AN EXPLANATION ABOUT ICE AT ARENA

THE MANAGEMENT BOARD OF THE KENORA RECREATION CENTRE WISHES TO MAKE THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT REGARDING THE CANCELLATION OF THE EXHIBITION HOCKEY GAMES THIS PAST WEEKEND.

Twelve days ago the ice plant was turned on and around the clock work was carried out each

day in preparation of the start of the hockey season. The arena manager Bill Swan and his staff

U.S. AMBASSADOR JAMES RUSSELL WIGGINS SAYS THE U.S. IS PREPARED TO CARRY OUT ITS OBLIGATIONS AS A MEMBER OF THE U.N. TO HELP GUARANTEE ANY MIDDLE EAST PEACE SETTLEMENT. WIGGINS FORMALLY TOOK OVER YESTERDAY AS THE NEW U.S. AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED NATIONS, AT AN INFORMAL MEETING WITH NEWSMEN TODAY, HE SAID HE IS GIVING TOP PRIORITY TO THE MIDDLE EAST QUESTION. WIGGINS' REMARKS CAME AS ISRAELI FOREIGN MINISTER ABBA EBAN WAS PREPARING TO SPEAK TO THE U.N. GENERAL ASSEMBLY LATER TODAY ON PEACE PROSPECTS IN THE MIDDLE EAST. HE IS EXPECTED TO AVOID SPECIFIC FORMULAS IN LINE WITH ISRAEL'S POLICY THAT THE ARABS MUST FIRST AGREE TO NEGOTIATE.

AN INDIAN NEWS AGENCY SAYS TWO MAJOR LANDSLIDES TRIGGERED BY RECENT HEAVY RAINS—HAVE KILLED AT LEAST FIFTY SEVEN PERSONS IN THE HIMALAYAN KINGDOM OF SIKKIM. THE REGION IS STILL CUT OFF FROM INDIA, EXCEPT FOR A SINGLE TELEPHONE LINE. IN EAST PAKISTAN FLOODS HAVE LEFT AT LEAST FIFTY SEVEN PERSONS DEAD AND HUNDREDS OF CATTLE HAVE DROWNED. IN NORTH BENGAL, AT LEAST FOUR HUNDRED AND SIXTY FOUR PERSONS ARE KNOWN DEAD IN FLOODS AND LANDSLIDES. THERE ARE FEARS THE FINAL DEATH TOLL MAY BE MORE THAN ONE THOUSAND. AN ESTIMATED THREE MILLION TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND PERSONS HAVE BEEN AFFECTED BY THE FLOODS IN A SEVEN THOUSAND SQUARE MILE AREA.

PRESIDENT JOSEPH MOBUTU OF CONGO HAS REJECTED AN APPEAL FOR CLEMENCY FROM PIERRE MULELE. HE IS A REBEL LEADER SENTENCED TO DEATH BY A MILITARY COURT TODAY AFTER A NONSTOP, FIFTEEN HOUR TRIAL. HIS APPEAL TO MOBUTU WAS HIS LAST RECOURSE. NO DATE FOR THE EXECUTION HAS BEEN ANNOUNCED. MULELE WAS A SUPPORTER OF THE LATE PREMIER PATRICE LUMUMBA, KILLED IN 1961. HE HAD BEEN IN EXILE FOUR YEARS BUT RETURNED TO THE CONGO LAST MONTH AFTER BEING GUARANTEED SAFE CONDUCT UNDER AN AMNESTY.

THE TRIAL OF NINE ROMAN CATHOLIC CLERGY AND LAYMEN CHARGED WITH BURNING DRAFT RECORDS GOT UNDERWAY IN BALTIMORE MARYLAND, TODAY. THE COURTROOM WAS PACKED WITH THE DEFENDANTS' SUPPORTERS, AND JUDGE ROSZEL THOMSEN WARNED THAT ORDER MUST BE MAINTAINED AFTER TWO OF THE ACCUSED WERE GIVEN A ONE MINUTE STANDING OVATION. MEANWHILE, IN WASHINGTON, MASSACHUSETTS, SENATOR EDWARD KENNEDY HAS ASKED THE U.S. ARMY TO POSTPONE ITS TRANSFER OF A MASSACHUSETTS RESERVE UNIT TO VIETNAM. AT LEAST EIGHTY THREE MEMBERS OF THE BATTALION, NOW STATIONED AT FORT MEADE, MARYLAND, HAVE VILED AFFIDAVITS CLAIMING THEY HAVE NOT RECEIVED SPECIALIZED BATTLE TRAINING. KENNEDY ASKED ARMY SECRETARY STANLEY RESOR NOT TO SEND THE UNIT OVERSEAS UNTIL THE CHARGE CAN BE INVESTIGATED AND REPUBLICAN CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM CRAMER OF FLORIDA SAYS THE U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES' ARMED SERVICES COMMITTEE IS LOOKING INTO A REPORT AN ARMY RESERVE UNIT FROM FLORIDA WAS NOT ADEQUATELY TRAINED BEFORE GOING TO VIETNAM HE SAYS THE ARMY HAS DENIED THE REPORT.

AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON LATIN AMERICA, BEING HELD IN MONTREAL, HAS BEEN TOLD THAT CUBA HAS NEARLY WIPED OUT ILLITERACY AND IS PLANNING TO INTRODUCE COMPULSORY EDUCATION UP TO THE UNIVERSITY LEVEL. HERMES HERRERA, DIRECTOR OF THE ECONOMIC INSTITUTE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAVANA, SAYS CUBA HAS MADE EDUCATION ITS CHIEF CONCERN SINCE THE CASTRO REVOLUTION. HE TOLD THE MONTREAL MEETING YESTERDAY THAT SINCE 1961, THE ILLITERACY LEVEL IN CUBA HAS BEEN REDUCED TO LESS THAN FIVE PERCENT FROM A PRE-REVOLUTION LEVEL OF 23.6 PERCENT.

Rotarians See Fire Prevention Demonstrations

Fire Prevention Week was fittingly launched on Monday when Fire Chief Len Whiting addressed the members of the Kenora Rotary Club on the constant need for preventative measures. Later the members of the Club traveled by bus to the Lake of the Woods District Hospital, where deputy Chief Bus Dubois and members of the staff demonstrated various chemicals and equipment in extinguishing gasoline fires. Members of the Hospital staff, including the ladies handled equipment with dispatch and efficiency.

President Stuart King was in the chair and three visiting Rotarians from Winnipeg were welcomed. They were W. Webb, Carl Hawn and Charles Zeal. Visitors included Leo King, Clarence Dusing, Alerman and deputy Mayor, and the speaker. The president reported a good representation from the local club at the Dryden district meeting of the Kenora, Dryden, Sioux Lookout, Fort Frances and Baudette Clubs assembly, in which many new club members participated.

In view of the Thanksgiving Holiday next week-end, the meeting next week will be held on Tuesday. The question of selecting a club representative to visit associated British Clubs next spring between April 15th and June 15th was left to the club members for suggestions.

Fire Chief Whiting reported fire losses in the community for the past four years as follows: 1964 - \$10,964; 1965 - \$40,552.00 1966 - \$55,901.00; 1967 - \$75,623.00 - To date in 1968 - \$5,500.00. The chief said there will always be fires and all can help to prevent fires by being constantly aware and active in the removal of fire hazards, and of maintaining a constant watch on fire dangers by conscientious and diligent preventative measures.

At the hospital a splendid demonstration of quiet efficiency by staff members was immediately indicated, once the unexpected fire alarm was sounded. All patients were visited, doors closed and every precaution taken without fuss or noise. It was most impressive to view the work of the staff and their high standard of efficiency.

President Stuart King expressed the appreciation of the members to the fire department staff, Chief Whiting and his deputy B. Dubois and to the hospital management and staff for a most enlightening demonstration.

DAVE RAYNER NAMED TO Y.P.C. DISTRICT POST

The Ontario Y.P.C. Association's week long "Youth Involvement Tour" of Northwestern Ontario, concluded Friday night with a spirited meeting at Lakehead University. During the 1100 miles driven by car, the Tour met with substantially more than 400 young persons mainly high school students, and interested members of the senior associations.

The main purpose of the Tour involving many of the youth of Northwest, interested in the affairs of the Progressive Conservative Party was accomplished during visits to Dryden, Kenora, Atikokan, Fort William, Port Arthur, Nipigon-Red Rock, Schreiber-Terrace Bay, Marathon and the Lakehead. At the conclusion of the meeting with the exception of Schreiber-Terrace Bay and Lakehead University where there were established Y.P.C. groups, an Organization Committee was elected quickly to establish a fully operational Y.P.C. club to actively involve these young Conservatives.

All connected with the Tour were most impressed by the number of high school students present at each meeting. In fact they will form the basis of the Y.P.C. organization in the Northwest.

The three man force was headed by Ed Kowal, Ontario Y.P.C. President, and included Leo Bernier, M.P.P. Kenora, and Dave Ahlin, Youth Organizer, Ontario Progressive Conservative Party.





