TENSION MOUNTING AT WILDCAT STRIKE SCENE

Hamilton — Police reinforcements have been summoned to help deal with wildcat strikers at the steel Company of Canada plant in Hamilton.

The strikers are staging sitdowns to block street entrances to the giant plant. Police expected to have about 300 policemen at the scene by noon today.

Police early today escorted some 500 supervisory personnel into the Steelco Hilton works, where pickets kept some 12 thousand men from their jobs.

Three cars were overturned in parking lots and set on fire.

Police fear trouble on the weekend if the leaderless walkout continues. At peak times the pickets numbered as many as 150 at the main Hilton plant.

The sitdown began at 8 a.m. EDT today after Police cordoned off four-lane Burlington Street east to one lane. Two hundred pickets were sitting on the street at one time.

Traffic halted when about 50 took over the cordoned-off strip.

Seven supervisors are believed to have entered the Canada works plant in a 40-foot boat which picked them up at a canal.

To counter any further attempts, strikers posted watchers at the canal, the Leander Boat Club and the Royal Hamilton Yacht Club areas.

No trains are operating into the Steel plant. But supervisory personnel are keeping the blast furnaces going at full capacity.

No meetings are scheduled in the confused situation in which Union members are at loggerheads with the executive of local 1005 of the (CLC) United Steelworkers of America.

Forest Fire Danger Mounts Throughout Kenora District

Hundreds Coming To Camp Stephens Ceremonies

Opening of the new facilities under a \$100,000 redevelopment program will highlight the 75th anniversary Sunday at Camp Stephens, the YMCA camp at Lake of the Woods, Ont.

The camp is the largest and oldest of its kind in Western Canada. About 15,000 boys have taken part in its program since 1891.

More than 350 people will leave Kenora at 11:45 a.m. on the sight-seeing boat M. S. Argyle for the seven-mile journey to the island camp. Events will include dedication of an outdoor chapel, opening of a boat-house and 12 new cabins, and the arrival of YMCA voyageurs from a 250-mile canoe trip.

Following a rash of lightning fires in the woods of Northwestern Ontario during the past twenty-four hours, Ontario Department of Lands and Forests at Kenora today said that the prospects for a "grim" weekend mount as the fire danger is extreme in almost all areas.

There were two new fires reported in the Kenora District yesterday and both are now under control. One was in the southern part of the Dryden division and this was caused by lightning and the other is what is termed as a "resident" fire at the Werner Lake mine, north of Kenora. Lightning was responsible for seven new fires in the Sioux Lookout division. There are presently thirteen fires burning there and five of these are being held and the remaining eight are under control.

At Fort Frances, one new lightning fire was reported and another was termed as a "recreation" fire. Again the Lands and Forests personnel are urging everyone using the woods to use extreme caution at all times. They ask that travellers refrain from using campfires until such time as the danger is lessened. Travel permits are required for everyone entering the forests.

There is a prospect of thunder-showers for this evening and tonight but the weather office terms it as a weak disturbance and if it is not anticipated that there will be sufficient precipitation to alleviate the dangerous situation to any extent.

The fire-fighting fleet here has been bolstered by the arrival of an additional water-bombing aircraft.

Late News Bulletins

Another Senior Canadian Naval Officer has announced his early retirement. The Defence Department confirmed today that 48-year-old Rear-Admiral Robert Welland goes on retirement leave Monday. Admiral Welland was Deputy Chief of Operations at Canadian Forces Headquarters and his retirement is the fourth premature departure by an Admiral in the last month. He was not available for comment, but it has been learned he asked to retire for personal reasons. Three other Admirals have retired early because of differences with Defence Minister Hellyer over the Armed Forces Unification program.

The Canadian Public Relations Director of the Steelworkers' Union today called an incident at the picket line at the Steel Company of Canada an appalling incident at a most inopportune time. Murray Cotterill said a train attempted to cut through the picket line to go into the plant in Hamilton. The train was stopped by a mass of pickets. He said relations between the rebellious strikers and the union's negotiating committee had been improving since last night. Mr. Cotterill said he feared further picket line incidents might reverse that trend. The Steelworkers' spokesman said the incident involving the train was an attempt by the Steel Company of Canada to assert its authority and had no practical purpose. Then Mr. Cotterill added: "I think the company would be well advised to leave this situation to the process of democracy." Company officials say they had no knowledge of the train.

