

NEW LOAN PROGRAM FOR INDIAN RESERVE HOUSING

Indian Affairs Minister Arthur Laing announced today a new program to improve the quality of houses being built on Indian Reserves. The Minister said, "Arrangements have been made with Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to provide extra housing funds for loans to employed Indians who live in reserve communities."

Under the existing \$112,000,000 Reserve Improvement Program the Department may make a grant to the applicant's income, to a maximum of \$7,000 for a house. Any additional cost must be paid by the family or the band. The new plan will enable the Indian family to borrow additional funds and to build larger or better houses.

Up until now Indians could only get CMHC supplemental financing for houses on reserve communities when the loans were backed by the band funds. Under the new plan, the Department of Indian Affairs will guarantee the loans and Indians who are members of bands with limited funds will now be able to take advantage of the program. The Minister said that both the Department and CMHC had been concerned about the problem of financing better quality reserve housing. "This new program will

go a long way to enabling employed Indians to live in the Reserve Communities where they can be of great help to their fellow band members", Mr. Laing said.

A number of applications have already been made for assistance and the Minister said he hopes that the first loan will be processed and approved in a few days' time. Each Indian who takes advantage of the program must be recommended by his Band Council and in cases of default, the property reverts to the Council.

Completes Quarter Century At Kenora Post Office

Making the presentation in a brief ceremony was Mr. F. J. Bilecki, Superintendent of Operations, Winnipeg District Office.

Born and educated in Kenora, Ontario, Miss Allan entered the postal service on June 9th, 1942 as a temporary postal assistant, and on Sep-

tember 6th, 1942 she became a member of the permanent staff.

Mr. Bilecki, in his remarks, said that Miss Allan has performed her work willingly and with a minimum of "time off". He said she was highly regarded by all fellow members of the staff and always has a ready smile for the customers at the post office.

Firemen Out On Two Calls

At 11 p.m. Wednesday, an off-duty fireman, driving towards Kenora saw smoke coming from the lakeshore area behind the James Block on Main Street South. Investigating, he found a fire burning in an unoccupied cabin near the lake and immediately turned in the alarm. The cabins are occupied during the summer months but are closed each fall. Damage was not extensive.

At 8 a.m. firemen were summoned to the Panda Cafe where a troublesome grease fire was burning in the kitchen. This blaze was soon extinguished.

LIBRARY IS OPEN TOMORROW WITH SPACIOUS RE-ARRANGEMENT

Patrons who have been unable to use the Kenora Public Library during the past week because of the extensive re-arrangement of furniture and stacks which has taken

place will find the waiting worthwhile. The library will reopen tomorrow morning and will resume the usual hours and all its services. The rearrangement project was undertaken in an effort to give better services to the students and to make available to adults a small quiet reading area, Miss Roselynn Poland, chief-librarian, explains.

The recent increase in circulation and memberships and the addition of new materials and books made it necessary to plan the most effective use of available space. When the library opens in the morning the public will find that the checkout desk has been moved to the east wall of the building and immediately across

The separate adult reading room in the southwest part of the building boasts comfortable chairs, is carpeted and has a relaxed home-like atmosphere. Its windows overlook a Lake of the Woods scene. To accommodate students, Mr. J. Forbes arranged to keep the Lakewood library open from Monday through Thursday of this week. The staff and board are appreciative of this co-operation and of the patience of the public during the necessary closing of the main floor facilities while the work was done.

Late News Bulletins

There is speculation in Ottawa that Prime Minister Pearson will announce a retirement date soon after a federal-provincial conference early next year. The conference is a success. The purpose of the conference will be to work out a plan to place a bill of rights in the constitution. The speculation is that if the conference should fail, Mr. Pearson might feel he will have to stay on for a while longer. Canadian Press Correspondent Dave McIntosh reports that while the 70-year-old Prime Minister has given no public indication when he plans to retire, the Liberal Leadership Campaign is in full swing. There are four contenders—Finance Minister Sharp, External Affairs Minister Martin, Registrar-General Turner and Transport Minister Hellyer. All four men are scheduled to attend the Alberta Liberal Convention in Edmonton this weekend.