Predict High Traffic Toll On Weekend

Unless Canadian drivers operate more safely than in the past, the Canada Safety Council estimates that between 65 and 75 people will die in traffic accidents during the Thanksgiving long weekend. To avoid such a toll, the council urges drivers to practice Defensive Driving—be alert and be prepared at all times to avoid accidents.

The period covered by the forecast is from 6 p.m. October 11 to midnight October 14. During this period last year 78 people were killed; in 1966 there were 109 killed and in 1968 the figure was 83.

Weather could be a factor in the accident picture. During the past two months, sunny and warm weather has led to abnormally high numbers of fatalities during weekends.



may, that the ice was not holding on the areas close to the boards. As the practise continued, skate cuts close to the boards continued to chip the ice out and some of the players had had falls.

The ice surface in the center of the rink was in excellent condition but the area along the boards made it impossible to allow the Junior practise to continue and after some deliberation we decided to cancel the exhibition series between the Omaha Knights and the Canadian National Team.

This decision was made for the following reasons:

1. We were sure that neither of the two coaches would want to risk serious injury to their players.

2. It would have been foolish to have started Saturday's game and then had to stop play because of ice conditions.

3. Both the National and Omaha teams could be notified of the ice conditions early enough so they did not have the expense of the trip to Kenora.

We know that hundreds of fans were disappointed because of the cancellation but we can assure them that they were not half as disappointed as the Management Board and especially Manager Bill Swan who worked so hard to get the arena ready.

We offer our sincerest apologies to the Canadian National Hockey Team but we owe an even greater apology to Jake Milford, Manager of the Omaha Knights. The Nationals had originally wanted Jake to play the series in Brandon and Winnipeg but it was at Milford's insistence that Nationals finally agreed to play in Kenora. It was Jake Milford's great love for the Kenora area and his many fond memories of his Junior Hockey days in the old Thistle Rink that prompted him to offer this week-end series to the Kenora Recreation Centre.

At this point we would like to state that the Recreation Centre Management Board was not involved in any guarantee to the two teams. The arrangement made through Mr. Milford was that the total gate receipts were to be split, with 35% going to each team and 30% to the Recreation Centre. On an estimated total gate receipts for the two games of about \$600.00 the Recreation Centre share would have been \$1,800.00 plus the profit from two days excellent patronage of the concessions.

Our loss now, because of the cancellation is for advertising costs. Jake Milford brought his team here four days before the series and then had to move them to Winnipeg because of ice conditions. This resulted in a great deal of expense as well as the loss of valuable ice time as his team starts League play on Thursday. You can understand what we mean when we say we are greatly indebted to Jake Milford.

Now about the ice conditions at the Recreation Centre - Hundreds of times in the last few days members of our committee have been asked the same question "What's the matter with the ice-plant?" It is hard to give a simple direct answer without first reminding our citizens of one important fact, i.e. when the original plans and all cost figures were submitted to the Building Committee, it was decided after consultation with the engineers, that the available funds would permit the installation of only a 45 ton capacity refriger-

ation plant. It was considered that this plant would make ice from mid-October and hold it until mid-May. There was also provision made that, at a minimum of cost, a further unit of 30 ton capacity could be added to the present plant.

Events of the last few days have now pointed out the inability of our present plant to make ice adequately at this time of the year. Yesterday we spent the entire afternoon with the refrigeration staff of the Canadian Ice Machine Company and they have recommended the addition of a further 30 tons to our plant at an approximate cost of \$6,800.00.

Our Management Board must now take this problem to Town Council. What would you do if you were in Town Council's shoes - faced at every turn with increased departmental operating cost, their first question must be 'Where will the money come from?'

As the Management Board we must convince Town Council that this ice plant addition is a must and perhaps in the next few days or weeks we can meet with sympathetic groups in town and once again ask them if they can help us to raise the money to pay for it.

And of course the new formed Junior Muskies and Intermediate Thistles are also in a predicament. They are both playing in leagues where the League Game start this week-end and they are the only teams that have been unable to get into playing condition. The two teams are working out daily at the Arena but can use only the center portion of the ice surface.

As of eight o'clock this morning the ice is much improved and with 24 hr. a day preparation the ice should be ready on Thursday night for the exhibition game between Fort Frances and the Kenora Junior Muskies. It will perhaps be necessary to forgo the usual between period floods, but at least we will be able to offer the Juniors one practise game prior to their league opener here on Sunday Afternoon.







