Stole From Parking Meters Two Youths Sentenced

Two seventeen year old Keewatin youths were this morning given one year's suspended sentence on each of two charges. The pair pleaded guilty to wilful damage, having smashed parking meters in Kenora and also of theft of money from the meters. In passing sentence-Magistrate Fregeau warned the two that it was time for them to take a serious look at mending their ways now before it is too late. He said both were first-offenders and thus he was giving them the break of suspending sentence. They will be on probation as well and must pay back the cost of repairing the meters and also of paying back the monies stolen. "We ran into this type of nonsense when I was Mayor of the Town" stated His Worship. He told them they would be marked for life if they appeared before the courts again on similar charges.

A Kenora resident with a record of 43 years driving appeared in answer to a charge of careless driving in the operation of a motor vehicle. Police evidence showed that a car driven by the accused had, at 9.10 a.m. one morning struck two parked cars, on the wrong side of the road, inflicting damage to all three vehicles. Evidence showed that the accused had worked throughout the night previous and had been en route to his home when the accident occurred. Defence counsel advised the court that there was no indication of carelessness present and cited cases to back up his argument. He said accused had not been "nodding" at the wheel and was within fifty yards of his home when the smash occurred.

His Worship said he had also looked up the law regarding proving of careless driving and after hearing the evidence in this particular case found the accused "not guilty".

Charged with vagrancy a visitor to our community was given twenty four hours to depart the municipal boundaries.

A young man and woman who were found sprawled in a drunken condition on a downtown street last evening pleaded guilty to intoxication and will each spend the next seven days in jail.

Found lying outside a downtown hotel in an intoxicated state a man pleaded guilty to over-imbibing and was sentenced to seven days in prison.

Found "passed out" in a kneeling position on a downtown dock, a young woman pleaded guilty to intoxication. Police evidence stated that during Thanksgiving Day they

were called to the waterfront where they arrested the accused. This was her second offence in a short time and she will spend the next thirty days in jail.

Staggering about in front of the Kenora Police Office at 3 a.m. the other morning resulted in the arrest of one woman. She will spend the next seven days in jail, having pleaded guilty to intoxication.

A Kenora youth who was clocked 50 miles per hour as he drove his father's car down Ninth Street North and 45 miles per hour on Valley Drive pleaded guilty to speeding. He was ordered to pay a fine of \$15.00 and costs.

Winds And Rain Raise Lake Level

The strong south wind, combined with heavy rain showers, have combined to raise the lake level at Keewatin to within six inches of the year's high this morning. The Lake level was recorded at 1060.40 feet. In late July the level was just under 1060.80 feet. A year ago the level held at 1061.00 during most of October, on the strength of continual rains. The present outflow from the Lake is between 13,000 and 14,000 cubic feet per second. Rainfall for the 24 hours ending yesterday at 8:00 a.m. measured .32 of an inch at the Airport and .25 of an inch at Keewatin.

Kenora Woman Bereaved By Brother's Death

Lorne Francis (Porky) Robinson, 62, brother of Mrs. Della Hutchinson of Kenora passed away suddenly while at work at the Dryden Paper Company in Dryden on Thursday last. Funeral service was held Monday at 2 p.m. at Moffat Funeral Home. Interment was in the family plot, Dryden Cemetery. Archdeacon G. W. Plumridge officiated.

Born in Oxdrift, he had lived all his life at Dryden. During the second World War he served in the P.P.C. L.I. from 1939 to 1945. He was a member of the Dryden Branch, Royal Canadian Legion and the Pulp and Papermakers Union.

Late News Bulletins

Winnipeg — An inquiry into water haulage contracts awarded by Manitoba Hydro for its multi-million-dollar Grand Rapids Hydro project will be reopened to investigate all aspects of the plant's commissioning.

Chief Justice G. E. Tritschler of the Manitoba Court of Queen's Bench, who forms the one-man commission, announced the resumption of the hearings in a news release but did not specify a starting date.

He said he has engaged an expert to examine the technical aspects of the project and will ask Manitoba Hydro officials to give evidence "concerning defects and the commissioning of the plant".

