The number of candidates for the job of Conservative Party Leader now stands at eleven. The party's present leader, John Diefenbaker, had his nomination papers filed just minutes before today's 10:00 a.m. deadline. The eleventh entry is Mrs. Mary Walker Sawka of Toronto, the 51-year-old president of a movie-producing company. None of the other candidates had any immediate comment on Mr. Diefenbaker's decision to contest the post he has held for eleven years. In a brief statement to newsmen, the 71-year-old Saskatchewan lawyer made it plain that he is still insisting on the convention reversing the so-called two-nation policy. Mr. Diefenbaker said he cannot consider being a candidate for the Conservative leadership if that concept remains a policy of the party. He added that the question should be placed before the convention delegates before voting for the leadership takes place. The 2,400 delegates cast their ballots tomorrow in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens.

### DISASTER!

TORONTO — The old master strategist, John Diefenbaker, today announced himself as a candidate for the job he still holds — the leadership of the Progressive Conservative Party.

His nomination papers were officially filed with the leadership convention in Toronto, but whether the "chief" actually is a candidate remains in doubt.

Mr. Diefenbaker issued a statement saying he cannot consider being a candidate if the two-nation concept for Canada remains party policy. Then convention co-chairman E. A. Goodman called a news conference to announce that the policy committee will not reconvene to reconsider the two-nation resolution.

Mr. Diefenbaker told newsmen a question as vital as this should be put before the convention delegates for final decision, before voting on the leadership takes place. But Mr. Goodman says the convention agenda will not be altered.

That throws the ball back to Mr. Diefenbaker. The party leader told newsmen that his nomination papers were

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Mrs. Sawka, 51-year-old president of a movie-producing company, had announced her intention earlier, and was able to get the required minimum of 25 voting delegates' signatures in time to file.

None of the other candidates had any immediate comment on Mr. Diefenbaker's decision to run.

In a brief statement handed to newsmen on the 16th floor, Mr. Diefenbaker made it plain that he still is insisting on the convention reversing the two-nations policy before tomorrow's balloting begins. The statement said: "I remain unchanged and unwavering in my opposition. I cannot consider being a candidate for the leadership of this party if that concept remains a policy of the party." Mr. Diefenbaker's statement added:

"A question as vital as this should be placed before the convention delegates for final decision before voting takes place."

Formal nominations will be held at Maple Leaf Gardens at 2:30 p.m. (E.D.T.) today. Proposers and seconders will be permitted to speak for eight and four minutes respectively.

At 7:30 p.m., the convention Plenary Session will hear speeches to a maximum of 19 minutes from each candidate. The voting starts tomorrow at 1:00 p.m.

## Late News Bulletins

VANCOUVER—Police in Vancouver are searching for two bandits who took 50-thousand dollars today in a precision-like robbery of a Credit Union office. The bandits, one armed with a shotgun, raided the Credit Union office as employees arrived for work about 8:30 a.m. Witnesses say the men wore construction workers' clothing and appeared to have arrived for work as they made chalk marks, strung ribbons and inspected the building near Broadway and Main. As two employees left the building, one of the men tossed a quantity of pepper, which struck the eyes of a woman. The holdup men grabbed a money satchel and vanished into busy morning rush hour traffic in the mid-town area.

Edmonton—Premier Manning said today that a telegram he sent to John Diefenbaker in Toronto did not say anything about leadership or leadership support. Mr. Manning said in an interview that it was purely a congratulatory telegram, sent to Mr. Diefenbaker because of his "positive stand for a united and strong Canada." The Alberta Premier said it seemed to him that many of the policy discussions at the leadership convention were made on the basis of what would receive the most leadership votes. He said Mr. Diefenbaker took a positive stand on principle and he deserved to be congratulated.

The British Trades Union Congress has given the labor party a rousing vote of confidence, despite differences with its leader, Prime Minister Harold Wilson. The T.U.C. winding up its week-long conference, adopted a resolution reaffirming its backing for the labor government with a loud chorus of approval.