Negro Civil Rights leader Doctor Martin Luther King plans to lead another march in Chicago today in his drive to obtain better housing for Negroes. Chicago police and firemen are strengthening security precautions in the wake of violence last night in which two persons were killed and 15 others wounded. The violence is believed a result of gang warfare among young Negroes.

East Germany today issued an appeal to all Berliners to join in celebrations planned August 13th to commemorate the fifth anniversary of the Berlin Wall. This is the first time the Communists have scheduled celebrations of the Wall they erected in 1961 to halt a flow of refugees to West Berlin.

An inquest will be held into the death of Doctor Mohamed Abdul Malek, a Pakistani research scientist with the Federal Mines Department in Ottawa. Doctor Malek died yesterday in a traffic accident near Hawkesbury, 35 miles east of Ottawa.

The Polish Press Agency reported today that three British freighters unloaded wheat bought by Poland in Canada. The wheat was unloaded in the Polish port of Gdynia. Today's shipment totalled 88 thousand tons of wheat and another 20 thousand tons is expected at the port soon aboard the Canadian freighter Ocean Star.

About 200 express freight handlers at CNR's Toronto terminal remained off their jobs today in the second wildcat strike in four days. The men refused to work yesterday afternoon when the company announced it was going to investigate the cause of the first strike Tuesday. The strikers are members of Local 26 of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers. The walkout Tuesday was in sympathy for striking Montreal workers. The strike has caused an embargo by the CNS on express shipments between Montreal and Toronto.

WEATHER

Skies were sunny over much of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario this morning. Cloud spreading rapidly eastward ahead of a low pressure system in Saskatchewan will cover Manitoba by evening and most of Northwestern Ontario by midnight. Showers and thundershowers have developed over Saskatchewan and are expected to become general in cloudy areas this afternoon and tonight. The center of the disturbance will pass through Saskatchewan by midnight and reach the shores of Lake Superior by Saturday evening. A few heavier thundershowers possibly accompanied by hail are likely in extreme southeastern Saskatchewan and southwestern Manitoba this evening and tonight near the center of the disturbance. Clearing will follow the passage of this system.

In northern areas only patchy cloudiness is expected during the next 36 hours with temperatures near seasonal values.

PLANES JOIN SEARCH FOR MISSING CRAFT

WINNIPEG — A Canadian Air Force Dakota from Winnipeg joined the search today for a plane with two men aboard missing since Tuesday in northern Manitoba. The plane disappeared on a flight from Windy Lake in the Northwest Territories to Lynn Lake, Manitoba.

The pilot has been identified as S. Vonolovich of Lynn Lake and the passenger as M. Zuba. Lynn Lake is 425 miles northwest of Winnipeg. The pontoon-equipped plane, a

Norseman, disappeared during a two hour flight, after taking off from Windy Lake, about 240 miles north-east of Lynn Lake. The plane was reported to be carrying enough fuel for two hours and 45 minutes, as well as food and sleeping bags.

The owners of the missing aircraft, Farsons Airways Northern Limited of Flin Flon, sent two planes to the search area yesterday and another four today.

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Luci Johnson To Be Wed Tomorrow

Church rehearsals for the wedding tomorrow of Luci Johnson and Pat Nugent will be held today in Washington. After the rehearsal, the young couple will attend a dinner dance for members of the wedding party. Meanwhile, the threat remains that the wedding will be obstructed by peace groups. The student non-violent co-ordinating committee has been criticized by four negro civil rights leaders who had asked the committee to cancel what they described as a planned demonstration at the White House tomorrow.

Foundry Workers At Winnipeg Out On Strike

WINNIPEG — More than 135 Foundry workers at Anthes Western Limited in Winnipeg are out on strike today. The workers left their jobs at 6:00 p.m. yesterday after a four-hour, last ditch talk with management.

Employees at the Foundry (at Saskatchewan Avenue) voted last month to walk out. The strikers are members of Local 3223 of the United Steelworkers Union.

Anthes Western Limited had offered 23 cents an hour more over a two-year contract, while the workers asked for 33 cents and certain welfare benefits. The contract at the Winnipeg Foundry expired April 30th.

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Claim Staking Remains Brisk

Although approximately 1,700 under the total for the equivalent period last year, the 18,540 mining claims which have been recorded during the first six months of 1966 are indicative of the significant interest which continues to be shown in exploration work throughout Ontario.

