KENORA MAN ELECTED TO MANITOBA - N.W. ONT. EXEC.

The Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Command 22nd Biennial Convention of the Royal Canadian Legion wound up on Wednesday. Presentation of resolutions terminated at noon Tuesday followed by nomination and election of officers during the afternoon.

Elected Command president was Jack Beaumont of Neepawa, Man. Other officers are vice-presidents T. A. McKay and D. E. P. Robinson, Winnipeg, and R. Tucklo, Port Arthur; R. G. Smellie, command chairman, Winnipeg; J. McLaughlin, vice-chairman, Kenora; R. M. Wynn, honorary treasurer, Winnipeg, and F. E. Skinner, sergeant-at-arms, Winnipeg.

Honorary presidents are George Rowe, Fort William, M. D. Peters, Wapewano, Man., and J. H. Stafford, Winnipeg.

Alex Gray of Port Arthur is immediate past president.

The new president remarked that the Legion was decreasing in membership due to death and dropouts and said that if all the World War II veterans would join, it would solve a major problem.

"In a few years," he said "disabilities will catch up and then you will appreciate the Legion."

Mr. Beaumont concluded that he wants to see the Legion become simply a veteran's association and not a service club.

A banquet sponsored by Fort William Branch 6 was held at the Curling Club Tuesday night which was highlighted by arrival of Fred T. O'Brien, Dominion Command pres-

ident. Scheduled as main speaker he was unable to be here in time for the banquet.

As chairman, Ray Tucklo of Port Arthur gave the opening remarks and introduced the guests.

Mayor's E. H. Reed and Saul Lashin congratulated the Command for a successful convention and commented on the public service given by the Legion.

This was followed by a toast to Command president-elect Jack Beaumont and Ladies Provincial Auxiliary president Mrs. J. Banks of Port Arthur.

Highlights From Queen's Park

Ontario's Premier John Robarts introduced a Bill in the legislature yesterday to provide compulsory arbitration between Toronto Hydro Commissioners and the (CLC) Canadian Union of Public Employees.

The union had set midnight tonight as the strike deadline in its dispute with the commission over wages and several other issues.

The Bill means that no strike can be called by the union as long as the law is in force. It received first reading yesterday and Mr. Robarts said it would receive second and third reading and royal assent today.

Liberal leader Andrew Thompson said his Party would support the Bill only if it becomes obvious that a strike would lead to an emergency situation in the city.

The government announced yesterday that it has called tenders for locomotives and coaches to be used on the new Burlington - Dumbarton commuter line. Some 48 railway coaches and ten diesel-electric locomotives are being called for the line, which will open late next year or early in 1967.

The opposition continued to criticize and propose amendments to the government's Medical Insurance Bill. Health Minister Dymond announced that poor risks, including chronically-ill and aged persons, would be forced to pay higher premiums of they are covered by the Bill. Opposition leader Thompson said he was shocked. The Liberal leader said he assumed that premium rates would be evened out so that everyone paid the same rate.

And Municipal Affairs Minister Wilfred Spooner announced a regional government study of two counties in the Niagara Peninsula.

Mr. Spooner said the counties of Lincoln and Welland, which include the cities of St. Catharines, Niagara Falls and Welland and the Town of Port Colborne, will be studied.

The study will be undertaken by a Professor of Political Science at the University of Western Ontario, Doctor Henry Mayo.

Edgar LeBleu To Head Up New Credit Union Group

WINNIPEG, Man. - June 10. - At a System meeting held in the offices of Winnipeg Terminal Credit Union Society, recently, the C.P.R. Employees Credit Union Association was organized, with a potential membership of 45 or more credit unions, involving over 35,000 C.P.R. employees having assets in excess of \$15 millions.

The purposes of the association are to encourage the exchange of information among credit unions in the association, with a view to giving members better service and improve the credit union philosophy generally among C.P.R. employees. In addition, the association hopes to undertake a programme to make all C.P.R. officers aware of the credit union movement among the company's employees and the good it does for both the employees and the company.

At the present time the association is set up in four areas from coast to coast, but a committee has been appointed to study the possibility of increasing the number of areas for a more equitable distribution of credit unions in each.

The first slate of officers for the new association comprises president, Edgar LeBleu, Kenora Railroaders Credit Union, Kenora, Ont.; vice-president, A. Raeburn, Brandon Terminal Credit Union, Brandon, Man.; secretary, Fred Brookbanks, Winnipeg Terminal Credit Union, Winnipeg, Man., and treasurer, M. Barr, Windsor Credit Union, Montreal, Quebec.