Mr. Justice Tritschler was appointed to investigate water haulage contracts after the Liberal opposition in Manitoba charged that the contractor, Drake-Pearson Limited, realized undue profits on the contract. The firm signed a contract in 1960 to transport materials by water from Selkirk, Manitoba, to Grand Rapids, 250 miles north of Winnipeg.

Sherbrooke, Quebec — Sherbrooke La Tribune suspended publication today due to a strike by 125 employees. The newsroom, composing room and advertising department employees walked out last night as a result of a disagreement over terms of a new work contract.

The daily newspaper has a circulation of about 50 thousand. It is published by La Tribune Incorporee which operates French-language television and radio stations, CHLT-TV and CHLT, and English-language radio station CKTS.

The TV and radio stations continued to operate. The newspaper employees belong to a union affiliated with the Confederation of National Trade Unions.

State and city officials in Berkeley, California have warned of possible mass arrests tonight as the result of a scheduled seven and one half mile march through Berkeley and Oakland as part of a world-wide series of demonstrations protesting the U.S. presence in Viet Nam.

The march is scheduled to begin after an all-day "teach-in" at the University of California in Berkeley.

Officials in both Berkeley and Oakland have turned down applications for permits for the march on the grounds that the parade would not be in the best interests of "health, safety and welfare."

Fifty two year old John Kroll of Worth, Illinois, has dropped his divorce suit against Mrs. Kroll. She has promised to turn over a new leaf. To prove it, she has disposed of all but one of her seven Boxer dogs. She has offered to move from their house to an apartment so she won't be tempted to acquire any more dogs. She also has closed the dog's bank account and transferred the money to hers and her husband's joint account.

The Vatican Ecumenical Council has given final approval to a historic Roman Catholic declaration that deplors anti-semitism. It declares that the Jews as a whole cannot be blamed for the crucifixion of Christ. The vote was 1,763 to 250. The declaration will become a church decree after promulgation by Pope Paul and the Council in a public session of the Assembly, possibly on October 28th or November 18th.

Heavy rain is continuing over Florida after yesterday's deluge that dumped up to 20 inches over the metropolitan area of Fort Lauderdale yesterday. 24 hours and inundated other sections of the State. Almost six inches fell in Miami during a 24 hour period, but the rainfall tapered off somewhat further north in the State. In Fort Lauderdale, Pompano Beach and Deerfield, homes were flooded, cars were stalled and sea walls collapsed. Police have appealed to people to stay in their own homes to avoid stalling their cars.

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If You're Wearing Pointed Shoes, You Aren't In Style Any More

MONTREAL — Look at your shoes. If they're sharply pointed with high, slim heels you're out of style.

If they have an oval toe, a set-back heel, opened-up styling or perhaps a high-riding strap or buckle you're in step.

If the toes are shaved and squarish and the heels low and thick you're avant garde.

This is the fashion picture from experts on Canadian and European shoes. Shorter skirts and textured nylons have accelerated the shift away from the needlepoint toe, they say.

"We're moving into the wider toe and the thicker heel but we're doing it through evolu-

tion, not revolution," says Beth Hammond of the Shoe Information Bureau, which represents 90 per cent of the Canadian shoe industry. "We don't want to outdate every shoe in a woman's closet."

Mrs. Hammond says the fashion-conscious woman won't wear a pointed toe this season unless it's late day. "Even then it will be a medium toe and not the old pointed toe."

"We haven't bought any high heels for the last three seasons and we have no demand for them," says Max Berlinsky, president of Betty Shoes Inc. "The heavy look is very big, even in dressy shoes."

He concedes, however, that his clientele is not necessarily representative of Canadian women generally. "Our customers read the fashion magazines. We cater to the woman who likes to be first."

Not everyone agrees that the new styles are attractive. Some experts feel the chunky look emanating from Italy and France is feminine but others say it's not ladylike.

Fashion is dictating the "ugly look," says Seymour Lubin of French Shoes Ltd. of Montreal. "But fashion is not always in good taste."

Morty Bronstein, president of Brown's Shoe Shops, says their most popular heel is about two inches. And customers have accepted the wider flat toes.

"In Europe toes are going still wider but they are not accepted on a large scale, even in Montreal."

The shoe people seem to agree that the French are still leading the way in shoe styling. But this doesn't mean you have to buy shoes made in Europe to be in fashion.

