right hand of the majesty on high." (Hebrews 1: 1-3; J.B. Phillips)

We must receive His Son:
"As many as received him, to them gave he power (or authority) to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his Name: which were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God." (St John 1: 12-13)

Judo is a "way" of life, designed on a scientific basis and having as it's aim the development of the pupil into a perfect human type physically, mentally and spiritually. Mind, body and soul will in this sport be equally trained to give the best results. In Judo contests all dangerous blows, holds and shocks are forbidden, so that the risk of injury is reduced to a minimum. The first can give real protection when required and is an ideal sport for all men worthy of the name.

Many ignorantly criticize judo, we must, however ignore their criticism of our sport until they have experienced its effects on themselves and know what they are criticizing.

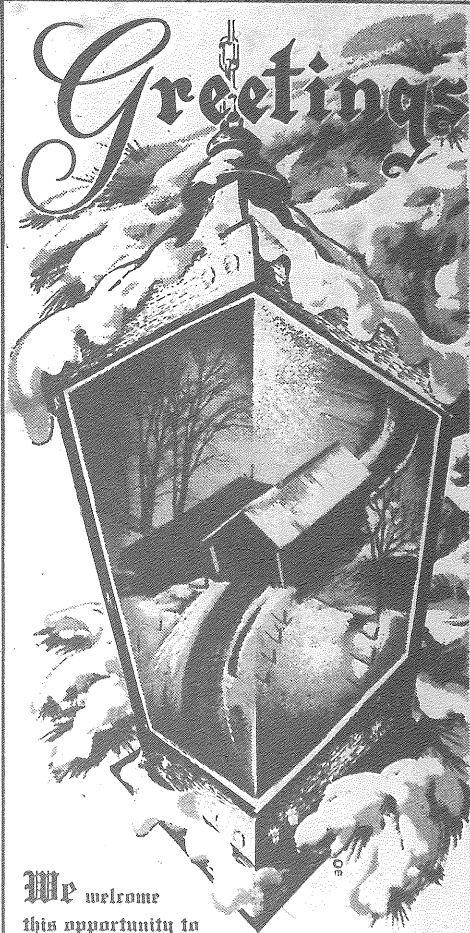

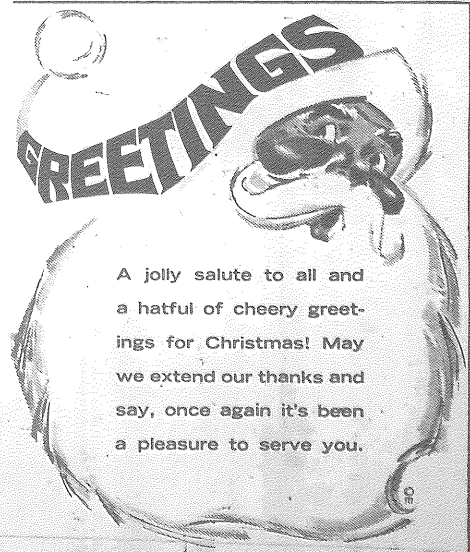

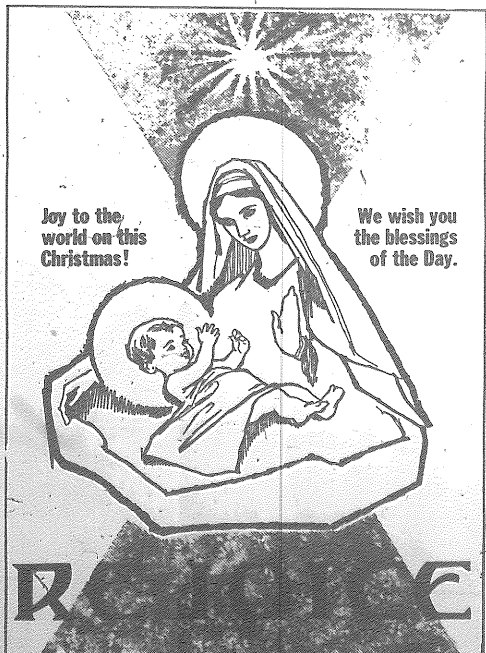

In the future it is hoped that the boys will have many other interesting guests to talk to them.