U.S. and North Korean Communist guards scuffled today during an Armistice Commission Meeting at Panmunjon. The scuffle occurred as the North Koreans said they killed four U.N. Command soldiers in alleged attacks on the truce line guard posts manned by the communists. Dozens of U.S. and North Korean soldiers rushed to back up their men after an American, Private Bruce Lambert, exchanged blows with a Communist guard. Lambert said the guard struck him when he brushed against a weapons display.

Two authoritative Cairo newspaper Al Ahram says the Chief U.N. Truce Observer, General Odd Bull, has proposed to Egyptian officials that the number of truce observers stationed along the Suez Canal be increased. The newspaper added that General Bull also suggested certain steps to make implementation of the ceasefire agreement more effective. The U.N. official flew to Cairo yesterday following recent clashes between Israeli and Egyptian troops in the Canal Zone.

Two Montreal City departments were held to have committed incontestable negligence, by a city inquiry set up following a multi-million-dollar fire last month in east-end Montreal. The fire occurred at a petroleum storage depot owned by Calx Limited. The departments criticized by the inquiry are the Fire Department and the Permits and Inspection Department. The chairman of the city's executive committee, Lucien Saulnier, said that recommendations for future action are expected in a few days. Mr. Saulnier said the company was using some installations which did not meet with specifications of a city

**CABBAGE JOES, CROWD PLEASER**

The starting whistle has sounded, and fans of the professional football leagues or local squad pile into the stands to watch the gridiron tactics of their favourite teams.

Four quarters later, the crowd heads for the nearest refreshment headquarters, which may very likely be your kitchen, to eat and discuss

the plays made by the game's hero. You, too can be a "football hero" or at least chalk up extra points with the crowd. Cabbage Joes and Chili Dogs are crowd-pleasing sandwiches that win no matter which team scored the victory. The best part about them is you won't have to stay home to prepare them and miss all the action.

Plank these zesty sandwiches with crunchy dill pickles. Serve mounds of chewy chocolate brownies and sticky taffy apples. Then don't be surprised when your "home field" becomes the site for frequent after-the-game quarterbacking sessions.

**CABBAGE JOES**

- 1½ pounds ground beef chuck
  - 1 tablespoon shortening
  - 1 cup Heinz Tomato Ketchup
  - 3 tablespoons chopped onion
  - 1 teaspoon Heinz Prepared Mustard
  - ¾ teaspoon salt
  - ¾ teaspoon pepper
  - 2 cups finely shredded cabbage
  - 12 sandwich buns, toasted, buttered
- Brown beef chuck in shortening. Stir in ketchup and next 4 ingredients; heat. Quickly combine meat mixture with cabbage. Spoon scant ¼ cup filling on each bun; serve immediately. Makes 12 sandwiches.

Note: To prepare ahead of time, brown the ground beef then combine with ketchup, mustard and seasonings, and refrigerate. Shred the cabbage, cover well and refrigerate. At serving time, reheat the meat mixture and stir in the cabbage at the last minute.

# 13 Forest Fires Burning Today In Province

TORONTO — Thirteen forest fires are reported burning in Ontario today.

Sudbury district has five fires, Kenora and Port Arthur two each, and Sioux Lookout, Fort Frances, Chapleau and White River one each.

In the past 24 hours, ten new fires were reported and two extinguished.

Fire danger rating is extreme in the Sioux Lookout, Fort Frances and

Kenora districts. It is high at Port Arthur, Geraldton, Kapuskasing, White River, Chapleau, Sudbury, North Bay and Pembroke.

All other districts have moderate fire danger ratings.

was investigated. Personnel of that Detachment have arrested and charged one 16 year old female for the offence. She is to appear in Magistrate's Court at a later date.

Four reports of "Theft", three "Illegal Entry", two "Break, Enter and Theft", one "Willful Damage" and one "Alleged Theft" are presently under investigation and the various areas. Thirty-eight other occurrences were reported, investigated and completed by personnel of the three Detachments.

Thirteen charges for various infractions under the Liquor Control Act were laid — 4 "Intoxicated", 3 "Having", 2 "Prohibited Person" and 3 "Minor Consuming".