"The newest shoe styles are

available in Canadian shoes, and Canadian leathers are among the finest in the world in color and quality," says Mrs. Hammond. "Today Canadian shoe manufacturers and retailers travel everywhere for ideas and adapt them to the Canadian market."

Even imported shoes are likely to be modified for the Canadian market. The dealers here say they buy their European shoes directly from factories in Italy, France and Spain, but not from samples. Changes are suggested in color, the leather or the patterns before they are ordered for sale in Canada.

Asked what the differences are between European-inspired

Canadian shoes and European-made shoes that have been adapted to the Canadian market, Mrs. Hammond says:

"Canadian shoes fit better than European shoes. In 95 per cent of the world's nations, shoes are available in only one width and a few sizes but Canadian manufacturers make shoes in nearly 300 different sizes and widths."

The dealers in European imports agree that Canadian shoes fit better but say their customers are more interested in fashion than fit.

"The Canadian shoe is the better one if you are looking for comfort," says Richard Rosenstein, advertising manager of Mayfair Shoe Salon Inc. "The Canadian shoe is designed for the Canadian foot."

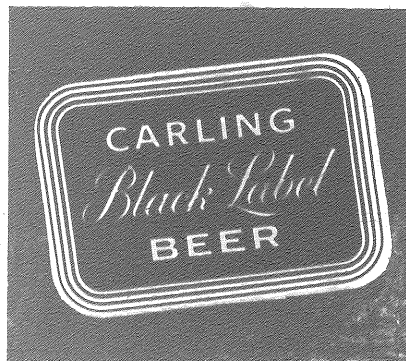

Brain Drain Second Only To Britain's

Canada was second only to Britain as a provider of scientific and engineering talent for the United States during 1962 and 1963, the U.S. National Science Foundation reports.

During those years, a manpower study shows, 10,200 scientific personnel entered the United States. Twenty per cent of these were born in Britain, 11 per cent in Canada and 8 per cent in Germany.

But Canada actually suffered an even greater brain drain than those figures suggest, because 23 per cent of the total of the scientific immigrants to the United States had last lived in Canada. Fifty-three per cent were born in Europe. So there is apparently a movement of U.K. and European scientists and engineers first to Canada, then to the United States.

Witnesses Plan Lakehead Meeting

The Kenora congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses at the beginning of a new service year, planned to reflect on the past year's activity in the Christian ministry.

Encouraging results were seen. Each month in the past year an average of 51 persons published from door to door the message of God's kingdom, and a total of 8880 hours were devoted to doing this preaching. After discussing the Bible with householders, 714 Bibles and study aids, as well as 31,787 Watch Tower and Awake magazines were placed with them

to further aid them in Bible study. To help interested persons gain more knowledge 3305 return visits were made during the year. Another feature of service, considered by the witnesses as the most important, showed 42 different home Bible studies were conducted from one to four times each month.

This activity will come under

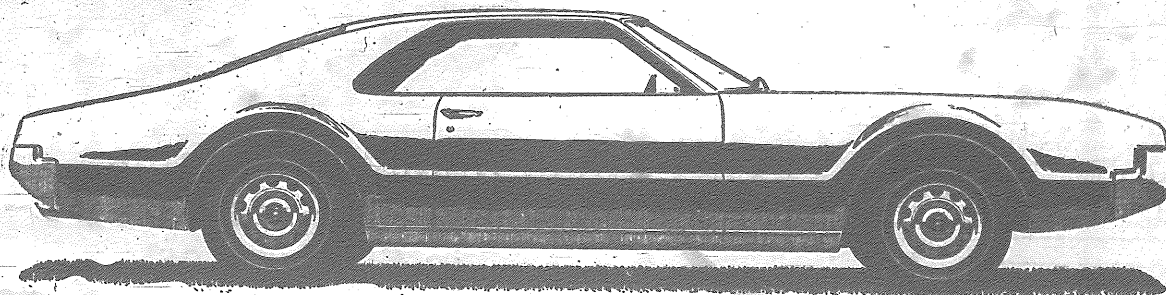
consideration as congregations throughout Northwestern Ontario gather in assembly in Port Arthur at the Coliseum Building on October 22, 23 and 24th.