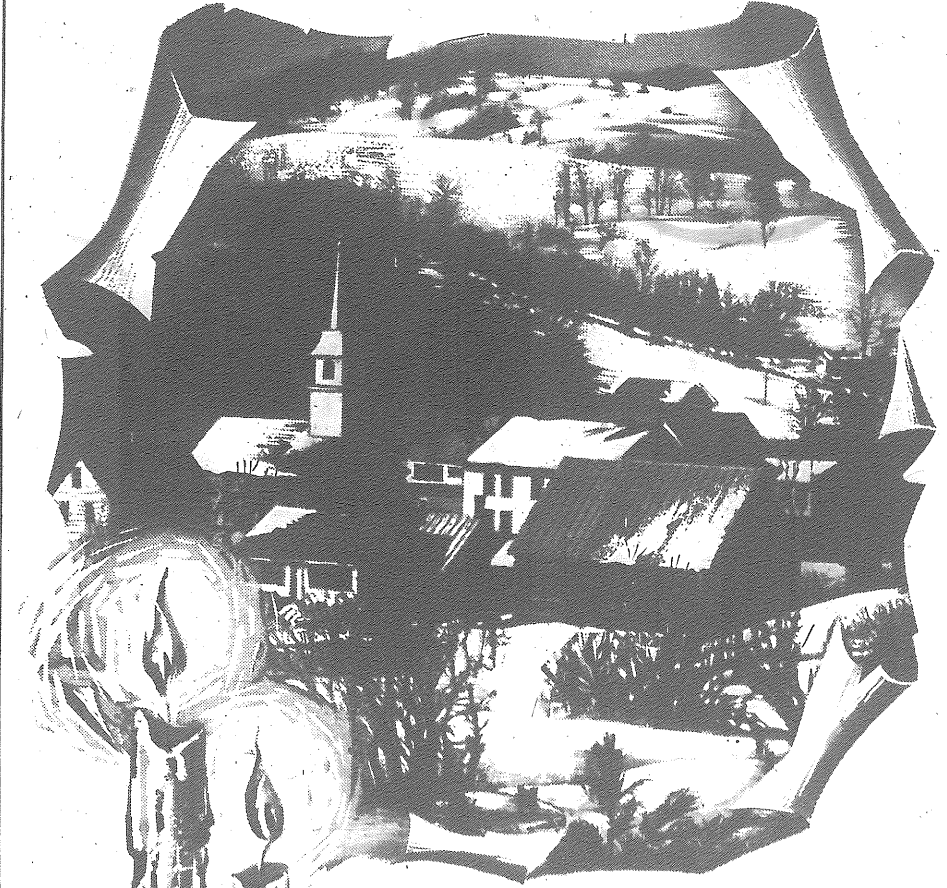

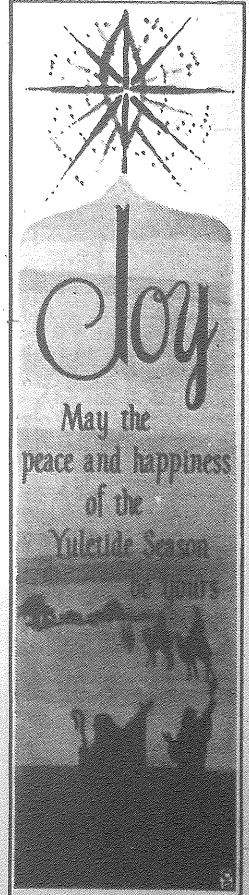

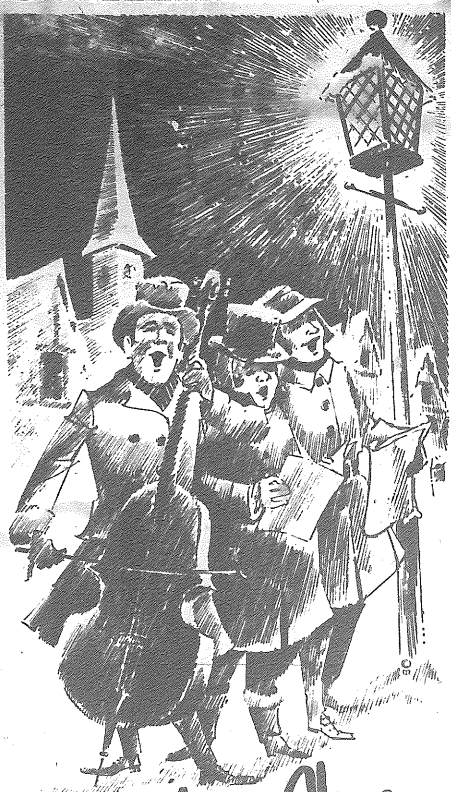

The club holds its master point nights on the second Wednesday of

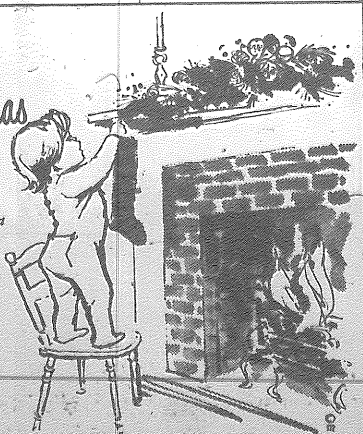

A number of club members travelled to Winnipeg in October to attend a Sectional Tournament there. All representatives from the club were able to return with some master points to show for their efforts.

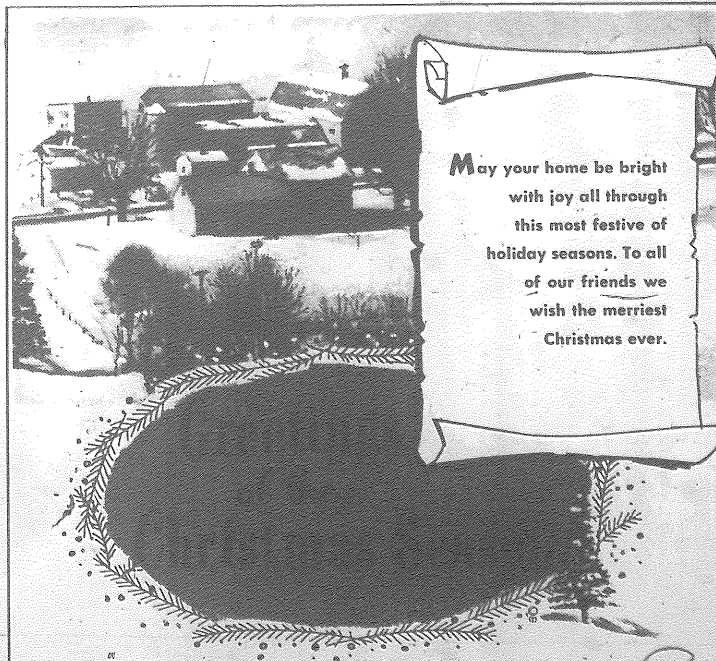

Indian-White Committee Sees Objective Reached

From its formation in January, 1964 the Kenora Indian and White Citizens Committee had as an early objective the promotion, in co-operation with Indian-Eskimo Association of Canada, a northwestern regional workshop. The purpose of the conference was to study Indian problems and their possible solutions.

With much hard work and planning and with visits and assistance from distinguished persons in the field of Indian work the conference was convened in Kenora on June 11 with 100 delegates of white and Indian origin from the area reserves and from distant points in the province and from Winnipeg present.

The conference was the kick-off for nine similar regional conferences which will be held over a period of three years. The prime goal of these meetings was to hear from the Indians and Metis people of the area what they considered their most serious problems and to gain their ideas of how to overcome them. The results of their deliberations were placed before resources people and from this pooling of discussions resolutions were drawn up and sent to appropriate departments of governments and organizations.

