## Approval Sought For Canada - U.S. Gas Exchange

Omaha, Neb. — Northern Natural Gas Co. wants to build a \$200 million pipeline system to deliver natural gas from western Canada to eastern Canadian markets via the United States.

W. A. Strauss, Northern's president, said Monday the Federal Power Commission will be asked by Dec. 30 to grant permission for the company to build the system.

Under the proposal, Northern would serve Canadian natural gas to its existing customers in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Upper Michigan markets and send an equivalent amount of United States gas to eastern Canada. Such an exchange would lower future gas transmission costs for both United States and Canadian consumers, he added.

Stauss said Northern proposes to add some 900 miles of new large diameter pipeline to carry gas from Emerson, Manitoba, to Duluth, Minn., and then to the international border near Detroit for Trans-Canada Pipelines, Limited. It would also provide service to the Saint Ste. Marie area by extending the pipeline now serving the Marquette, Mich., area.

Northern said it would ask FPO to okay this exchange proposal instead of a plan filed Oct. 15 by Great Lakes Transportation Corp. which would transport gas from western to eastern Canada through a pipeline that would cross northern Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan.

latest reports on ski activity for  
1965-66.

This province's ski-operators have  
executed a financial gelandesprung  
by investing a cool \$1 1/4 million so  
far this year in improvements for  
an ever-increasing host of kick-turn  
enthusiasts.

That the promoters won't be left  
flat on their sitmarks is assured  
by the many new installations built  
this summer and under way this  
fall.

These include 11 T-bars, one J-bar,  
two chairlifts, 16 rope tows, two  
Bavarian wire lifts and four areas  
with new snow-making equipment.

"Just give me the moonlight, a ski  
tow and you," could be the theme  
of at least four centers adding night  
skiing.

Ontario now has 114 active commercial  
skiing areas, plus some 15  
private clubs with their own facilities.  
In all, a total of about 323 lifts  
or tows are available to make the  
sport more enjoyable for those taking  
advantage of the thrills of the  
hills.

The growing trend to outdoor winter  
recreation is getting a big assist  
from these annual improvements.  
And, not to be outdone by  
centers farther south are the excellent  
slopes at the Canadian Lakehead  
and the Kenora district which  
continue to draw more and more  
devotees from Manitoba and Minnesota.

What makes these areas even more  
attractive is that they now offer a  
variety of top-notch accommodation,  
good eating places, and afterdark  
entertainment which runs full-tilt all  
winter.

Area news reveals these extensive  
opportunities for the pleasures offered  
by winter snows and a pair of  
skis, catering to the young and old,  
the timid and the intrepid.

Ontario's most westerly club at Kenora  
is promoting ski weekends  
from nearby Manitoba. It has an ad-

ditional rope tow and plans extension  
of club facilities.

Loch Lomond at Fort William has  
re-built and relocated its Number  
One T-bar to provide an additional  
350 feet of uphill transport.

Little Norway, 12 miles south of  
Fort William, is well up the hill  
with the installation of a new T-bar.

Fort William Ski Club, on top of  
Lakehead's landmark, Mount McKay,  
is enlarging its hilltop chalet. It  
boasts the largest floodlit ski area in  
Canada.

## KITCHEN CLASSICS

### Yellow Cake

(Makes two 8" x 8" x 2")  
1 pkg. yellow cake mix  
1 pkg. lemon instant pudding mix  
4 eggs, separated  
¾ cup water  
¾ cup salad oil  
Mix pudding, cake mix and water together. Add 4 beaten egg yolks and oil. Beat egg whites and fold into cake. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes.

Icing for Yellow Cake  
2 cups icing sugar  
Juice of 2 lemons  
Combine the juice with the icing sugar. Remove the cake from the oven and prick with a large fork (not table fork). Pour icing over while still hot. This will form a glaze.

Chicken Chow Mein  
2 cups chopped celery  
1 cup chopped onion  
1 cup drained mushrooms  
Chopped cooked chicken (as much as you like or have on hand)  
1 large can of bean sprouts or Chinese vegetables  
1 or 2 packages of dried Chinese noodles  
Soya sauce  
Salt to taste

Fry the celery, onion and mushrooms in oil until partly done (not browned). Add chicken and cook until vegetables are done, stirring to prevent burning. Use a little of the mushroom juice if more liquid is required for cooking. Add bean sprouts or vegetables and noodles. Heat for 5 minutes, then mix and serve with soya sauce.

Never Fail Pie Pastry  
5½ cups flour  
1 tsp. salt  
3 tps. baking powder  
1 lb. lard  
2 eggs  
1 tbs. vinegar  
2 tbs. brown sugar  
water  
Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Add lard. Mix until crumbly. In a 2-cup measure, put 2 well-beaten eggs. Add brown sugar and vinegar and enough water until the measure is full. Add this to the dry ingredients until it

2 tbs. hot water  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup melted shortening  
1 tsp. ginger  
2 cups flour  
2 tps. soda

Heat oven to 350 degrees and grease a 13" x 5" x 2" pan. Blend eggs, sugar, molasses, shortening and spices in a large bowl. Beat sugar.

very well until batter is smooth. Dissolve soda in 2 tps. water and stir in. Sift flour into the mixture and beat very well again. Add boiling water and beat a few seconds to blend well.

Batter will be thin. Pour into prepared pan and bake for 45 minutes. Remove from the oven and sprinkle generously with granulated and spices in a large bowl. Beat sugar.