Kenora Detachment investigated 5 motor vehicle accidents on highways in the area with property damage amounting to \$6,310.00. Fortunately only one person was injured and had to be taken to the Kenora General Hospital. His injuries were not of a serious nature. Two charges were laid as a result of two of these accidents — 1 "Impaired Driving" and 1 "Improper Passing".

Sioux Narrows Detachment investigated a two vehicle accident with damage amounting to \$2,000.00. A charge of "Careless Driving" was laid as a result of this accident.

Minaki Detachment reported no motor vehicle accidents for the week.

Members of the three Detachments on patrol issued 59 warnings and safety checked 109 vehicles. 7 charges were laid under the Highway Traffic Act for various infractions.

### HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION SPEED ZONES WILL BE ENFORCED BY O.P.P.

Following the recent announcement by the Honourable George E. Gomme, Minister of Highways, regarding recent amendments to the Ontario Highway Traffic Act, affecting Special Speed Zones for highway construction areas —

Assistant Commissioner J. L. Needham of the Ontario Provincial Police, Traffic Division, announces the immediate enforcement of this new legislation.

Motorists can now expect to see official regulatory speed signs, at all highway construction sites on major traffic arteries throughout the province.

It is important to remember that

the location of these signs and the speeds indicated, could vary hourly, as the construction zone progresses.

It is therefore incumbent upon all motorists to be aware of the posted speed limits within the construction area and comply.

"These new regulations will be strictly enforced at all construction sites in the interest of safety and any violation could bring fines up to \$200.00 and license suspension of up to 6 months," Assistant Commissioner Needham said.