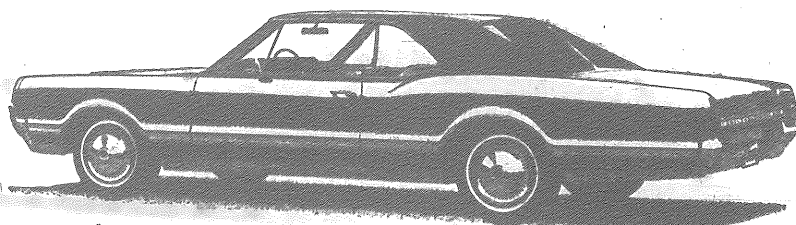
Frances and Kenora, one larger gathering was decided upon and Port Arthur was chosen as the host city.

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**Checks Made
On Big Game
Hunter Harvest**

The big game season in the Kenora District has been open for less than two weeks of the three month season, and already many hunters have their animals cut up and in the freezer. Just prior to the opening on October 2nd many people travelling district roads and waterways were reported seeing moose. As usual the weather changed and the animals were not moving to any extent over the opening week-end. The efforts of the many hunters in the area soon started to pay off, however, and success ratios for both deer and moose would appear to be running a little better than average.

The weather generally has been even, cool and wet, but not so wet as to hamper hunting as it did a year ago.

Conservation officers have been working around the clock and have encountered a number of violators. As usual the majority of these violations involve having loaded firearms in a boat or vehicle.

again in operation with the objective of obtaining sex and age data on a sample of the kill. The Red Lake Road Station run in conjunction with Sioux Lookout District and the Research Branch has already checked through close to 400 moose and over 200 deer. At Nestor Falls a daytime check on October 8th and 9th provided information on 112 deer. Additional information is also being obtained from the Jones Road north of Kenora and from Minali. The information combined with animals checked in the field, at tourist camps and locker plants, provides a good picture of our big game herds.

Hunter success is obtained following the hunt through mail surveys of both resident and non-resident hunters.

Big game hunting is an important industry to Ontario and to Kenora in particular. You as a hunter can help maintain this attraction by supplying the lower jaw of your kill for aging purposes, by filling out the questionnaire accurately should you receive one at the season's end, and by respecting and obeying the hunting laws and regulations.

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Dodger Players Cash In On Extra Loot

Winning the World Series is certainly fruitful from a prestige point of view. But for the Los Angeles Dodgers, it was good business as well. Each Dodger player who receives a full share will collect about ten thousand dollars from the Players' Pool of nearly 886 thousand dollars.

The losing Minnesota Twins will receive a healthy consolation prize — about 65 hundred each.

The exact shares have not yet been announced, but will be in the near future by baseball commissioner Ford Frick.

Los Angeles clinched its fourth series victory yesterday, blanking the Twins 2-0 behind the three-hit

pitching of Sandy Koufax. The ace left-hander, considered by many to be the best pitcher in baseball today, struck out ten Minnesota batters.

Koufax, named the outstanding series' player for the second time in three years, says he'll undergo a thorough examination of his arthritic elbow. Then, he plans to take a long vacation.

Working with only two days rest, Koufax completely overpowered the Twins. Not one Minnesota runner made it to third base and only two got as far as second.

The Dodgers scored both their runs in the fourth inning. Lou Johnson, a former outfielder with the Toronto Maple Leafs in the International League, hit a home run. It proved to be the winning run. Ron Fairley got to second base and Wes Parker singled him home.

A fine defensive play in the fifth saved Koufax from possible trouble. Jim Gilliam made a stabbing catch at third base, and with Twins' runner on first and second, made the forceout at third.

One of the big surprises in the series was the batting average of the Minnesota Twins. During the regular season, the Twins built their reputation on slugging. But their team average for the seven games was a mere .195, equalling the record low for a team in a seven-game series.

The Dodgers flew home to Los Angeles last night. A cheering crowd estimated at five thousand strong was on hand to greet them. Ten airline stewardesses surrounded Sandy Koufax when he walked from the ramp, but police extricated him from the crowd by hustling him into a station wagon.