In the Netherlands . . . Premier Pijt De Jong reported to parliament today on his government's decision to end its current aviation agreement with Canada. The decision followed the failure to obtain landing rights in Toronto for KLM, Royal Dutch Airlines, which now has landing rights in Montreal only. The government's decision still requires parliamentary approval. Premier De Jong tabled a letter today saying Canada had rejected a "moderate and reasonable" adoption of the aviation agreement to present-day demands. The Dutch point out that Canadian Pacific Airlines links Amsterdam directly with five Canadian cities—Calgary, Edmonton, Montreal, Toronto, and Vancouver. There is still hope that a new agreement can be worked out.

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce says wage parity between Canadian and U.S. Auto Workers serves only to fan the fires of inflation. In a statement, President W. M. Anderson of Vancouver says inflationary pressures, if they remain unchecked, will damage our competitive position, threaten jobs and even lead to a lower standard of living for all. The Chrysler Corporation and the United Auto Workers have negotiated an agreement which will lead to eventual wage parity for Chrysler employees in the U.S. and Canada.

The first test flight of the U.S. Saturn-five moon rocket appears to be proceeding perfectly. The huge rocket was launched this morning from Cape Kennedy, with all three stages igniting as planned. It boosted a record 140-ton unmanned Apollo moonship into orbit, then drilled it far out into space. The spacecraft is to plunge back through the earth's atmosphere later today in a test of its heat shield. The Apollo craft is scheduled to land at 3:41 p.m. EST in the Pacific Ocean, 622 miles northwest of Hawaii, where it is to be recovered. The three stages of the Saturn rocket were destroyed when they re-entered the earth's atmosphere.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson's austerity policies have sparked a major revolt within his own ruling Labor party. More than 70 Laborite legislators signed a motion today calling for an immediate change in the government's policy on unemployment. Meanwhile, a national public opinion poll by a pre-Conservative newspaper shows Wilson's popularity dropping sharply.

Former Keewatin Resident Assumes Regiment Command

OTTAWA—The Lanark and Renfrew Scottish Regiment has a new commanding officer. At a recent change of command ceremony, Lieutenant-Colonel C. R. Merredew CD, of Deep River, officially took over the regiment from Lieutenant-Colonel I. E. Romanuk CD, of Appleton near Carleton Place, Ontario.

Just 35, Col. Merredew is one of the youngest commanding officers to take over a militia regiment in recent years. He has served with the Lanark and Renfrew Scottish Regiment for the past seven years. In civilian life a partner in a Pembroke law firm, Col. Merredew joined the L & R Regiment following service in the regular force as a legal officer.

Col. Merredew was born in Kenora, Ontario; received his primary education in Keewatin, Ontario and secondary school education in Winnipeg and Kenora. He attended Royal Roads Military College and the Manitoba Law School, graduating with a Bachelor of Laws degree. He is now a member of The Bar Associations of Renfrew County, Ontario and Canada.

Col. Merredew has had eighteen years of military service, starting as a gunner, while still in high school, with the 40th Medium Artillery Regiment in Kenora. **Living Costs
Dampen Buying**

Canada's consumers are in a brighter buying mood than they were three months ago or six months ago, but concern about higher prices is keeping spending enthusiasm within every narrow limits. The Financial Post reporting this, goes on to say that while the proportion of Canadian consumers, considering the present a good time to make a major outlay is up from three months ago, the improvement is very small - much smaller than the gain during the previous quarter and barely enough to bring the index of consumer buying attitudes above the level of a year ago. This, The Financial Post says, is what the consumer says now about plans to buy durables during the coming six months: Cars: Exactly 11% of consumers polled expect to buy a car this winter. This compares with 15.5% in June and 9.8% in September a year ago. Housing: The buoyant house buying plans of last spring are fast subsiding back toward year-ago low points. Rising mortgage rates, the growing shortage of mortgage funds and fast-rising house prices, The Financial Post notes, have effectively dampened buyer enthusiasm on this front. Currently only 3.1% of consumers polled is in the market for a house. This represents a considerably more-than-seasonal downswing from June's 4.7%. It compares with 2.4% a year ago, the lowest point since 1964.