The need for assistance in economic, social and education planning for reserves and communities of the region was one of the strongest positions taken by the conference. At least partly as a result of this stand a community planning officer, Paul Smith, has been assigned to two of the nearby reserves to "help the Indians help themselves."

Members of the Kenora committee were invited to take part in the Indian-Eskimo Association annual meeting which was held at London, Ontario, in November. Those who attended were Mr. and Mrs. Fred Greene, Lawrence Redsky, Harry Shankowsky and Jack Doner.

The committee plans to have a series of interesting speakers in the months to come. The group is co-chaired by Harry Shankowsky and Fred Greene, with Jim Davidson as treasurer and Mrs. Pat Ford, secretary.

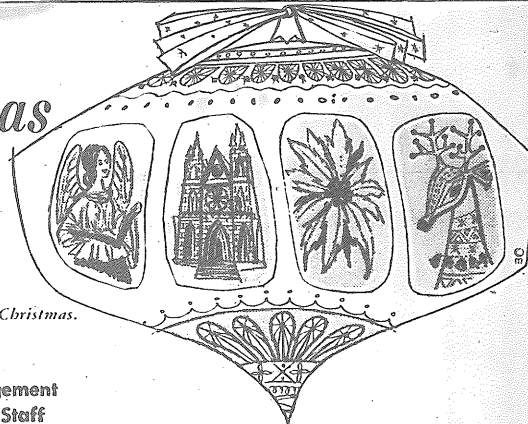

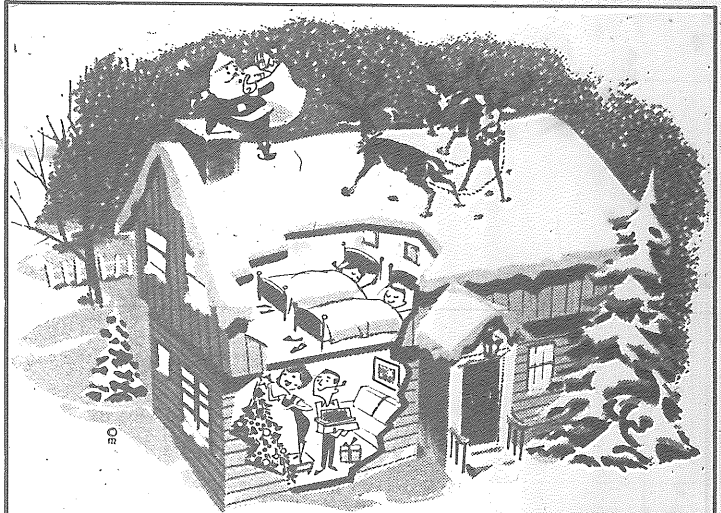

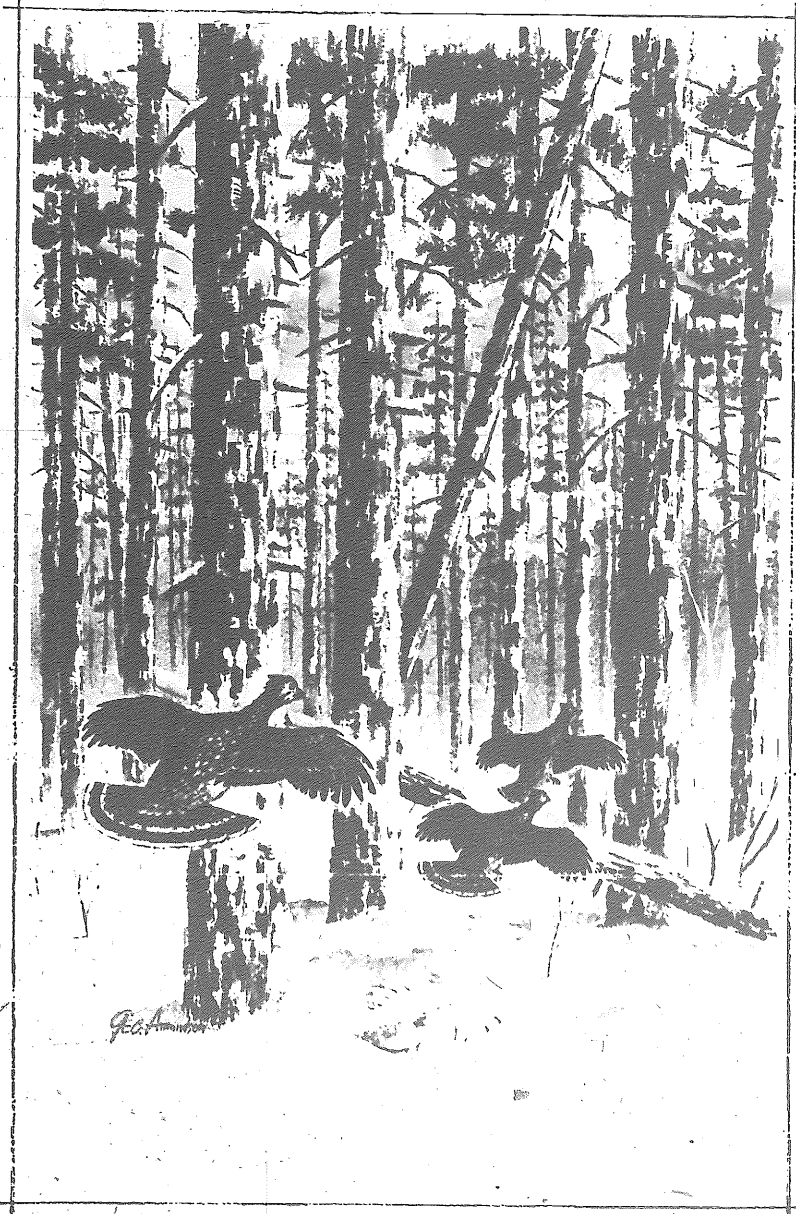

High School Board Deals With Many Problems

The year 1964 proved to be a busy one for Chairman, Mrs. M. E. Favre and members of the Lake of the Woods High School District Board, D. L. Swanger, R. D. Mosher, V. J. Freneau, J. Wiebe, K. D. Fisher and M. Peterson.

While an addition to Beaver Brae Secondary School was essential for September 1965, the municipalities felt they could not afford the increased burden on the tax dollar of this addition even though the Federal-Provincial Governments were providing 75% of the cost of building and equipment. The increased operating costs were what concerned the municipalities. The Board and the municipalities united to press the senior levels of government to consider more financial assistance for the cost of education. A joint municipal-board brief was presented to the Ontario Government in August and the Board presented a brief to the Cabinet of the Province of Ontario at the Lakehead in October. The delay in the addition will certainly have an adverse effect on secondary education in Kenora during the 1965-66 school year but it is hoped the present problems of financing can be overcome and adequate facilities provided by September, 1966.

Renovations to Lakewood Secondary School are also necessary. Architects Smith Carter Searle were engaged in June to provide estimates of the renovations. It is hoped this work will be completed in 1965.

The Board's operating budget for 1964 totalled \$794,036.00, a considerable increase over 1963. This increase was due mainly to the increased number of teachers required to accommodate the increased enrollments at both schools.

The Education Week project of the Board in March 1964 comprised of a seminar on Family Finance and Money Management. This proved to be very successful and it is expected a similar program will be undertaken in 1965.

Negotiations between the Board and the Teacher's Federation Local were concluded satisfactorily during March.

Negotiations with Caretakers' Union did not bring about the desired agreement and a Conciliation Board was established to settle the dispute. No agreement has yet been reached with the Caretakers' Union.

In June a Mathematics course of instruction on the New Approach to Mathematics was sponsored by the Board with many local and out of town teachers attending.