Six of the fourteen mining divisions report increased activity, by far the busiest divisions being Porcupine with 4,449 claims recorded and Port Arthur with 3,315. Generally speaking, claim staking activity so far this year appears to be fairly widespread throughout the province. The number of miners' licenses is

used and renewed in the same period varied little from that for the first half of 1965 - 6,468 compared with 6,702.

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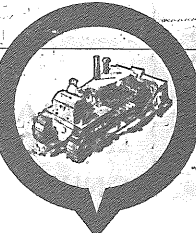
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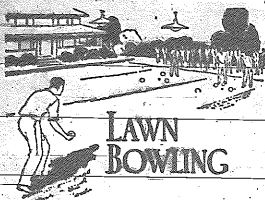
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LAWN BOWLING

SPORTS BRIEFS

GAMES

One of Canada's top Gold Medal hopes, Harry Jerome of Vancouver, has taken his first step towards that goal in opening day action at the British Empire Games in Kingston, Jamaica.

Jerome won the opening heat of the men's 100-yard sprint today in a slow 9.8 seconds but he appeared to be pacing himself for tomorrow's grueling schedule. The victory moved Jerome into the second round with 31 other Commonwealth sprinters.

Joining Jerome in the second round is Ed Hearste of Toronto with a fourth-place finish in the second heat in a time of 9.9 seconds. However, a third Canadian competitor, Terry Tomlinson of Winnipeg, was eliminated in the fifth heat when he placed fifth.

After the first two events of the Decathlon, Gerry Moro of Trail, British Columbia trailed badly. He finished last in the 100 metres in 11.9 seconds and placed seventh in the long jump. The leader is R. Williams of New Zealand with one thousand 673 points.

In the fencing competition, John Andru of Toronto won his way into the semi-finals with a record of four victories and two defeats. Two other Canadians were eliminated. Herbert Obst of Montreal had one win and four defeats while Gerald Wiedel of Toronto suffered five straight losses.

Badminton, Rifle shooting, swimming, weightlifting, cycling and boxing were other events scheduled in today's opening program.

GOLF

Bob Goalby has zoomed into the early second round lead in the 100-thousand-dollar Cleveland Open Golf Tournament. Goalby fired a four under par 67 in today's second round, and reached the 36-hole mark with a total of 135.

Included in his round was an eagle on the sixth hole, where he sank a 20-foot putt.

The most sensational round of the second day has been turned in by former U.S. Open Champion Julius Boros. He fired a record-setting 64 - seven strokes under par. That moved Boros into a tie for second place with a two-round total of 136.

Boros had eight birdies in the round. Johnny Pott also has a 36-hole total of 136. He had a 70 today.

The leader going into the round, Labron Harris, ran into trouble from the start. He had a double bogey on the first hole, and wound up with a 72 for the round. That gives him a two round score of

137.

BOXING

World Heavyweight Champion Cassius Clay needed British challenger Brian London today on the eve of their title fight in London.

Directing his remarks to London, Clay said: "put your wife and children in the ringside. Remember that you're fighting for them. Then, if you hit the champ and he doesn't fall, run."

Retorted the 32-year-old London: "I don't take much notice of what Clay says."

London, a six-to-one underdog, is aiming for a knockout. He admits he's unlikely to outpoint the fleet-footed Champion. The fight will be carried live on TV to the United States and Canada via the Early Bird satellite at 5 p.m. EDT. Clay will collect a guaranteed 252 thousand dollars while London's share will be around 112 thousand dollars.

FOOTBALL

The Grey Cup Champion Hamilton Tiger Cats normally don't need any particular incentive to spur them on in the Eastern Football Conference. But tonight the Tabbies will be trying to wipe out the memory of a 41-27 pre-season exhibition loss to the Toronto Argonauts when they meet the Agros at Toronto's CNE stadium. It will be the first regular season game for both clubs.

The man on the spot will be Argos' rookie quarterback Wally Gabler, who picked apart the famed Hamilton defence in the pre-season game. Hamilton coach Ralph Sazio expects a tough game. Says Sazio: "The E.C. Lions rushed Gabler plenty in one of the earlier games and it didn't disturb him at all."

