Bernier Re-Elected With Overwhelming Majority

Leo Bernier, Progressive Conservative candidate in the Kenora riding rode through to an easy victory Tuesday, taking an early lead when the first couple of polls were heard from and never looking back until the final whistle was blown at 10:15 p.m. last evening. With 130 polls out of a possible 131 heard from, Bernier had a total of 8,263, followed in second place by Bob Clark, N.D.P. who tallied 4,076 and trailing in third was Liberal-Labour standard bearer Ted Harding with 1,910.

The only remaining poll to hear from is the remote Sachigo Lake Indian Reservation and it is expected later today.

With fourteen polls heard from by 8:15 last evening Bernier was leading with 420 votes, Clark had 202 and Harding's total read 87. At the end of forty polls it was Bernier 3811, Clark 975 and Harding 465; when 55 polls were heard from at 9:10 p.m. the totals were Bernier 5,244, Clark 2573 and Harding 1186 and at the end of 100 polls the score read Bernier 6254, Clark 3070 and Harding 1454.

Due to the redistribution of seats the number of eligible voters in the Kenora riding was reduced by about 1,500, however, out of a possible 22,000 voters there was a total of 14,163 voters cast and with the 130 polls heard from Bernier's majority over Clark was 4,187 and he had

2,277 votes more than both his opponents added together. In the September, 1966 by-election 15,173 voters turned out and gave Bernier 6,325, Clark 4,376 and Francis, Liberal Labour 4,452.

Contacted at his home in Hudson, following the vote count, Leo Bernier said he was gratified with the tremendous turnout of voters and the great endorsement which he had received. He paid tribute to the many workers who had aided him throughout the strenuous campaign. He said the results of the election showed that party members had made great strides in accomplishing his ambition to make all his followers proud to be Conservatives. He said there was no better time than now to start working towards the next election.

Loan Approved For Project At Ear Falls

OTTAWA—The federal government will make a \$59,000 loan to Ontario Water Resources Commission for a sewage project at Ear Falls, it was announced today by Hon. John R. Nicholson, minister responsible for Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The loan will assist in construction of approximately 1,820 linear feet of 20-inch diameter collector sewer, a temporary settling tank and outlet. The loan is based on an estimated total cost of \$88,500 for the project. Repayable over 40 years, the loan will bear interest at 6 1/2 per cent. For work completed by March 31, 1970, Central Mortgage and Housing may forgive 25 per cent of the principal and 25 per cent of the interest.

Death On Two Wheels

A motorcyclist's chances of being killed are roughly five times greater than those of an automobile driver, says an article in the October Reader's Digest. But a few sensible measures could reduce this terrible toll. In Canada, more than 108,000 motorcycles were registered in 1966, some 38,000 of them in Ontario, an increase of 46% over 1965 and of 125% over the year before. Year by year, the rate of increase in registrations and accidents has corresponded. In Ontario in 1964 there were 867 accidents involving motorcycles. In 1965 there were 2380, and for 1966 the figure shot up to 3785. On a per-mile-travelled basis, a motorcyclist's chances of being killed are about five times greater than those of an automobile driver. The full magnitude of the mayhem is not really known, for motorcycle injuries, unlike fatalities, are not reported separately from auto injuries. Even more frightening than the sheer number of accidents is the severity of the injuries. Because the motorcyclist receives little or no protection from his machine—he is on it and not in it—virtually no one walks away from a motorcycle accident. Fractures are usually multiple, with bone fragments projecting

through the skin. Although many are repairable, the result of the injuries often plagues the person for the rest of his life. Despite all this, the thrills and status that motorcycles provide at low cost to their young owners—most aged between 17 and 25—guarantee that the craze will continue.

The following three steps are needed to keep the craze from rising out of control: First, require that every cyclist be properly schooled and have a valid motorcycle driver's license; second, require both cyclist and passenger to wear effective helmets; third, improve the motorcycles themselves. There are solutions to the motorcycle safety problem. But unless a real effort is made, the same position may soon prevail as in Britain, where one of every 12 boys who gets a motorcycle at the age of 16 is killed or seriously injured by the time he is 19.

Public Library Would Appreciate Old Pictures

Services offered to citizens of this community by the Kenora Public Library continue to expand, thanks to the aggressiveness of the staff under Librarian, Miss R. Poland and the direction of the Board. For those who have not paid a visit to the Library for a few years, a brief tour would surprise and delight. The children's department is especially pleasant, while older readers will appreciate the range of books now available to them.

A new department is making great strides, under Miss Poland's direction - the microfilming of ancient documents of district concern. For example, it is possible to visit the library, and seated in comfort, read the individual pages of the Miner and News from 1894 to 1919, projected on the screen. Miss Poland has requested assistance from citizens who have printed matter containing significant historic value which might be loaned for microfilming. She would also like to receive photos of early days for display in the Library. Thus will be preserved more of the fast-disappearing information about life in Lake of the Woods country 100 years ago.

Auld To Speak In Minnesota

TORONTO — Honourable James A. C. Auld, Ontario Minister of Tourism and Information, has been invited by the State of Minnesota to address the Governor's Conference on Tourism October 28th at St. Cloud State College, St. Cloud, Minnesota. Mr. Auld will be the only speaker, other than Governor Harold Levaund, to address the general assembly of the two-day conference which is expected to attract up to 800 persons from all industries in Minnesota to help the State Government determine the future course of the travel industry. J. Kimball Whitney, Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Economic Development, said Mr. Auld was invited because of what he said was "the excellent success enjoyed by the Province of Ontario in the promotion of and attraction of U.S. and Canadian visitors."