Late News Bulletins

There have been two mail truck robberies in eastern Canada. Three masked men held up a mail truck in Windsor, Ontario, today and made off with several bags of registered mail. The driver, who was bound and gagged, said he heard the men speaking in French as they ripped open mail bags. In Trois-Riveres, Quebec, hijackers hit a mail truck as it left last night for Montreal. They took several bags of mail.

The Soviet News Agency Tass reports that Russia's unmanned moon spaceship, Luna Six, suffered a malfunction during a corrective manoeuvre and will miss the moon by about 100,000 miles. The report says it was not possible to turn off an engine and as a result, the flight's trajectory deviated from the planned course.

The satellite was believed aimed at a soft landing on the moon.

Astronauts James McDivitt and Edward White stepped into the arms of their wives and gave bear hugs to their children in a heroes' homecoming in Houston, Texas today. With one sweep pilot McDivitt picked his three children off the ground. They had not seen their families for two weeks.

Vancouver Public Relations man Al Williamson has been sentenced two six months in jail and fined \$1,000 or an additional six months imprisonment. He was found guilty last week on two forgery charges in connection with a letter sent to Hal Dorman, a special assistant to Prime Minister Pearson. The letter carried the signature of British Columbia's Premier Bennett. The six-month sentence and the fine were imposed today on one charge. Williamson was sentenced to a concurrent six months on the second charge. The letter supported a move by millionaire Harry Stonehill to enter Canada as a landed immigrant. Stonehill faces charges in the U.S.

SASKATOON - An Edmonton youth, Richard James Murphy, today was sentenced to 15 months in Regina jail. Murphy pleaded guilty to robbery with violence in a Saskatoon grocery store holdup in February.

Twenty-one-year-old Edward L. Kennedy, 17 year-old Alex Brown and 19-year-old Ernest Burkart face trial in District Court on charges arising from the \$6,000 holdup.

Chief Justice Bence said Murphy had taken a small part in the robbery, had not helped plan it, and had not worn a mask with the others.

He had later turned himself in to police, and had admitted his error by pleading guilty in court.

Slipped From Raft Red Lake Area Boy Drowned

Ontario Provincial Police at Kenora reported today that Douglas Frank Kulchewski, aged 11 years, son of Mrs. Gladys Kulchewski, was accidentally drowned in an unnamed lake about one-half mile south of Starrat Olsen in the Red Lake area. It is reported that the boy, in company with his brother was playing on a raft when he fell into the water. His body has been recovered.

REGINA - Trade Minister Mitchell Sharp said in Regina today that he was warning Liberals all across Canada to make prudent preparations for a federal election.

Mr. Sharp, on a one-day visit to attend a nomination convention in Melville Federal Constituency, said it was for Prime Minister Pearson to call an election. But he said he believed the Prime Minister "would like to have the matter in parliament on a firmer basis."

Canadian government, provincial, municipal and corporation bond financing during May totalled \$333,236,830 compared to \$251,203,913 during May 1964 according to figures compiled by Wood, Gundy & Co.

A major portion of the difference between the two totals is the inclusion in 1965 of \$85,000,000 Quebec Savings Bonds Series 3. Government of Canada financing during the month was limited to \$325,000,000 in treasury bills.

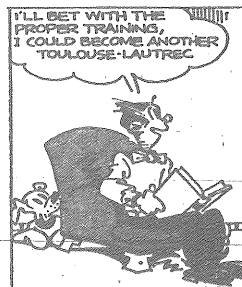

The man has been remanded on a charge of wilful damage pending psychiatric examination.

The 27 hundred pound sculpture, located at the entrance to the school of architecture, was attacked last Saturday by a man in a home-made costume resembling attire worn by medieval knights.

The man wore a metal vest, covered by a chain-mail type of coat made of potato sacks and a pair of

white boots. He carried a white hand-painted sword. A white home-made shield made from a garbage-can lid and wore a hard construction helmet, also painted white.

His outfit was completed by a wooden cross bearing the inscription: "put on all of God's armor. Know your enemy."

The man was taken into custody by the Winnipeg police after being spotted by a group of students studying in a building across the street.

The 12 thousand dollar sculpture now has five large holes in it, each about the size of a silver dollar, and several large dints.

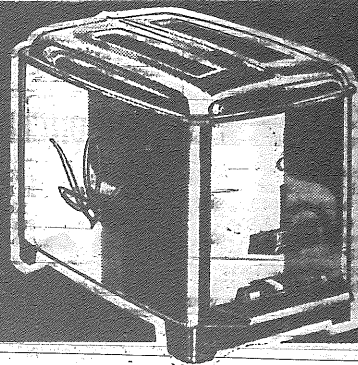

N.H.L. Draft Continues

The Boston Bruins have grabbed four players in the National Hockey League's draft for the asking price, of 30 thousand dollars each. Three other clubs claimed one player each while Toronto and Montreal declined to pick up any new faces.