Community Use Of Schools Workshop Topic

"Today's School- The Community Focus" is the theme of a conference to be held from November 18-20 at the Constellation Hotel in Toronto. It will be sponsored by the School Planning and Building Research Section and the Youth and Recreation Branch of the Ontario Department of Education and will consider the general use of school buildings to the community. Delegates will include school trustees and education officials, recreation authorities, architects and others vitally interested in the communities' use of school facilities. The relationship between leisure, recreation and education in the use of school facilities is an important issue in the consideration of our society today. At the Minister's Confer-

ence on Recreation in 1966, Ontario Minister of Education, Hon. William G. Davis said, "Cooperation between school authorities and recreation authorities in a community needs to be continuous so that the best and most dynamic program of recreation and continuing education is available to the citizens. All publicly owned buildings must be used for program development facilities, per se, are of little consequence unless they are used to the maximum."

At the November Workshop, delegates will hear as speakers, Archibald C. Rogers, a prominent architect and urban planner from Maryland, Dr. Allan Thomas, the Executive Director of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, and Lloyd Dennis, Co-chairman of the Provincial Committee on the aims and objectives of Education in the Schools of Ontario. Such topics as present resources community needs, and integration of needs and facilities will be considered by means of panel

and group discussion.

Hon. Thomas L. Wells, Minister Without Portfolio in the Ontario Legislature, is the General Conference Chairman.

Consolidated School Board Effective Jan. 1

It was in November of 1967 when John Robarts, the Premier of Ontario announced that the province was to have a new massive approach to education. The number of school boards in the province was to be reduced to 81, thus automatically creating large new consolidated or amalgamated boards that would come into being January 1st 1969. The wheels of education throughout the province began to turn in every new designated area - a committee comprised of academic, personnel, trustees and administrative personnel was set up and called the Interim School Organization Committee (ISOC) which will be the future name of the Board. The ISOC had only the power to recommend to the newly elected incoming board, which will be elected in December and take office January 1st, 1969. The Board to be elected will consist of the following representation of the 12 members to be elected, any candidate for office regardless of residence can run in any part of the educational area. 

Hostilities End Sought

The 25th annual meeting of the Manitoba-Northwestern Ontario Presbyterian Synod at Kenora passed a resolution that the synod send a telegram to the general secretary of the United Nations expressing strongest desire to have the United Nations explore every possible channel to hasten the cessation of hostilities between Nigeria and Biafra, and to urge the Nigerian Government under United Nations supervision

to care for all these in need to its occupied zones and that the United Nations through its agencies will continue to seek ways and means to alleviate the dire distress of human suffering in the remaining area of Biafra.

The recommendation continued: That copies of this telegram be sent to the Prime Minister of Canada, the Minister of External Affairs, the Secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and the appropriate Board of the World Council of Churches. That this Synod write to the Prime Minister of Canada expressing strong desire for the Government of Canada to give positive leadership within the Commonwealth of Nations in dealing with the Nigeria-Biafra conflict.

Copies of this letter be sent to the leaders of the opposition parties.

That each congregation within the synod call upon its members to express their grave concern about the Nigerian-Biafran civil war through corporate and/or individual action by sending letters to the Prime Minister of Canada and to their local members of Parliament or by any other means they consider will be effective in pressing for a cessation of hostilities and the providing of much more supplies and medicines and that they encourage other churches and interested persons to do likewise.

That we support the Government of Canada in making provision for the admittance of refugees, including children, from Nigeria-Biafra.

ing which concluded at Kenora on Saturday.

Thomas Weels, Ontario minister without portfolio spoke to a dinner meeting of the group Friday evening.

The Saturday luncheon was addressed by John O. E. Pearson, coordinator, Municipal Department of Municipal Affairs who said that big things are happening in our area of the north and a challenge has been put out to all residing there. Announcements will be made within the next three to six weeks, he said, following government scrutiny of the report on taxation.

Mr. Pearson said there were different types who sought election as municipal leaders. In Britain, he said, a councillor makes up his own mind and votes the way he thinks best and this he pointed out, was the right kind of leader. Courses are now being given for clerks and treasurers of municipalities and in England most municipal clerks and treasurers come from the legal profession.

He spoke on the Smith report on regional government and mentioned that annexation will mean the end of some counties. The report at the Lakehead had contained over thirty recommendations. He told his listeners that important decisions would be reached at a conference at Quebec in February and the proposed amalgamation of Lakehead Communities was a forerunner of things to come and would act as a guide.

The speaker said the people of northwestern Ontario and the north in general cannot just be observers to what is going on in the south. As for the future, Mr. Pearson said that it will take five years to bring in the proper form of Regional Government and that there is a distinct need for closer relationship between the provincial and municipal levels. A form of leadership schools, such as implemented in Scandinavia may be the answer, he said. The speaker was introduced by Mayor Ernest Reed of Fort William and thanked by W. Luke Francis, mayor of Keewatin.




