Winnipeg Council Approves Costs Of Pan-Am Games

Winnipeg — A longterm wrangle over the financing of the 1967 Pan-American Games in Winnipeg ended last night with city council approval of a three-way cost-sharing formula. Council voted 10 to 8 for the formula under which the federal government would pay one and a quarter million dollars, the Manitoba government one million and the city 400 thousand.

If the deficit rises higher than this combined figure, each of the three governments would pay one third of the extra up to a total of 750 thousand dollars. Any additional deficit would be met by the Winnipeg and Manitoba governments.

The cost-sharing proposal, advanced by Manitoba Premier Duff Roblin, had already been agreed on by the provincial and federal governments, before it came to council.

The City will set up a five-member board of control to watch over the expenditures of the games society.

During a bitter 3½ hour debate that preceded the council decision, Doug Groff, a member of the society's executive council, said he expected bidding for the television rights to the games to start at one and a half million dollars.

OPP To Step-Up Highway Traffic Enforcement

The Ontario Provincial Police, Kenora Detachment said this morning that they are stepping up their highway traffic enforcement.

The spokesman said with spring approaching and an increase in traffic, the enforcement is to curtail motor vehicle accidents and promote highway safety.

A warning was issued to all motorists to observe highway rules and in particular to stop at stop signs. Provincial Police said a number of district residents were recently prosecuted for not complying with this section of the Highway Traffic Act.

Stopping at stop signs before entering upon a through highway is in the motorist's own interest, said the Police Officer.

"We're in pretty good shape now," said a Control spokesman, who noted that the level at the Keewatin station stands at 1058.16 feet this morning.

Water has been spilled at the high rate of 20,000 cubic feet per second most of the winter to bring the water table down, prior to spring runoff. A year ago the Lake stood at 1058.16 feet on this date, and fell still lower before starting its steady climb during the remainder of the year.

A related matter to all this concerns those folk who like to anticipate all the various signs of spring, including the 2nd annual Rotary Car Guessing Contest. Last year the car on the ice dropped to the bottom of Rat Portage Bay on April 21st. Will

Late News Bulletins

WASHINGTON — Arrangements have been made for Britain to buy more than one billion dollars worth of American-built F-111 tactical bombers and parts. The planes will be used to replace Britain's abandoned TSR-2 program.

It was announced in London that the costly TSR-2 program was being shelved. This was followed almost immediately by a statement by U.S. Defence Secretary McNamara. He said: "In recognition of Britain's world-wide defence responsibilities, the U.S. government has made an agreement with the British government enabling it to obtain F-111 aircraft for the Royal Air Force."

A Soviet fighter plane flew over West Berlin's Tempelhof airfield today at an altitude of about 500 feet. The flight is seen as another harassing tactic by the Communists who are opposed to a meeting of the West German parliament in Berlin tomorrow. The allies - Britain, France and the U.S. - plan to protest the flight. The incident followed the closing by the Communists of the highway between West Germany and West Berlin for the second day in a row - this time for four and one-half hours.

An American scientist reports Russia is trying to wean its people away from their beloved vodka. Doctor Jack Bulloff says in Detroit that the Communist leaders are promoting wine as a substitute for vodka in a move to combat grain shortages and alcoholism.

It's said in Rome that Pope Paul is preparing a document altering Roman Catholic Church law on mixed marriages. It's said the document would do away with written promises from the non-Catholic and guarantee his or her own religious liberty.

Italian newspapers speculate that the Pontiff will shortly issue a personal administrative decree on the subject. However, a Vatican official said the Pope would not make public such a document for some time.

At present, a non-Catholic Christian marrying a Catholic is asked to sign promises to create no obstacles for the Catholic in his or her own practice or Catholicism, and to rear and educate children as Roman Catholics.

The preliminary hearing of former Federal Cabinet Minister Yvon Dupuis was adjourned briefly today in St. Johns, Quebec. The hearing was adjourned by Judge Andre Regnier to reach three statements made to the RCMP by crown witness Roch Deslauriers. Mr. Deslauriers has charged he paid Dupuis ten thousand dollars in an effort to obtain a racetrack charter from the Quebec government.

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STUBBY DUBCHUK TOP GOAL-GETTER IN I.H.L.

Kenora's Merv "Stubby" Dubchuk wound up the International Hockey League season with a hat trick in a 7-4 win over Dayton a week ago. The three goals pushed his total to 52 for the '70 game season and were good enough to lead the league for the most goals. Dubchuk, who played in all his teams games, also assisted on 49 goals to run his point total to 101 points.

Dubchuk's goal scoring feats helped Fort Wayne Komets to a league record of 344 goals. However, the Komets wound up second in the standings with 85 points, six fewer than first place Port Huron. Des Moines Oak Leafs were third with 83 points, and Toledo fourth with 66 points.

In the final game of the season the Komets beat Dayton 7-4. Dubchuk scored the second goal when he stick-handled his way through the Dayton defence and beat Pat Rupp from close in. He wrapped up the scoring late in the third period with a pair of quick ones two minutes apart. The first came on a slapshot

from the faceoff circle, and the second after breaking away from a Dayton defenceman who was holding him.

Stubby's mother and father were down for the game and the first two semi-final games that Fort Wayne won. Over the weekend the Komets downed Toledo 6-4 and 5-3 to sweep their best of seven series in straight games.