The Bruins took 24 year old Gerry Cheevers from Toronto in the draft late last night at the NHL's annual meetings in Montreal. Cheevers was an all-star with the Calder Cup Rochester Americans of the AHL last year. The Bruins also managed to keep goalie Jack Norris who they had removed from their protected list in order to grab Cheevers.

Boston's other three draft choices all involved minor league players. They picked up Paul Popell, a Danish-born defence prospect from Chicago. He was with Buffalo of the AHL last season. Forward Norm Schmitz, a former Canadiens Chatelet and Keith Wright, who was picked up by Rangers in Tuesday's Inter-League draft, rounded out the Bruins' choice.

Centre Earl Ingarfield found himself right back where he started from, New York. He had been part of a two-for-four deal Tuesday which sent him to Canadiens. However, he was left unprotected by Montreal in the reverse draft yesterday and was taken back by New York.

Defenceman Bryan Watson, who originally belonged to the Canadiens organization, changed clubs three times in less than 24 hours. He played with Quebec Aces of the AHL for most of last season. He was picked up Tuesday by Chicago Black Hawks on the deal that sent Don Johns and an undisclosed amount of cash to Montreal. However, Chicago left Watson unprotected in the

draft and he was snapped up by Detroit Red Wings.

Chicago drafted defenceman-forward Pat Stapleton from Toronto. He was originally Boston property but went to the Leafs in a deal Tuesday. He was an all-star defenceman with Portland Buckaroos of the Western Hockey League last season.

NHL President Clarence Campbell said a proposal by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to immediately end its working agreement with the NHL had been rejected by the Board of Governors. Terms of the contract require two years notice of intention to terminate by either party. Campbell said the League will

call on the CAHA to honor the Clause.

Anglican Dean Preached To United Church Service

Portage La Prairie — The Anglican Dean of Rupert's Land preached the sermon last night at ordination services for six new Ministers during the annual meeting of the Manitoba conference of the United Church of Canada in Portage La Prairie.

Reverend W. E. Harrison told the new Ministers not to give heed to voices saying the great days of the Christian Church are over; that the Church rides the momentum of the success of past ages and that it has entered a post-Christian era.

Among the new Ministers was Mrs. Lois Wilson, wife of past Manitoba conference president Reverend Roy Wilson of First United Church in Fort William.

Dean Harrison said the principles of union published by the United and Anglican Churches last week may not mean that union is about to be achieved.

But, he said, they prove there had been significant advance towards it and the goal will be reached perhaps much sooner than everyone hopes and expects.

SPORTS BRIEFS

A group of Toronto sportsmen expect to hear today whether champion Cassius Clay's handlers have accepted an offer to have Clay meet Canadian Heavyweight champion George Chuvalo in Toronto for the World Heavyweight Title September 5th.

The Toronto group has offered Clay 750 thousand dollars to meet Chuvalo. Chuvalo is ranked number three by the World Boxing Association and is in line for a crack at Clay.

Meanwhile, former World Featherweight champion Willie Pep says some people underestimate the ability of Chuvalo. He describes Chuvalo as "the toughest heavyweight in the world today." Pep says, "he can't hit and he can take a punch." Pep was the referee Monday night when Chuvalo scored a first-round technical knockout over Sonny Andrew Burns of Boston.

Promoter Gus MacLellan says he will announce today whether the George Chuvalo - Jack Bailey fight will go on as scheduled June 19th in Glace Bay, Nova Scotia. The Canadian heavyweight champion was to meet the Philadelphia fighter in a non-title ten-rounder.

There were reports yesterday the fight would be cancelled. However, MacLellan would neither confirm nor deny the rumors. Chuvalo's manager Irv Ungerman, said in Toronto he hadn't heard anything about the fight against Bailey being cancelled.

Michel Jazy of France has run the mile in 3 minutes, 52 and six-tenths seconds for a new world record. His run took place last night in Rennes, France. It cracked the standard set by Peter Snell of New Zealand last year. The New Zealander was clocked in three minutes, 54 and one-tenth seconds.

Jazy is 29 years old and had been running for 14 years. He does not rate the mile as his best distance. He prefers the five thousand metre test. Tonight, Jazy plans to take a shot at the five thousand metre record. This is 13 minutes, 25 and eight-tenths seconds and is held by Ron Clarke of Australia.

Some of the world's greatest track stars will be in action in Toronto tonight in an International Track Meet.