OPP To Train Dogs For Search And Rescue

It was announced today by Assistant Commissioner J. L. Whitty that the O.P.P. have recently purchased 3 German Shepherd dogs to be trained for "Search & Rescue" throughout the province. Commissioner E. H. Silk, Q.C., had long felt the need for these versatile dogs and assigned Deputy Commissioner D. V. Whitley and Assistant Commissioner J. L. Whitty to investigate the training programmes of other police departments.

As the result of their studies the facilities of the Maryland State Police were selected.

Through the co-operation of Colonel G. E. Davidson and Captain P. J. Randall of the Maryland State Police, a 14-week intensive training programme was finalized. During the training period O.P.P. personnel and dogs will be billeted at the Eastern Barracks.

On Thursday, September 9, 1965, selected personnel, Provincial Constables A. A. Boley, D. Stevenson and G. D. Walker, together with their dogs proceeded to Eastern Barracks Maryland in new, specially designed cage cars.

Upon completion of the course on December 17, 1965, the constables will return to their respective detachments, Mount Forest, Sudbury and Kemptonville. They will also form the nucleus of the O.P.P. Canine training staff when additional dogs are acquired.

During the 14-weeks, man and dog will become an effective, efficient team on call for duty anywhere in the province.

Man Learns More And More How Man Began

If you think you have trouble coping with today's little irritations, consider the plight of your prehistoric ancestors. Not for them the bad bad at the office or a traffic hold-up on the way home. Their problem was how to stay alive in a hostile world full of sabre-toothed tigers and terrifying wild boars as big as tape-potatoes.

Thanks to stepped-up scientific search and new developments, the ever-intiguing mystery about the

origin of man may be nearing solution, says the October Reader's Digest. In the meantime, we are learning some fascinating things about how we developed from proto-hominid-primates to the shape and size we are today.

When man's ancestor, the ape-man, first came down from the trees he probably had a four-footed gait and had to learn to walk erect, a slow business which involved structural changes in the body and would take hundreds of thousands of years to accomplish fully. He had to subsist on such things as snails, snakes, worms or leftovers from the kills of animals. Pre-man had no fangs, claws or protective leathery hide, but his lack of physical defenses forced him to develop his wits, or perish. And it was wits, not brawn that would allow him to dominate the earth.

In the beginning, premen were feeble hunters. But meat-eating meant hunting, which led to the discovery of weapons, to tool-making and organization for group hunting: the first social pattern. This was, perhaps, the beginning of the house, almost two million years ago.

Great structural changes in the body continued. Jaws became retracted to give lateral as well as up-and-down motion; huge muscles in the buttocks appeared to hold the spine upright. As the brain grew larger, the forehead pushed out to make room for it.

By now true man was about ready to be born. Agriculture had yet to be discovered; this happened only 10,000 years ago. But the really difficult jobs had been completed: a remodelled body, the acquisition of weapons, clothing, fire. In space of time it was only a short step to jobs comparatively far easier: the invention of television, automobiles, jets.

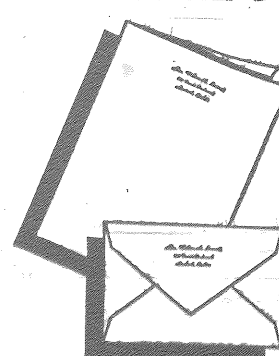
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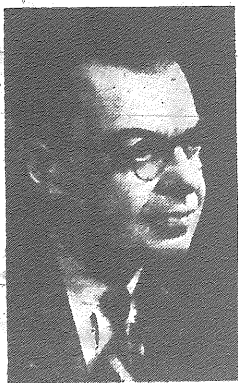

PAUL MARTIN

The Honourable Paul Martin, P.C. M.P., who is due to meet the Kenora public at a Coffee Party this Saturday at 3 p.m. at the Kenricia Hotel has represented the constituency of Essex East in Parliament continually since 1935. He is now Dean of The House of Commons.

He was born in Ottawa, Ontario in 1903 and grew up in nearby Pembroke. Scholarships took him to St. Michael's College and the Osgoode Hall Law School, Toronto; Harvard University, Cambridge University and the Geneva School of International Studies. He holds honorary degrees from 16 universities.

He was first appointed to the Cabinet as Secretary of State on April 18, 1945. The year after he became Minister of National Health and Welfare, spending 11 years in that post.