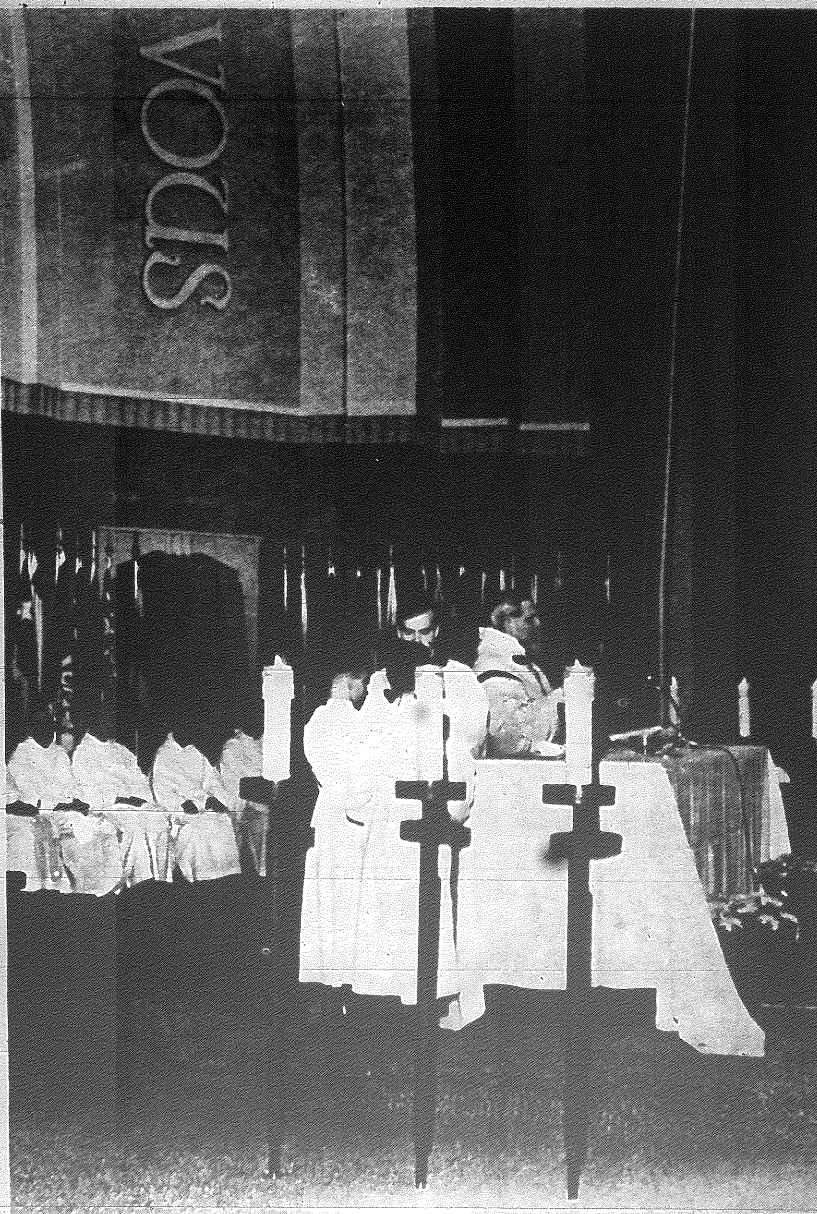

### Experienced Can Lose Way In Our Woods

Every year, children and adults become lost in the woods and even experienced bush travellers can become turned around for a few hours or a few days.

Missing persons, and the initiation and organization of searches for them, are the responsibility, in this province, of the Ontario Provincial Police. Frequently, local search and rescue organizations and Lands and Forests staff, are asked to assist police in organizing and conducting searches. All of these people are highly trained and chances of lost persons being found are excellent.

The question is: how long will the search take and how well prepared are you, if you are the lost one, to look after yourself until found? By stating your destination, before setting out, you could have the searchers a great deal of time — if they knew where, approximately, to start looking.

Matches, an axe, knife, map or compass are valuable items and can be friends-in-need to the lost person who knows how to use them.

Some people find that being alone in the woods, out of sight of others, is a strange and frightening experience. This is a common feeling, but a dangerous one. It is wise to fight this

panic become the grip of disaster.

Memorize these few simple rules and use them if you do happen to become lost.

- **STOP, SIT DOWN,** try to figure out where you are. Use your head, not your legs. If you know approximately where you are, and you have a map and compass, you may be able to determine a course to a known landmark. If you do not know where you are, a map and compass are of no use to you.

- **BUILD A SAFE FIRE** as soon as you can. Dead branches from standing trees make excellent fire wood. Use dry birch bark or fine spruce or balsam branches to start the fire. Save your matches.

- **Make your fire** in a clearing (it is safer and easier to spot from the air), preferably on the edge of a lake or stream. Clear away all flammable material. Pile enough brush a safe distance from the fire, to serve as a signal. Remember, searchers will not see flames but will be looking for smoke.

- **STAY WHERE YOU ARE.** Use your energy for finding food and tending fires. Make a shelter where there is protection from the wind. Keep your clothes dry. Keep busy with camp chores, it keeps your mind active and alert.

- **You can eat** the middle shoots of edible plants and ferns, berries, etc. Shoe laces can be used to make snares for rabbits and chipmunks.

Above all — don't take chances with fire. Relax. The search party will be along shortly.

Eight workmen appeared with a truck and began to move out the books. They finished Wednesday night.

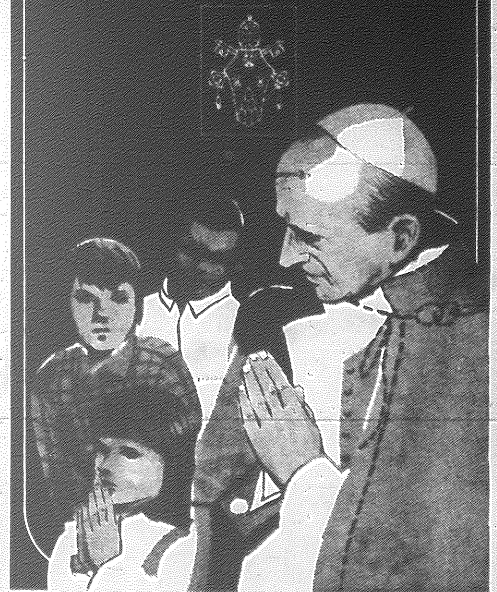
Among McLaughlin's treasures was a 14th century manuscript, a first edition of Byron's "Don Juan," and other valuable editions.

## Local Ladies Top Bridge Pairs In City

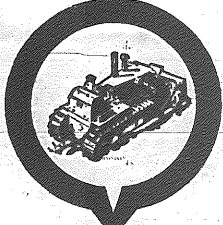