A student accident insurance plan was made available in both schools in September and a majority of the students have been enrolled in this plan.

Mr. J. S. Cymbalista was appointed Vice-Principal of Beaver Brae Secondary School. Mr. Cymbalista had been teaching in Kenora several years at Lakewood Secondary School.

To co-ordinate the plant operation and maintenance programs at both Lakewood and Beaver Brae, Mr. M. Atamaniuk was appointed Acting Maintenance Supervisor. Mr. Atamaniuk had served as Head Caretaker at Beaver Brae for the past two years.

Student enrollment at both schools continued to increase. The accommodation problem at Beaver Brae necessitated a portion of the Business and Commerce students being transferred to Lakewood Secondary School in September.

A first for Kenora was the holding of the Convention of Secondary School Teachers of District 13 at Beaver Brae Secondary School. Over 500 teachers from communities throughout Northwestern Ontario attended this convention on October 22nd and 23rd.

Night school enrollments in the Fall of 1964 were much lower than previously experienced and many classes had to be discontinued because of this.

The seemingly excessive costs of heating at Beaver Brae has concerned the Board for some time and Mr. H. N. Gawley of Winnipeg was engaged to investigate methods of reducing these costs. His recommendations are now being acted upon.

The problem for Retraining of the Unemployed is continuing at Beaver Brae Secondary School. Classes are also being held at that school under the direction of the Department of Indian Affairs for the academic upgrading of young adult Indians. In addition to the night school programs at both schools the gymnasias and auditorium facilities are still being used for recreation activities.

The whole family went along to select the log, as this was thought to bring good luck for the coming year, and to frighten away any witches.

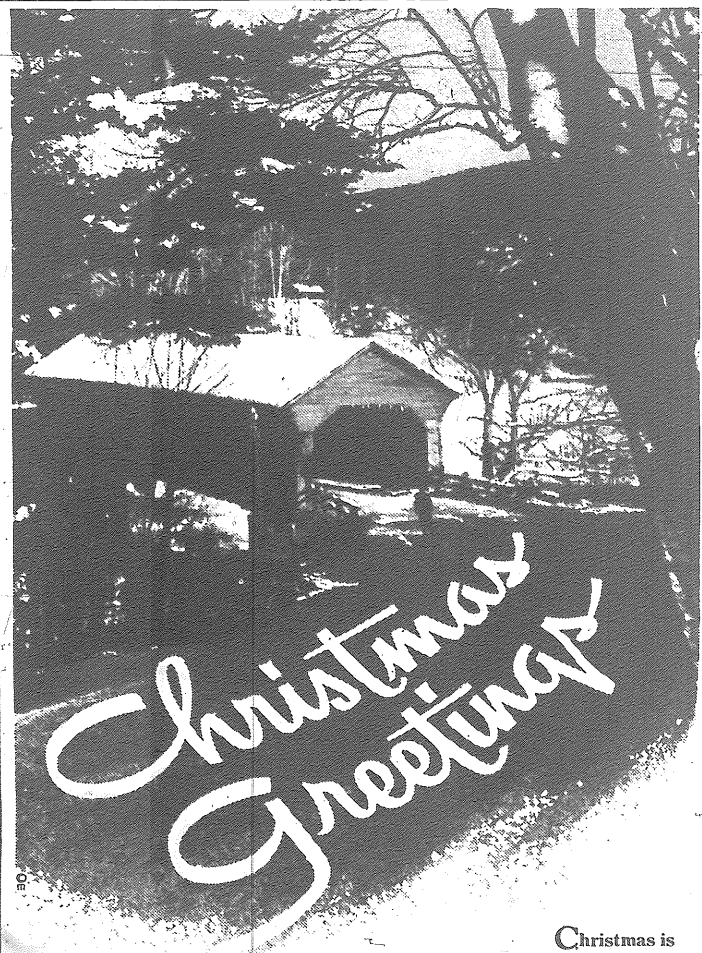
If the log burned out quickly, or did not burn brightly, it meant bad luck ahead.