Mr. Martin was appointed Secretary of State for External Affairs on April 22, 1963. He makes his home in Winston with his wife and two children.

Fluoridation Is Gaining Ground In Britain

The one factor that will make the greatest impact on dental health in the near future is the effect of fluoridation of water.

This is one of the conclusions of a study of dentistry in the United Kingdom contained in the British Dental Journal. The study adds:

"When fluoridation becomes more generally accepted, as indeed it must, there will be an eventual reduction in the incidence of dental caries in all age groups."

The British comment is contained in a review of fluoridation developments contained in a news release from the Health League of Canada.

The British ministry of health has put itself behind fluoridation. It ur-

ges all local authorities to bring the fluoride content of water supplies up to the accepted concentration. A letter from the ministry states:

"In the minister's view fluoridation now is an established and well-proven public health measure which confers benefit to dental (and, in consequence general) health greatly exceeding the cost of introducing it."

Statistics indicate that British dentists extract 1,500,000 teeth a year from children under 17; and one-fifth of the number of dentures fitted annually are for people under 35 years of age.

Dramatic evidence of the power of fluoridation to reduce tooth decay is provided by studies in various places.

In St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, which lacks a central supply system, fluoridated water was provided to some children and not to others. The result: Elementary school

children drinking the fluoridated water had 22 per cent less decay than children who drank non-fluoridated water.

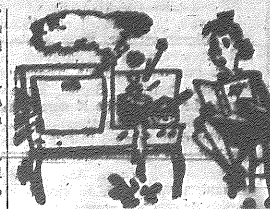
Further evidence comes from a comparison of Newburgh, N.Y. which has had fluoridation since 1945, with a city without fluoridation.

Preliminary results show that 41 per cent of five and six-year-old children in Newburgh required no dental treatment. In the city without fluoridation only 15.5 per cent were free from treatment need.

KITCHEN CLASSICS

SPICED CRAB APPLE JELLY

Yield: about 12 medium glasses

(8 lbs. Jelly)

5 cups juice (about 3-1/2 lbs. (3 qts.) ripe crab apples)

1/4 to 1 teaspoon each ground cloves, cinnamon and all-spice, or any desired combination of spices

7 1/2 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar

1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin

First, prepare the juice. Remove blossom and stem ends from about 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe crab apples; cut in small pieces. Do not peel or core. Add 3 cups water and the spices; bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Crush with masher and simmer, covered, 5 minutes longer. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 5 cups juice into a very large saucepan.

Then make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in sauce pan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover jelly at once with 1/4 inch hot paraffin.

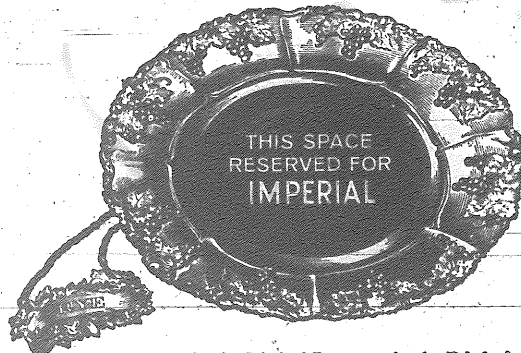

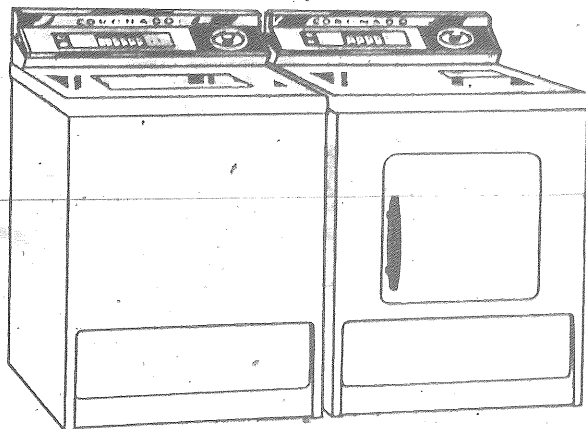

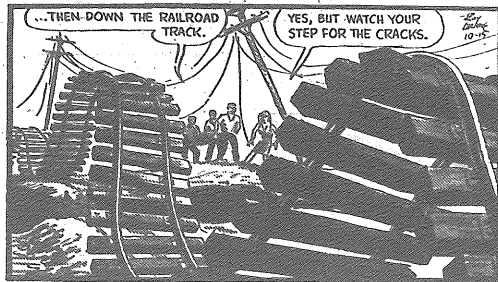

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**Language
 Courses
 Criticized**

TORONTO—High school language courses in Italian and Russian are inadequate and those in German and Spanish are not on a high level, an Ontario Curriculum Institute report says.