The highlight will be a half-mile duel between Bill Crothers of Markham, Ontario and Peter Snell of

New Zealand.

Tonight's mile event features John Davis of New Zealand, three Americans, Jim Grelle, Gary Weisiger and Bill Dotson, and two Canadians Ergas Leps and Dave Bailey. Davis, Grelle and Weisiger all have run the mile under 3:57.

The New York Yankees have fin-

ed three players 250 dollars each and warned others about breaking training regulations.

The Yankees refuse to name the players involved. But newsmen attached to the team say Mickey Marich, the 100 thousand dollar slugger star, and pitcher Hal Reniff were two of the three fined.

General Manager Ralph Houk announced the fines last night in Kansas City. According to observers, there was an incident last Sunday night at Newark Airport in New Jersey before the team left on a flight to Kansas City.

Followers of the Yankees say similar incidents last year led to the

exit of Yogi Berra on the grounds that he could not control the players.

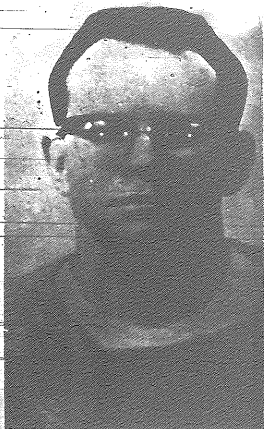

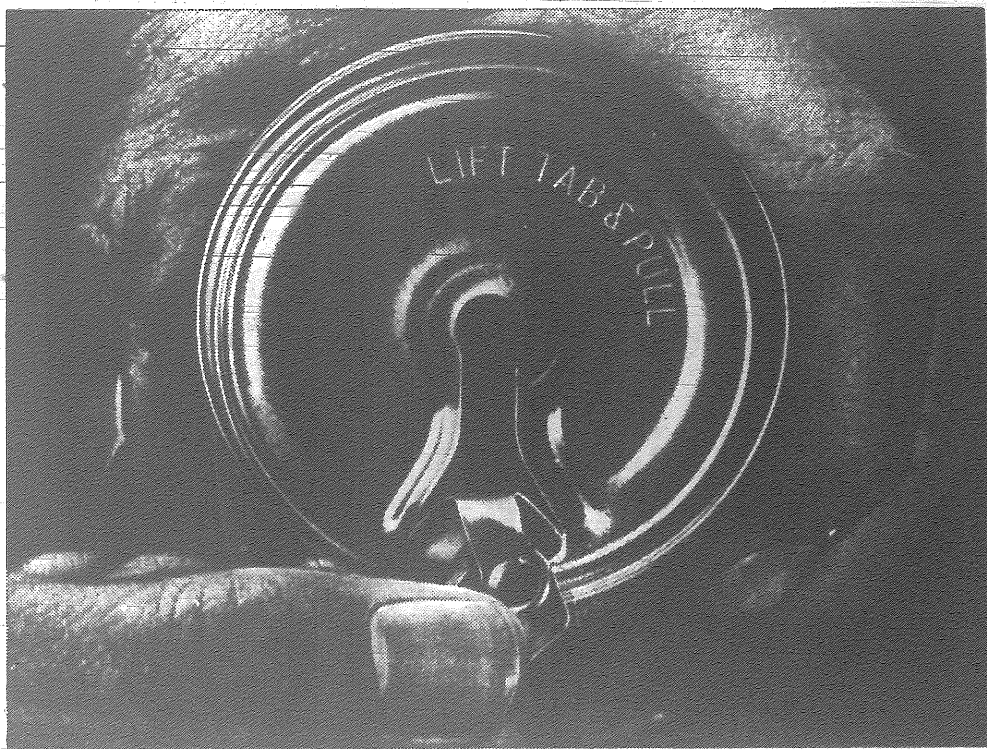
More visitors here in April

So what? So, if the holes were

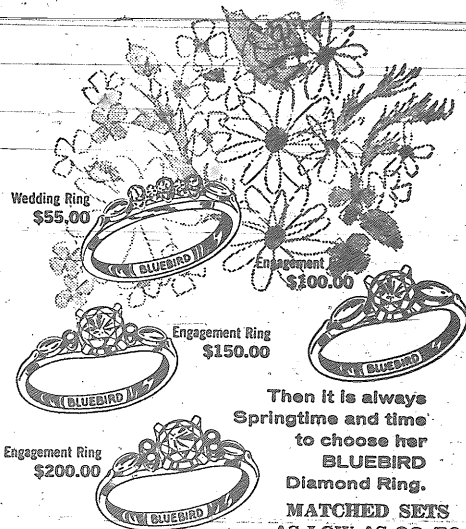