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TOMMY PHILLIPS

Out of the hinterland of Kenora, formerly Rat Portage, not only came the Kenora Thistles, Stanley Cup champions, but also Tommy Phillips, who was a demon on skates. Tommy had everything good players needed, being a terrific back-checker, a stick-handling wizard and a terrific shot.



Born in Kenora on May 22nd, 1880, he played schoolboy hockey in Kenora and then attended McGill University. While east he also played for Montreal A.A.A., defeating Winnipeg Victorias for the Stanley Cup in 1903. In 1904 he attended college in Toronto and played for Marlboros, winning the O.H.A. senior title.

The following year he returned to play for Kenora and led the Thistles to a meteoric rise in hockey history. They lost a Stanley Cup try that year, in three games to Ottawa, but came back the next year, in January, to beat Montreal Wanderers 4-2 and 8-6 with Tommy scoring seven goals in the two-game series. They lost a return series in March to the same club.

Tommy played with such past greats as Art Ross, Eddie Giroux and Joe Hall. He moved to Vancouver and played for that team in the Pacific Coast League. After a successful career in Vancouver, he retired from hockey.

Phillips died in Toronto in 1923 at the age of 43.

Editor's Note---Several phone calls and the account taken from the official publication of the Hockey Hall of Fame has straightened out the controversy relating to the all time great hockey player Tommy Phillips. He is, in fact, a member of the Hockey Hall of Fame, and was one of the first nominated to this high honour.

Doctor Fees Continuing To Increase

WASHINGTON—Doctors' fees, which have increased spectacularly in the United States in the last year, are likely to continue rising sharply, government officials say.

And doctors' incomes—tops among professions—are increasing even faster than their fees. Federal officials express concern about doctor fees and other medical costs. They are encouraging such changes as more group practice by doctors and use of more physician assistants. But they say it will be years before such changes have a major impact on fees.

The medical-cost outlook for

the American public, appears grim.

Demand for doctors' services is expected to increase by one-third between 1965 and 1975, said a report on medical costs submitted to President Johnson earlier this year.

The supply of doctors for the period is expected to increase by only 17 per cent, and not

even that much for family doctors.

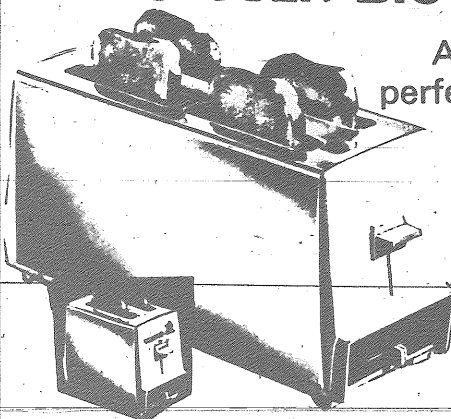
Doctors' fees increased for years at about the same pace as wages. But in 1965, they jumped 7.3 per cent. And the most Bureau of Labor Statistics figures show an increase of 8.5 per cent from August, 1966, to August this year.

Consumers ask for date stamp on frozen food

Canada's frozen-food industry has been asked to stamp all of its products with the date of freezing as a protective measure for consumers.

The Consumers Association of Canada made the request to the Canadian Food Processors Association in Ottawa and the Canadian Grocery Distributors Institute in Montreal.

