COURSE CHOICES IN SECONDARY SCHOOLS

'Tis Spring again!!! The seed catalogues are being scanned in order to choose for this year's planting. And, too, the Grade Eight pupils are looking through registration forms, choosing courses and options for their next school year in Kenora's Secondary Schools. This presents a problem to many in that there are choices.

For most Grade Eight pupils the basic choice is between three courses: 1. Science, Technology and Trades (S.T. and T.), 2. Business and Commerce (B. and C.) and 3. Arts and Science (A. and S.).

Within each of these courses, after Grade Nine, there is a division into two "streams", the one, a five-year stream and the other a four-year stream. The decision as to a four or five-year stream is not made until the pupil has been in Grade Nine for one year.

For most Grade Eight pupils, therefore, the choice is between the three major courses for their Grade Nine programme of studies.

In all three major courses, the pupil studies the same subjects for eighty percent of the time. That is, the pupil arbitrarily is given English, History, Geography, Physical and Health Education, Mathematics, Science, Guidance and French in all three courses. These are established by the Department of Education. In the remaining twenty percent of the time, the pupil

is given a choice of what are termed optional subjects.

The optional subjects in the S.T. and T. course are Technical subjects and Home Economics; in the

Lake Level Low But Near Last Season's Mark

Kenora will be looking for April showers early this year, as the thaw of recent days has revealed just how little snow we've had this season. While one big storm could change this story, today's account of precipitation reveals that the most snow on the ground during the winter has been 22 inches. (Slightly over 2 inches of water)

The Lake level is holding well, though. At Keewatin today the gauge reading stood at 1036.85 feet. Last year's low came about March 28th with a reading of 1036.76 feet. Water outflow today is about 12,000 cfs, at the two powerhouses, with an additional trickle escaping at the Keewatin mill site. Inflow is starting, which is in addition to the 5,500 cfs entering the Lake at Fort Frances.

Body Found In Snow At Grassy Narrows

The body of twenty-nine year old Mary Loon, a resident of the Grassy Narrows Indian reservation, some fifty miles northeast of Kenora, Ontario, was found lying in the snow at 8:30 a.m. Thursday.

Ontario Provincial Police, at Kenora, who investigated the incident said that it was apparent that the woman had attempted to walk through the snow from the reservation to the Jones Road, a distance of about three miles and had become overcome. Death is believed due to exposure.

Water Levels To Be Discussed

The International Rainy Lake Board of Control and the International Lake of the Woods Control Board announced today that they will hold open meetings with persons interested in lake levels within the areas under their jurisdiction in International Falls, on April 4 and in Warroad on April 5.

The International Falls meeting, which will pertain to the Rainy Lake area will take place at 1:30 p.m., in the Falls Community Building.

The Warroad meeting, which will provide an opportunity to discuss levels on Lake of the Woods, will start at 1:00 p.m. in the American Legion hall.

Both international control boards are composed of a Canadian and a United States member. The Canadian member is J. D. McLeod, senior engineer, Water Resources Branch, Department of Energy, Mines Ottawa, Canada. The United States member is Colonel Richard J. Hesse, district engineer of the St. Paul District, Army Corps of Engineers.

Keewatin - Fort Frances Cadet Survival Course

Cadets from R.C.S.C.C. "Mis-Pic" and R.C.S.C.C. "Fort Frances" will undertake winter survival training this weekend in the Fan Lake area. Training to include building of bush shelters, reflector fires, camp hygiene, first aid, what to do if lost, methods of travel, living off land and ice rescue methods.

To make up a well balanced programme there will also be ice fishing, infiltration parties, snowshoe and toboggan races, snowshoe hike, and obstacle course.

It is hoped that this will be the first of many joint Training Courses between the two Corps. For this event Course Leaders will be Commanding Officer of R.C.S.C.C. "Mis-Pic" Lt. C. Wingfield, assisted by Sgt. D. Myles and Sgt. N. Campbell.

