## Community Centre Should Be All Purpose Building

There is a growing opinion in the community that a new Community Centre building in Kenora should be an "all-purpose" structure in every sense of the word. A new rink, in itself is long overdue, for the old Thistle Rink has long since passed its usefulness and in addition it occupies a site of great value.

Other immediate needs are a building which could be used for all community purposes, such as large gatherings, meetings, and multi-purposes. This implies two very important items, namely adequate parking facilities, adequate entrances to stage and hall accommodation; and acoustical properties, so obviously lacking in many modern structures today.

It is generally admitted by those interested in musical presentations, public meetings and events where acoustics are essential so that all can hear speakers, choirs or artists, that Knox United Church, in itself a very old building, has the best acoustical properties in Kenora and district. It is also interesting to note that even in Toronto, where new buildings are plentiful and large that another old structure, Massey Hall, is one of the finest acoustically constructed buildings in Canada today.

Adequate parking facilities are a

must for a large community building capable of handling large audiences. The facilities for parking should be so arranged as to provide easy access and be spacious enough to eliminate dangerous traffic hazards experienced in the long winter months.

A rink is badly needed. Why not cover all our needs for many future years by getting behind a building which will cater to ALL COMMUNITY NEEDS so that all our citizens can benefit summer and winter. A recognition of this need and the obvious solution to our problems should gain the approval and backing from all citizens.

Let us get behind the Community Centre campaign and erect a building that all our citizens can use and be proud of.

## Kinsmen Fish Derby To Take In 3 Weekends

The 12th Annual Lake of the Woods Fish Derby, sponsored by the Kinsmen Club of Kenora, promises to be the largest and most exciting yet. According to Chairman John Hillis, this year's Derby will have many new innovations designed to appeal to local residents as well as to serve as a tourist attraction for the many visitors to this area. Perhaps the most important change is that contestants this year will be able to enter fish on three weekends: June 19-20; June 26-27 and July 1, 2 and 3. The number of prizes has been greatly increased over previous years and presently totals over \$3,000. Grand prize for the largest fish entered in each of the five categories will be a 3 h.p. outboard motor, a total of five motors. In addition a 3-tray tackle box will be awarded to the person entering the largest fish each weekend in each of the five categories. This will mean that over the three weekends the Derby is operated, a total of 15 tackle boxes will be given away. The five categories are: Small-mouth Bass; Maskinonge; Great Northern Pike; Yellow Eckerel (Wall-eye Pike) and Lake Trout. In addition to these prizes, numerous special spot prizes will be awarded. A new innovation will be a separate category for children under 14 years of age. The girl or boy entering the

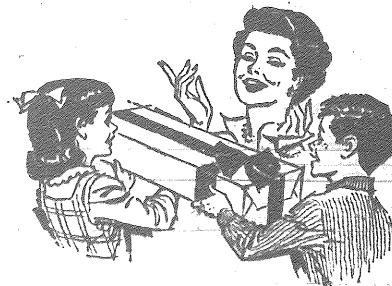

**Jack Salmon To Again Head L.C.B. League**

The Kenora Little Canadian Baseball Association held its annual league meeting last Wednesday and organized for the coming season. League President, Jack Salmon, welcomed the 15 interested persons gathered and noted that he had numerous calls from persons willing to help but unable to make the meeting.

After the adoption of the minutes from the last annual meeting, several important letters were read. One concerned a possible tournament from B.C., Alberta, Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario to be held this fall in Winnipeg. The project appears a certainty by next year if details cannot be worked out this year. B.C. has shown its willingness to come to Winnipeg for the event.

Correspondence with the park's board assured the league of a new back stop to replace the old one badly damaged by last fall's snow storm. The outfield fence will be replaced by a chain link fence. The news of forthcoming improvements was well received by the group.

Bill French acted as chairman for the election of officers for the 1965

season. Re-elected to another term in the president's chair was Jack Salmon, Sr. Other officers are: 1st Vice-Pres. - Bill French 2nd Vice-Pres. - Dennis Lambert Recording Sec. - Shirley French Sec-Treas. - Hilda Salmon Umpire-in-Chief - Dennis Lambert Statistician - Duke Boytc Equipment Mgr. - Duncan Calder

The managers of all six teams have been selected and were with their clubs last season. Buss Barber, Charlie Watson, Gerry Carlson and Jack Salmon Jr. are all remaining at the helm of their club's while Rosy Young and Bill Peltaruk move up from the coaching ranks.

Two rule changes were adopted. At the close of the season if two teams are tied, the teams with the most wins over the other team tied with it will be awarded the league position. A rookie will be a first year player, either nine or ten years old, and will not be considered a rookie after his first season regardless of the number of innings he plays. The move is designed to make the selection of the leagues top rookie a simpler task.

Registration for the coming season will be Tuesday, May 11 at 6:15 at Central Park. Boys registering must present proof of age, such as a birth certificate, on Tuesday. Boys from 9 to 12 are eligible to register. If it rains Tuesday, registration will be set back until Thursday. More details will appear Monday.

The Heavyweight Title Fight between Cassius Clay and Sonny Liston has been transferred to the town of Lewiston, Maine. It will be held on the same date, May 23rd.

Members of the rematch ended a court battle yesterday by pulling the fight out of Boston. **SPORTS BRIEFS**

Vicente Saldivar of Mexico has retained his World Featherweight Boxing Championship. He scored a technical knockout over California's Raul Rojas last night in the last round of their 15-rounder at Los Angeles.

The end came ten seconds before the final bell when the referee stopped the fight. Saldivar had knocked the challenger through the ropes. There were no knockdowns.

At the finish the champion's right eye was almost shut and he had a deep gash on his right cheekbone that bled profusely from the ninth round. Rojas had his left eyelid slit open in the eighth and his eye was almost closed.

It was Saldivar's first defence since winning the title from Sugar Ramos last September.

The Sherbrooke Beavers can wrap up the Allan Cup Senior Hockey Playoff tonight with a victory in the fourth game against the Nelson Maple Leafs.

The best-of-seven series is being played in Sherbrooke, Quebec. The Beavers have won three straight over the B.C. club, outscoring the Leafs 20-6.

However, Nelson coach Bobby Kromm refuses to concede and feels that one victory will give his players the necessary momentum.

The other National Hockey Play off, the Memorial Cup Junior Series, resumes on Monday. The Niagara Falls Flyers lead the Best 3-0 over the Edmonton Oil Kings. All games are being played in Edmonton.

A former Davis Cup tennis player, Jim Macken of Vancouver, has been appointed non-playing captain of Canada's 1968 Davis Cup team. Macken headed the team in 1963. Canada plays the United States in the North American Zone matches next month in Bakersfield, California.

OTTAWA — The Canadian Wildlife Federation says National Parks should not be used as sites for Olympic games.

However, delegates at the Association's meeting in Ottawa balked at passing a resolution opposing the holding of the 1972 Winter Olympics at Banff National Park. While they agreed in principle with the resolution, they felt alternative sites should be suggested in the event the games are awarded to Canada.

The meeting finally decided to ask that if the Winter Olympics are held in Banff, then as many events as possible should be held outside the Park.

A man sent back his motorboat registration renewal certificate to the New York State Office in Albany and said he no longer needed it. Somebody was interested enough to write him and ask why.