It also asks that some form of chemical indicator be printed on each frozen package showing if the item was thawed at any stage between manufacturer and retailer.

The association is urging this action because of the increasing use of home freezers and the wider range of frozen foods becoming available.

If the industry does not take action the association says it will ask the federal Government to make such labelling mandatory.

Swim record for E. Germans

BERLIN — An East German team today claimed a world record, swimming the 400-metre medley relay in 3:56.5 minutes.

The East German news agency ADN said the squad — including Roland Matthes, Egon Henninger, Horst-Günter Gregor and Frank Wiegand — thus bettered by seven-tenths of a second the mark set by a U.S. team in Tokyo Aug. 31.

NHL club would top Russians, Swede says on Canadian tour

WASHINGTON — A question that has been asked in hockey circles is whether the Soviet Union's world championship would fare against the mighty National Hockey League.

P. D. Wester, general secretary of the Swedish Ice Hockey Association, feels there is no doubt "at all" that the NHL would prevail in a best-of-seven series.

Over the seven-game haul, Wester says, the professionals would prove "much superior" because of their adaptability, strong skating and shooting.

A spectator at two NHL contests during a recent trip to Canada to arrange a tour by his country's national team, Wester says the professionals don't excel in any special thing, but would soon be able to cope with Russia's pass-conscious style of play.

The outcome in a one- or two-game encounter, he says, would be in doubt because of "the random things that can happen."

But after watching a handful of NHL clashes, Wester feels there is such a "different set of values" between the professional and European styles of hockey that it is hopeless to do a fair comparison.

Brushing aside body contact as unimportant, he lauds the NHL for fast skating and strong shooting, particularly the slapshot. In Sweden, things are more sedate with

the concentration on passing and stick handling.

His personal seeding for the Olympics in Grenoble, France, Feb. 6-17 puts Russia first and Czechoslovakia second.

Canada, he says, is good on the power play and in checking "but their skating is not so good." Sweden dumped Canada 6-0 in the world tournament in Vienna last March.

Wester is not worried about NHL money luring Sweden's

best players to North America. After a brief taste of the tough professional branch of hockey, he says, Swedes will return to the slower-paced game they were raised on.

Sweden's 20-man national team arrives in Canada Christmas Eve. The tour, Wester says, is designed to give 12 newcomers to the club a taste of "real hard-games in a short time and a good strong tournament."

The Swedes will play the eastern division of Canada's national team in Hull, Que., Dec. 26; Sherbrooke Beavers Dec. 28 and in London, Ont., Dec. 29. Then they head for the world tournament in Winnipeg Jan. 1-4, for a double round-robin engagement with Russia and Canada's Winnipeg-based national team.

The tournament schedule: Jan. 1 — Canada vs. Sweden (afternoon); Jan. 2 — Sweden vs. Russia; Jan. 3 — Russia vs. Canada; Jan. 4 — Canada vs. Sweden; Jan. 5 — Sweden

vs. Russia; Jan. 6 — Russia vs. Canada.

En route home, the Russians will play a Western

Canada Junior League all-star team in Edmonton Jan. 8 and Canada's eastern national team in Ottawa Jan. 9.

Four other teams will also tour Canada. The Romanian national team will play in St. John's Nfld., Dec. 1; Moncton, N.B., Dec. 3; Saint John, N.B., Dec. 5; Drummondville, Que., Dec. 6; in the Ottawa area Dec. 8; Canada's national team in Winnipeg Dec. 10; Brandon Dec. 11; Fort William Dec. 13; Canada's eastern national team in Hull Dec. 14; Sault Ste. Marie Dec. 17 and in Ontario Dec. 19.

The Italian national team will play in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens Jan. 7; North Bay Jan. 8 and in the Montreal area Jan. 10.