NEWS in BRIEF

OTTAWA — The Crown-owned Industrial Development Bank reports that it had loans and investments totalling \$33,541,000 dollars on September 30th, that compares with \$32,500,000 dollars a month earlier. The bank makes loans and investments in small and medium industry that cannot find financing in commercial channels.

CAMDEN, New Jersey — The Campbell Soup Company reports that, despite a three-and-a-half-per-cent increase in sales, its earnings in the fiscal year 1967 were eight and nine-tenths below last year. Earnings were more than 48 million dollars, compared to 53 million in the previous fiscal year.

Heavy Balloting Returns Conservative Government

NEW YORK — The Johns-Manville Company was down in the third quarter of this year. From seven and one-half million dollars or 89 cents a share. That compared with ten and one-half million or \$124 a share in the third quarter of 1966.

MONTREAL — The head of the Expo International Trade Centre says the value of the centre can be judged only on a long-term basis. Keith Hillyer says in an interview that the centre already has established almost 30 thousand business contracts. Most of these were between foreign executives and Canadian manufacturers.

TORONTO — The Progressive Conservatives have won another election victory in Ontario. Premier John Roberts led his party to victory yesterday but with a reduced majority. Two veteran cabinet ministers were among the losers. A surprisingly heavy vote gave the Conservatives 28 seats in the enlarged 117-seat legislature. The Liberals captured 28 seats and the New Democratic Party 21.

The result gave the Conservatives a 21-seat majority over the combined opposition compared to a 46-seat majority in 1963. The Conservative support declined to 42 per cent in the popular vote from 49 and the Liberals to 32 per cent from 35. Their loss went to the NDP, which leaped to 23 per cent from 18. The NDP almost tripled the seven seats it won four years ago. Final outcome with comparisons from the two previous elections:

He declined any direct comment on the results. Thanking party workers in his home city of Leamington, where he scored another personal win, he said his government would go back to work "at the same old stand".

A cabinet session was called tomorrow morning where one of the main topics will be the reappointment of municipal affairs minister Wilfrid Spence and Miss Minister George Wardrobe.

Mr. Spence lost Cochrane South in Bill Ferris, a young United Farmers' Minister running in the NDP ticket. Mr. Wardrobe, 63 next month was defeated in Port Arthur by Liberal Ron Smith, another new candidate.

Liberal leader Robert Hood, a 39-year-old former high school teacher elected to his post only last January, said he had expected "a better showing by the party. But he assured voters that his party

EDITORIAL

THE MESSAGE IS CLEAR

Premier John Roberts is "back in business at the same old stand" today, supported in the south on the issue of provincial confederation. In the north, the election issue was quite different: a challenge to the Premier's favorite slogan, "Ontario - the Province of Opportunity". Evidently growing numbers of voters protested the ever-strengthening economic grip of the south and the diminishing growth rate in the north. Mines Minister Wardrobe and Municipal Affairs Minister Spooner were defeated; the former at Port Arthur and the latter in Cochrane South. The NDP won the new riding of Thunder Bay; the Liberal candidate Pat Reid won Rainy River in a riding known as "Noden country".

With a single exception, Port William, where James Jessiman won a narrow victory over the NDP, did a Government candidate show strength in the North-West. That exception, of course, is Kenora.

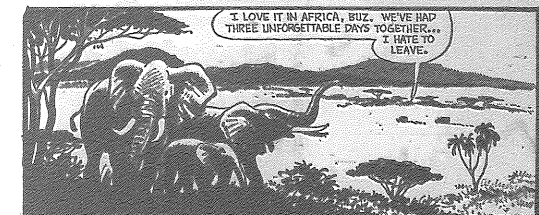
Leo Bernier's victory must be termed, "amazing". His vote exceeded the combined total of Liberal and NDP candidates by almost 2,900 in a riding which has traditionally provided "grandstand finishes". The analysts in Toronto must be searching for answers.

Mr. Bernier's sensational vote was a personal triumph; recognition of his abilities and his friendly, approachable manner. It takes nothing from him, however, to add that such a statement hardly explains his phenomenal endorsement. The reason, we believe, is found in the September, 1966 by-election campaign.

Only one issue interested voters a year ago - what will Queen's Park do to assist the Northwest? What will the Roberts Government do to include Kenora in the areas of opportunity so successfully exploited in the south? Voters listened when Leo Bernier asked for a chance to tell Parliament, as a fellow member of the Government of our needs. The vote then, was an expression of confidence in his performance of the past 12 months, backed with a directive to continue to voice the seriousness of the north's darkening economic outlook.

Yesterday's vote will surely impress Premier Roberts with the solidarity of citizens on the issue of opportunity for the Northwest. Party differences have been submerged. In order to state the message in the clearest manner possible, Mr. Roberts could indicate his appreciation of our position by appointing Leo Bernier to a senior cabinet post. Such an answer by Mr. Roberts would do much to contain the growing concern in this district; is logical and necessary. Not since the late Peter Heenan gave such outstanding service to Ontario, has Kenora enjoyed cabinet representation.