So now the Komets await the victors of the other semi-final series between Des Moines and Port Huron. Des Moines beat Port Huron 4-2 Saturday and lead the series 2-1. Playing with Des Moines is John "Bud" Bailey who is another local product. It's just possible Bud and Stubby could oppose each other in the championship round.

Bob Bailey also played in the IHL after coming out of retirement. He was playing for Dayton against Stubby and the Komets in the season's final game. Bob scored two and set up another. But Dayton wound up fifth and out of the playoffs so Bob Bailey retired early this spring.

If you want a sports oddity, one could be in the making. When Stubby first began his hockey in the minor leagues it was with the North End Komets. In his second year they won the Bantam championship. This happens to be Stubby's second year with the Fort Wayne Komets.

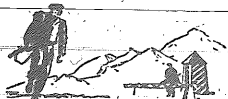

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NHL Playoffs Resume Tonight: Bergman Still Out

The NHL playoffs resume tonight in Chicago and Toronto with the home clubs in both cities looking for their first victories.

In Chicago, the Black Hawks are down 2-0 in their best of seven semifinal with the Detroit Red Wings. And in Toronto, the Maple Leafs trail the Montreal Canadiens by the same margin.

Hawks coach Billy Reay is counting on a resurgent Bobby Hull and the home ice advantage to stop the Red Wings. But he also said: "If we can get a little more out of a couple of guys, we've got a good chance to even things up." He didn't mention any names but it appeared that one of the players he referred to was Stan Mikita. The league scoring champ has been ineffective so far and Hull has once again been forced to carry the club. Supposedly crippled by knee injuries, Hull has accounted for half his team's six series goals, set up two more and shaken up several Red Wings with his hard body checks. Larry Jeffrey, checked by Hull in Sunday night's game and taken to hospital, is probably out for the remainder of the series. Detroit also will be missing defenceman Gary Bergman tonight and Val Fontaine is a doubtful starter. Bergman has sprained the ligaments in his right knee.

The Canadiens go into Toronto with Gump Worsley filling in at goal for Charlie Hodge. Hodge, who has only allowed three goals in the series so far, has a groin injury and will not be ready to play again at least until the fourth game on Thursday. He was hit by a slap shot in Saturday's match.

Toronto coach Punch Imlach hopes the return of Kent Douglas after a one game suspension will help the Leafs on power plays. Toronto's power play has yet to connect in 13 opportunities while the Canadiens have scored four of their six goals with a manpower advantage. Imlach also reports Bob Pulford has fully recovered from a groin injury and Johnny Bower will be back in goal

after missing Saturday night's game. Bower got wintergreen oil in his eyes during practice, was temporarily blinded and gave way to Terry Sawchuk. In turn, Sawchuk injured a shoulder during the game.

Chicago — The Detroit Red Wings have called up Irvin Spencer as an emergency replacement for tonight's Stanley Cup semi-final with the Chicago Black Hawks.

Spencer, who has been with Pittsburgh of the American Hockey League, will fill in for Val Fontaine, who has a pinched nerve in his neck. The Red Wings will also be short defenceman Gary Bergman and forward Larry Jeffrey tonight because of injuries.

Edmonton — Ernie Richardson of Regina and Hee Gervais of Edmonton are among eight rinks to qualify for play in the first annual Canadian Open Carpsiel in Edmonton.

The remaining eight will be decided today with the 16 rinks then clashing in a modified double knock-out competition.

Gervais nipped Bill Roberts of the Edmonton Shamrock club 10-8 and followed this with a 12-11 triumph over Bill McCallum, also of Edmonton.

Richardson had little trouble in the preliminary rounds as he posted a 7-3 victory over John McDonald of Edmonton and an 11-4 triumph over Tommy Kroeger of Calgary.

The Boston Bruins have named Hap Emms their general manager. He takes over from Lynn Patrick who moves into a newly-created executive position. Milt Schmidt remains as coach.

The World Boxing Association has named newly-crowned light heavyweight champion Jose Torres its fighter of the month for March. In the WBA ratings, Canadian champion George Chuvalo is third in the heavyweight division.

Quarterback Bernie Faloney says he is prepared to sit out the upcoming football season if he can't negotiate a deal with the Montreal Alouettes. Faloney wants an increased playing salary or a trade to the Toronto Argonauts.

Twelve Brownies from five different Packs took part in a joint test board on March 27, at Notre Dame Parish Hall. Dear Sir:
Re: Medicare
Recently I received a letter signed "Group of Kenora Voters" asking me what my position on Medicare is. The letter was unsigned, and I would like to use your columns to make my reply.

In the election campaigns of 1962 and 1963, the Liberal Party included in its platform, promises that it would bring forth a Canada Pension Plan, a Labour Standards Code, and a Medicare Plan. In less than two years of office, the Liberal Government has passed two of these three promises, the Labour Standards Code, and the Canada Pension Plan.

Recently the Government received the recommendations of the Hall Royal Commission on Medicare, which recommended that identical Provincial Medicare plans be established, with the Federal Government paying a part of the cost. The proposals of the Commission are now under study by the Department of National Health and Welfare.

The difficulty with the Federal Government's bringing forth a Medicare Plan, lies in the fact that

health services are constitutionally under the absolute authority of the ten Provinces. It will be no doubt difficult to get all eleven Governments to agree to one Plan, but it can be done, although agreement will probably take some time to accomplish.

I hope this makes my position on Medicare quite clear. I am for, not against a Medicare Plan, and I would like to assure the anonymous "Group of Kenora Voters" of my position, through your columns.