"Time Machine" Reveals Mystic, Musical Magic

He's done it again — this time with his "Time Machine", plus an eager, talented and versatile group of young Lakewood High School students. Mr. Ernie Brose, Kenora's own "Mr. Music" presented some 100 or more members of the School's Music Club to a capacity audience last night at the School auditorium in a pleasing blend of musical gems extracted in the Brose manner from his resourceful "Time Machine". It all added up to another unique and captivating show.

After 20 years, Kenora audiences have come to expect the unexpected from the dynamic conductor-composer-arranger, but last night's musical menu topped all previous Brose accomplishments when he placed his newly created Lakewood Band in the spotlight. Some 45 young students, who last fall were first handed instruments, last night provided the large audience with an amazing performance. The band surely stole the show.

The major area of difference this year lies in the fact that there is an absence of drama, little dialogue, but twice the number of individual musical selections. LAKESIDE BAPTIST TO OPEN NEW BUILDING

After almost a year since first breaking ground, the congregation of Lakeside Baptist Church will be officially opening their new building this coming weekend.

This modern edifice was erected in cooperation with Church Enterprises of Canada Limited and stands on two and one eighth acres of land and is within the limits of the Town of Kenora. It is designed with a view to future enlargement. Its auditorium with balcony, panelled with strip mahogany and oak, will seat approximately 300 persons. The Christian Education facilities provide twenty four teaching areas and has a large hall for young peoples' activities. Washrooms are found on both levels. Kitchen facilities are on the lower floor. The spacious side foyer with its two entrances, lead to all departments. The entire building has hot-water heating provided by two oil-fuelled furnaces.

The event starts with "Open House" 2:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Saturday, March 9th when the men of the church will be serving pancakes and coffee to all visitors. Guides will be provided to show visiting friends around the building.

The Dedication Service with the laying of the cornerstone will take place Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. with greetings from His Worship Mayor E. L. Carter and other dignitaries. The special speaker for all services will be Dr. Kenneth Hanna, President of Winnipeg Bible College. Dr. Hanna is a native of Saskatchewan and holds degrees from Dayton, Tennessee, Dallas Theological Seminary, Texas. He has served on a number of college faculties and for a number of years was pastor of Eilm Chapel in Winnipeg. The general public is invited to attend these services.

Late News Bulletins

The acting leader of the Social Credit party says Social Credit-MPs will back the government's latest tax measures to avoid "political chaos" that could further weaken Canada's monetary position. A. B. Patterson spoke as the Commons continued debate today on Finance Minister Sharp's proposed tax-increase measures. But, Mr. Patterson said, his party's four members want the government to tackle the real root causes of its current financial troubles. These, he said, are deficit financing, lavish spending and mushroom growth of the public service without any real return to the Canadian people.

The Canadian dollar rose to above 92 cents American in New York today as a result of measures announced by Finance Minister Sharp yesterday. A New York foreign exchange trader said yesterday's Ottawa announcements had a very definite effect on investors. Meanwhile the U.S. dollar and the British pound continue to run into heavy pressure on European stock markets. And gold stocks continued their climb on the Toronto Stock Exchange as London reported an increasing rush on gold. The United States today again reaffirmed its determination to maintain the dollar at its current rate in relation to gold.

The United States Treasury Department today said Britain bought more than 771 million dollars in U.S. gold in the last three months of 1967. And the department says it is borrowing 200 million dollars from the international monetary fund. Both actions are direct results of American attempts to stabilize currencies after devaluation of the British pound.

Rescue workers have found the bodies of 16 of 21 miners trapped when fire hit a salt mine near Calumet, Louisiana, two days ago. There is no immediate word on the fate of the other five miners. Another rescue team has gone back into the mine to search for the remaining five miners.

Sources in Washington say another nudge from President Johnson may be in the offing in an effort to settle the 236-day-long U.S. copper strike. Current negotiations are reported to be getting nowhere. The sources said the unwieldy talks—involving more than 100 negotiators—are bogged down in procedural details and renewed hospitality over wage offers.