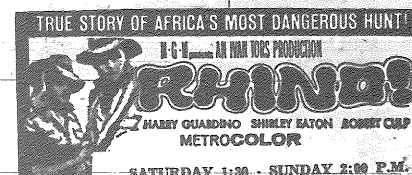
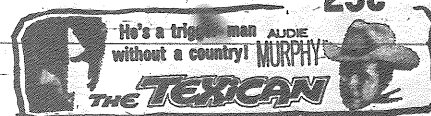

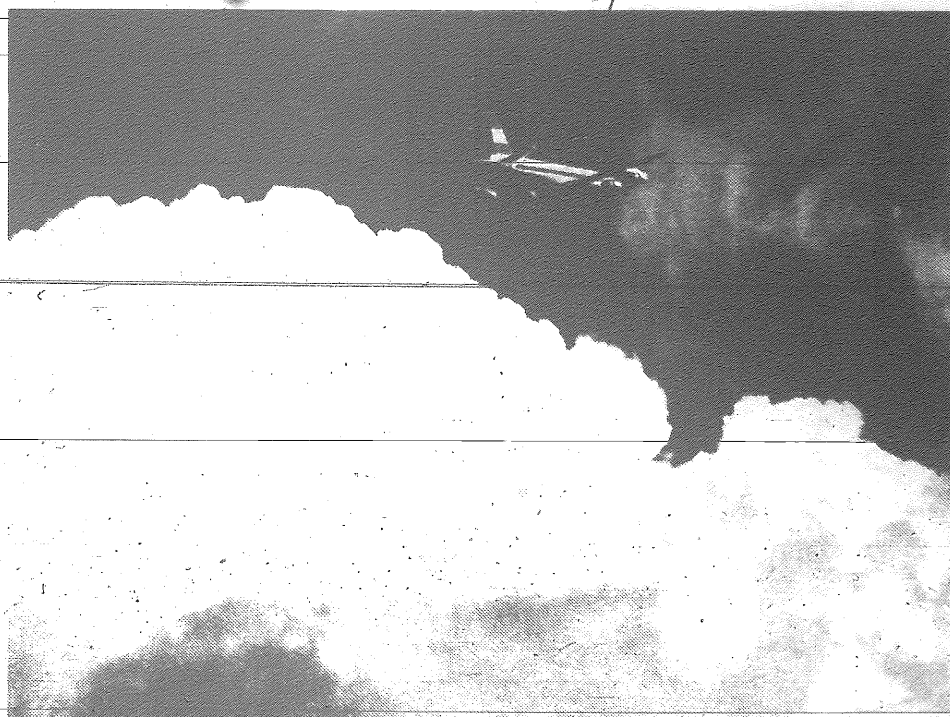

**Hospitals
Classified
By New Act**

New legislation under Ontario Public Hospitals Act, filed October 17th, 1967, sets all hospitals in Ontario into classifications.

There are nine classifications: Group A hospitals being general hospitals providing facilities for giving instruction to university medical students of any university; Group B hospitals being general hospitals having not fewer than 100 beds or fewer than 100 beds and being in a municipality where a Group A hospital is located; Group C are general hospitals not located where a Group A hospital is located and having fewer than 100 beds; Group D are general hospitals operated by Ontario Division of Canadian Red Cross Society; Group E are convalescent hospitals; Group F are hospitals for chronic patients and having not fewer than 200 beds; Group G comprise hospitals for chronic patients and having fewer than 200 beds; Group H consists of psychiatric hospitals providing facilities for giving instruction to medical students of any university; and Group I are hospitals for treatment of patients suffering from alcoholism and drug addiction.

Listed in Group B are McKellar, St. Joseph's and Port Arthur general hospitals.

In Group C are general hospitals at Atikokan, Dryden, Geraldton, Kenora, Manitouwadge, Marathon, Nipigon, Sioux Lookout and Wawa.

In Group D are Red Cross outposts at Beardmore, Rainy River and Red Lake.

Westmount Hospital in Fort William is in Group E.