Toronto coach Bob Shaw, who has 17 newcomers on his roster, has high hopes of the Argos being a contender this year. Says Shaw: "This year I think we have some boys who really want to play."

The National Football League Champion Green Bay Packers are a two-touchdown favorite over a talent-laden college all-star squad tonight. The teams will collide in the annual charity game in Chicago. The all-stars are expected to have a good running attack with fellows like Jim Grabowski of Illinois, Roy Shivers of Utah State, Walt Garrison of Oklahoma State, Mike Garrett of Southern California and Donny Anderson of Texas Tech. Anderson and Grabowski will

play for the Packers this coming season.

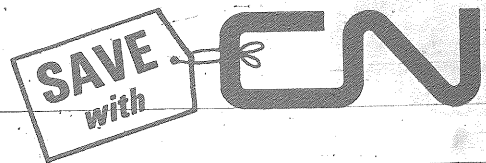

**Army Takes Over
Air Force Station**

FORT HANCOCK, N. J. — (NNS)—It's Highlands Army Air Defense Site now.

The erstwhile Highlands Air Force Station came under Army jurisdiction July 1. It is administered by Fort Hancock under Brig. Gen. Walter M. Vann, who commands both the fort and the 52d Artillery Brigade (Air Defense).

An Army Air Defense Command unit, the 52d consists of 27 Nike Hercules batteries and various control facilities, one of which is a Missile Master installation at the newly designated Highlands site.

The Missile Master integrates and controls 19 Nike Hercules missile batteries deployed in the defense of the New York-Philadelphia area.

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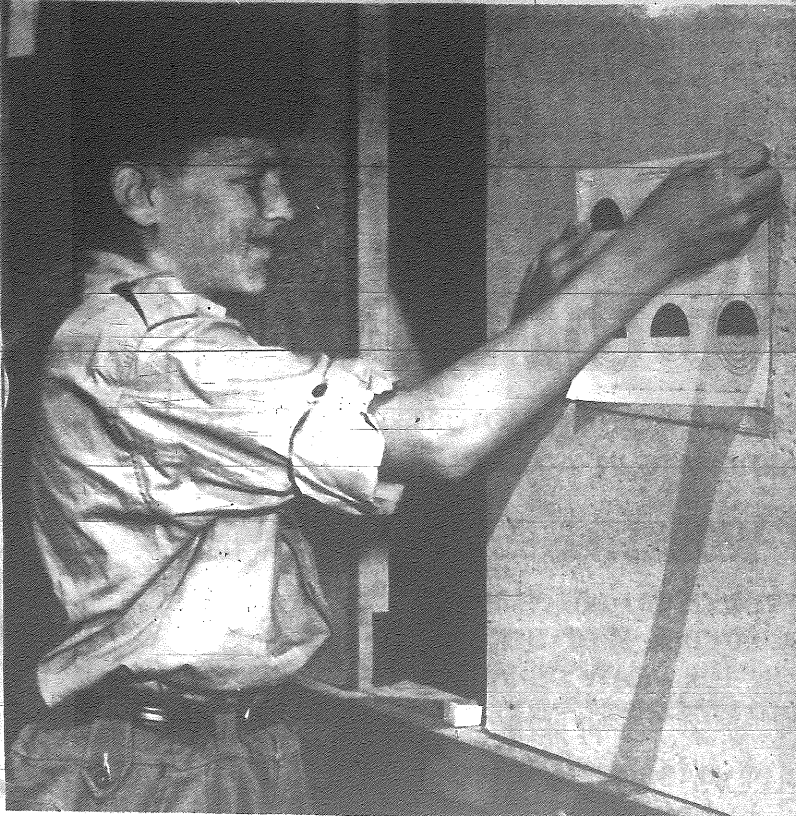

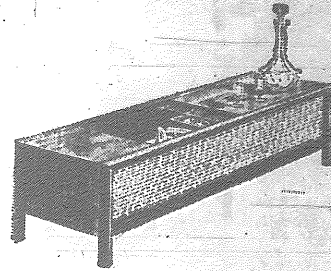
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FORMER RESIDENTS TO NEW O-M MILL POSTS

Sixteen-month-old Lisa Parker of Georgetown, Prince Edward Island, first had the stimulator or pacemaker inserted at the hospital when she was two weeks old. She had to return twice for emergency adjustments.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Parker, and two brothers, moved to Toronto from the Prince Edward Island home in March to be near the Hospital.