The Supreme Court of Canada has rejected the 25-thousand-dollar damage suit of a white man fired for wooing an Eskimo girl. The five-judge panel unanimously dismissed Terence John Whitfield's damage action against his former employer, Canadian Marconi Company of Montreal. The court agreed that what has been called the "Arctic Apartheid" clause of Mr. Whitfield's employment contract was valid and not contrary to the public interest. The contract was signed by Mr. Whitfield before he went to Great Whale River in Arctic Quebec to work at a radar station.

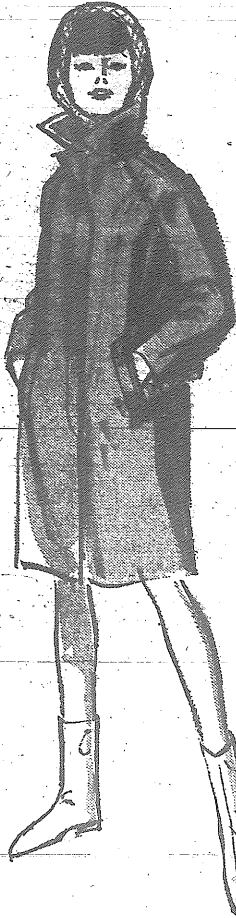
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Kenora To Be N.W. Ontario's Third City?

Commenting on the announcement that a new federal building, provincial building, Holiday Inn Hotel and other structures would be erected within the town of Kenora, Alexander Phillips, Secretary-Manager of the Northwestern Ontario Development Council said perhaps the time is appropriate for Kenora to consider status as a city — the third in Northwestern Ontario. Mr. Phillips also commented on the recent opening of the \$700,000 Recreation Centre and the announcement that later this year the Confederation College of Applied Arts and Technology would be establishing a satellite campus, with seven full-time masters initially in charge at the Westwood School in Kenora.

Mr. Phillips, who was in Kenora over the past weekend to participate in the recreation centre opening said that Mayor Ernie Carter, members of council and all those involved in the opening ceremonies deserved many congratulations for their herculean efforts which represent an act of faith in the future of Kenora and predicted "an upsurge in the making."

Rat Portage Car Drivers Plan Wind-up

Members of the Rat Portage Car Club will be winding up their winter's activities over at Keewatin Beach this coming weekend with races scheduled to get underway at 1:00 p.m. First of all there will be a car inspection at 12:30 and the first race will be 25 laps. This is a feature which all the cars will participate in. This first race, according to a club spokesman, will probably be difficult for some of the machines. If a flat tire or other minor trouble crop up the drivers can go into the pits, fix the troubles and probably still go on to win.

The second heat of the day will be ten laps in length. This heat will be run for points towards the monthly trophies.

The third heat is also a feature race which everyone participates in. The cars that hold out with motors, transmissions and remainder of their cars will acquire points for monthly trophies given out on this race also.

The fourth heat is dubbed a bumper tag. This race does not add points but the drivers tie plastic jugs to the back of the cars. Coloured water is put in the jugs and to stay in the race the jug must remain unbroken. To win a driver must break the other competitor's jug with the front of his car. There is no set number of laps but the last car without the jug broken is the winner.

B. and C. course, elementary commercial subjects are studied; in the A. and S. course, two subjects must be chosen from Home Economics, Latin, Typing and Art or Music. These optional subjects set the pattern for the programme of studies in subsequent years.

Again, the three courses are identical eighty percent of the time and the options taken in the remaining twenty percent of the time make the difference.

Should a pupil decide at the end of Grade Nine that the wrong course was chosen, a crossing over to a different course could be made for Grade Ten with little difficulty but the change is not widely encouraged.

Just a word about the Five-year

and the four-year streams. The Five-year stream in all three courses leads to an Honour Graduation Diploma after Grade Thirteen and beyond to post-secondary school education, such as Community College, Teachers' College, University. The four-year stream leads to a Graduation Diploma after Grade Twelve and beyond to post-secondary education such as Community College. There is a difference in the Five and Four-year courses and this is largely in the depth and intensity of study.

The important factor in choosing a course is the happiness of the pupil and the pupil will only be happy working in subject areas in which there is contentment and peace of mind. That is the pupil's decision after a full consideration of the choice of options.