Listed also under Group G is Westmount, along with chronic patient units at McKellar and Dryden District General as well as St. Joseph's, Port Arthur.

U.S. Aircraft Firm's Licence Is Suspended

Bohman Airways of Ranier, Minn., has had its Canadian licence suspended for two months by the Canadian Transport Commission for alleged violation of moose hunting in Ontario and Manitoba.

United States charter aircraft that hunt moose by spotting them from the air and then landing hunting parties in the area are violating their Canadian operating licence. The specific regulation is that U.S. charter flights into Canada must not transport traffic within Canada, they are limited to flying passengers to a destination point and bringing them back.

Earlier in the summer, the commission ordered Frank Bohman, who owns the service, to show cause why his licence should not be suspended or cancelled.

Mr. Bohman said that he had changed his method of operation to meet an earlier board objection. He said he used to fly his clients across the border and leave them in a Canadian hunting camp. If they found hunting poor, he would pick them up and fly them around until he spotted some moose.

When he found that the procedure was not permitted under his licence, he wrote to the Board in 1963 applying to relief from the condition. The Board refused.

Mr. Bohman said that he had changed his operation to make moose hunting a one flight operation. He flies across the border and keeps flying until they spot a herd, then sets the plane down nearby.

Mr. Bohman suggested that rival Canadian charter services in Fort Frances were behind the Board action. Three outfits in Canada are unhappy about the foreign competition, he said.

A majority of his business involves fights between the U.S. and Canada.

A number of Canadian charter services outside Fort Frances submitted testimony to the Air Transport Board on Mr. Bohman's behalf. They stated that as a result of his flights there are indications that this has resulted in an increase in tourist business.

Mr. Bohman has the only U.S.-based service in the area and last year transported 1,316 passengers on 452 flights into Northwestern Ontario. The figure represents more than any of the three competitors on the Canadian side of the border.

Personal Income Tax The Target?

Federal officials have begun a detailed study of the different forms a tax increase next month might take—if the government decides this is needed to stall the inflationary rise of prices, according to a report in The Financial Post. Because there may be a tax change soon, a form of pre-budget secrecy has fallen over the Finance Department. But this essentially appears to be the situation facing Finance Minister Mitchell Sharp and his advisers: A tax increase would be intended both to raise revenues and to take some of the steam out of the inflationary rate of economic expansion. But, The Financial Post points out, Mr. Sharp is understood to be anxious at all costs to avoid doing any-

thing that will damage the competitive position of Canadian industry at a time when tariff protection is dropping both at home and abroad. The Financial Post says this would seem to indicate that the increase should come from the personal income tax field rather than the corporate.

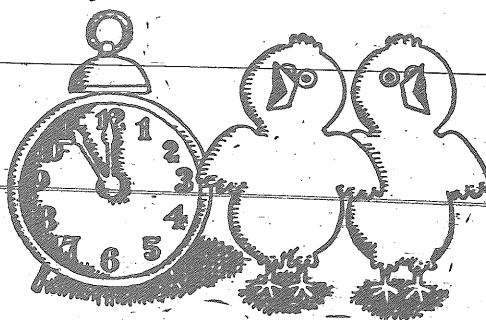

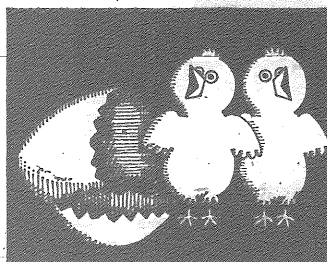

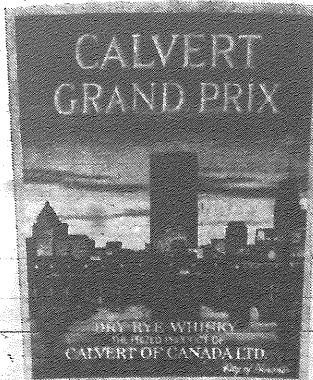