The report calls for courses in the four languages to be taught over five years of high school—grades 9 to 12—instead of the present three or four.

It also says there is a need for more emphasis in Ontario schools on the spoken language and less on formal grammar.

The institute is an independent body supported by school boards, teachers' organizations and the provincial education department.

The report is the third prepared by the institute's modern language committee and is compiled from studies made by specialist committees in each of the four languages.

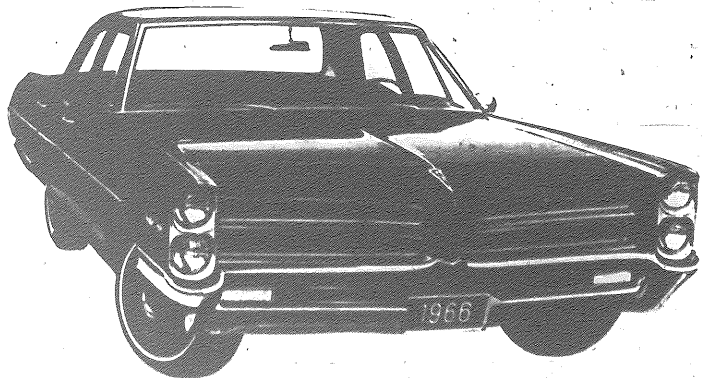
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Winter Protection of Roses

Wherever temperatures go below 15 degrees, roses need winter protection. All-America Rose Selections, a group of professional growers, hybridizers, and introducers of fine roses, have devised the following fundamental routine of winter protection which is practiced in their extensive test and display gardens scattered throughout the United States. They recommend that you use the same simple procedures in protecting your own roses. They are as follows:

TRIM



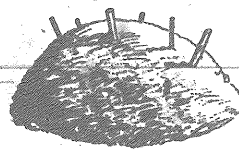
1. **TRIM** — After a hard frost or two, but before the ground freezes, prune all canes of your hybrid tea, floribunda, and grandiflora roses back to 18". This makes it easier to work around them in providing winter protection, and prevents them from becoming battered by the wind and ice of winter.

SPRAY



2. **SPRAY** — Remove all dead stems, leaves, and debris, raking carefully around each plant. Spray the entire plant and surrounding soil with a good fungicide and insecticide to prevent carrying over of diseases and insects on and about the plant.

MOUND



3. **MOUND** — Mound a pile of loose earth up, over, and around each plant to a height of about 12" and firm. Prune the canes of the roses so that only 4" to 6" of the tips remain exposed after mounding. The purpose of this mounding is to protect the plants from rapid changes of temperature and to guard the canes against winter wind and ice damage.

Evergreen boughs, hay or straw, thrown over the mounds will prevent washing during the winter, but such added protection should not be applied until after the ground freezes.

Carefully remove mounds in spring when new growth starts.

As far as possible, plant your garden with All-America Rose Selections award winners, as they have a great deal of inbred hardi-

ness, but even so, winters are unpredictable and winter protection is good insurance against loss.

Turkey Price Seen Rising

OTTAWA —Turkey may be more expensive this Christmas than last, the federal agriculture department said Tuesday in its monthly food outlook bulletin.

The price rise results from unusually early marketing, the bulletin said. Until Christmas, turkeys should be in good supply. Up to August of this year, production had increased 30 per cent, and will continue to rise.

The supply of broiler chickens will probably drop. But a drop in prices also is expected since broilers will be competing with turkeys.

The price of beef and pork can be expected to remain firm, in spite of a possible seasonal decline.

Egg production is low at this time of year, and prices can be expected to rise above those of last year by a few cents.