Mrs. Parker said Lisa had been off the pacemaker for five weeks before her death yesterday. She said the child came down with a cold and was taken to hospital Monday.

DEBENTURE BY-LAW BY-LAW NO. 29

The Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools of the Improvement District of Sioux Narrows.
 A By-Law to authorize the borrowing of \$16,840.73 upon debentures to pay part of the cost of construction of a building to serve for lodging of employees.

WHEREAS The Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools of the Improvement District of Sioux Narrows, by By-Law No. 27, authorized the construction of a building to serve for lodging of employees on Lot KM 95, Township of Willingdon,

AND WHEREAS The Minister of Municipal Affairs by his commitment to make loan No. L-776 dated the 18th day of March, 1966 approved the making of a loan under the Municipal Works Assistance Act, in the amount of \$22,454.31, bearing interest at the rate of 5-3/4% per annum, repayable over a term not exceeding 20 years.

AND WHEREAS The Board by an application for a payment on a loan dated the 5th day of January, 1966, has requested the Minister of Municipal Affairs to make a final payment on a loan in the amount of \$22,454.31.

AND WHEREAS The Minister of Municipal Affairs has requested the Board of Trustees to deliver to him a debenture of the Board in the principal amount of \$16,840.73 bearing interest at the rate of 5-3/4% per annum, certified as to validity by the Ontario Municipal Board, as security for the repayment of the above loan and it is now deemed expedient to authorize the issue and delivery of such a debenture.

NOW THEREFORE The Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools of the Improvement District of Sioux Narrows ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT money shall be borrowed on the credit of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools of the Improvement District of Sioux Narrows at large by the issue of a debenture of the Board in the principal amount of \$16,840.73. The said Debenture shall bear interest at the rate of 5-3/4% per annum, calculated yearly, not in advance and payable on the 1st day of September in each year of the currency of the Debenture.
2. THAT the said Debenture shall be dated the 1st day of September 1966 and shall be payable in 20 equal annual payments of principal and interest combined of \$1,394.64 each, on the 1st day of September in each of the years 1967 to 1986 inclusive, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be as set forth in Schedule "A" hereto, which is hereby declared to be and to form part of this By-Law.
3. THAT the said payments of principal and interest combined shall be payable in lawful money of Canada by cheques sent through the post to the registered address of the registered owner of the Debentures, and such cheques shall be payable at par in Toronto or Montreal at the option of the payee.
4. THAT the said Debenture shall be sealed with the seal of the Board and shall be signed by the Chairman or by some other person authorized by By-Law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer.
5. THAT there shall be levied and collected in each of the years 1967 to 1986 inclusive, by a special rate sufficient therefor, over and above all other rates and in the same manner and from the like persons and property, by, from, upon or out of which other separate school rates may be levied and collected by the said Board, such respective sums and such yearly amount as may be necessary to pay the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in the years 1967 to 1986 both inclusive, as set forth in the fifth column of Schedule "A" attached hereto.
6. THAT the Debenture in the principal amount of \$16,840.73 and the interest thereon shall be and same are made a charge upon all school property and premises and any other real or personal property vested in the board and upon all the separate property vested in the board and upon all the separate school rates until the said Debenture, together with all interest thereon, shall have been fully paid and satisfied.
7. THAT the Debenture be sold to the Treasurer of Ontario on the condition that he shall not sell or otherwise dispose of the debenture except after the expiration of six months from the dispatch by the Treasurer of Ontario to the Treasurer of the Board, by registered mail, of a notice of intention to sell or otherwise dispose thereof; but any subsequent holder, subject to compliance with any conditions arising as a result of registration of the debenture, may sell or dispose thereof without notice to the Board.
8. THAT the said debenture shall contain a clause providing for the registration thereof pursuant to section 323 of the Municipal Act.
9. THAT application shall be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for the approval of this By-Law and for the certification of the debenture to be issued thereunder pursuant to Part IV of the Ontario Municipal Board Act.
10. THAT the Chairman and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to do all things and to execute all documents and other papers in the name of the Board in order to carry out the provisions of this By-Law and the Treasurer is authorized to affix the seal of the Board to all such documents and papers.
11. THAT all the provisions of By-Law No. 27, not consistent with the provisions of this By-Law are hereby repealed.
