

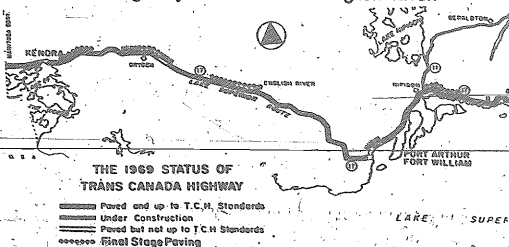
Paving - Reconstruction Area's '69 Hwy. Program

The Kenora District will receive a substantial share of the Ontario Department of Highways budget for 1969, a study of a summary prepared by the Minister, the Honourable George Gomme, reveals. The annual Highway Construction Programme was outlined to the Legislature last week, and shows that the 1969 budget for construction and maintenance capital expenditures will run close to \$200,000,000.

A substantial amount of paving along Highway 17 east of Kenora together with 17 miles of reconstruction of Highway 71 north of Nestor Falls are the major works in this district.

Here is the complete programme:

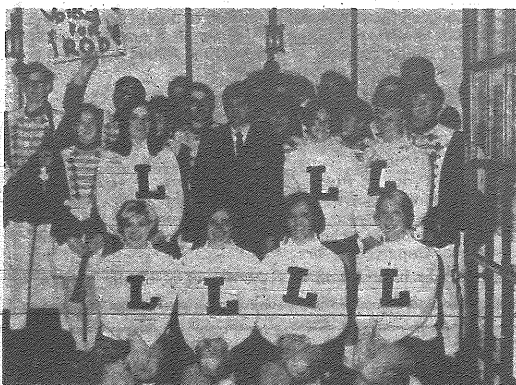
1. Grading, drainage, granular base and paving from 9.1 miles west of Borups Corners, a total of 9.8 miles.
2. Similar work, with structures on secondary Highway 538 over Black Sturgeon River (Redditt Road) a total of .06 miles.
3. Grading, drainage and granular base on Highway 71, from Nestor Falls northerly a distance of 9.0 miles.
4. A second contract from 9.0 miles north of Nestor Falls and northerly a distance of 8.0 miles.
5. From Highway 116 northerly five miles.
6. Paving - Highway 17 from 18.2 miles east of Highway 71, Longbow Corners, easterly, a total of 11.1 miles.
7. Paving - Highway 17 from 8.6 miles east of Longbow Corners easterly, a distance of 9.6 miles.
8. Paving - Highway 17 from junction of Highway 71, Longbow Corners, easterly a distance of 8.6 miles.
9. Paving - Highway 17 from Dryden east limits easterly a distance of 10.4 miles.
10. Paving - Highway 17, from Dryden westerly a distance of 7.5 miles.
11. Resurfacing - from Oxdrift, a distance of 10 miles.
12. Another 36.6 miles of resurfacing work will be carried out on Highway 17 west from English River.



At Fort Frances the Colonization Road will be paved a distance of 1.1 miles.

Grading, drainage and a granular base will be provided along 4.6 miles of the Lake Despair Road.

North of Red Lake similar work will be pursued on the Anderson Lake Road, a distance of 14. miles.

Cecil Gilley, 67 Keewatin Resident Called To Rest

Cecil Gilley, 306 Second West Bay, Keewatin, passed away Friday evening, April 4th, 1969 at the Lake of the Woods District Hospital.

Born at Jersey, in the Channel Islands February 27th, 1902 he was 67 years of age. He was married in Kenora, Ontario to the former Hanna Smith, August 12th, 1929.

Surviving are his wife, one son James Gilley of Winnipeg, two daughters Mrs. Jack (Irene) Murphy of Vancouver, Mrs. Joe (Gladys) Dowgray of Transcona and six grandchildren. Also surviving are one brother Eric Gilley of Southampton, England, two sisters Mrs. Krene Vincent in Jersey, Channel Islands, Miss Doris Gilley of Keewatin. He was employed with the Lake of the Woods Milling Company as a miller for 35 years, retiring in 1963.

He came to this country in 1919 to Peterborough, Ontario and to this district in 1924. He was a member of the St. James Anglican Church in Keewatin, a member of the Royal Canadian Legion - Keewatin Branch. He served on the Town Council in Keewatin for two terms.

During the Second World War he served with the Manitoba Dragoons for four years. The funeral service will be held at 3.30 p.m. Tuesday, April 8th 1969, in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home. Rev. C. K. Montzambert will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery. Pallbearers will be Gerald Smith, Tom Elliott, Chris Brooker, Bill Murphy, Ted Graveline and Jack Wilson.

LATE NEWS BULLETINS

ONE PASSENGER IS DEAD OF INJURIES AFTER AN AIR CANADA VISCOUNT PLANE WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE AFTER MAKING AN EMERGENCY LANDING TODAY WHEN AN ENGINE BURST INTO FLAMES FIVE MINUTES AFTER LEAVING SEPT-ILES, QUEBEC. THE PASSENGER—NOT YET IDENTIFIED—SUFFERED THE FATAL INJURIES IN THE EMERGENCY EVACUATION OF THE BURNING FOUR ENGINE PLANE.

THREE OTHER PASSENGERS WERE TAKEN TO HOSPITAL. THERE WERE TWENTY ONE PERSONS ABOARD THE VISCOUNT—17 PASSENGERS AND FOUR CREW MEMBERS, INCLUDING TWO STEWARDESSES.

THE FLIGHT ORIGINATED IN SEPT-ILES, 325 MILES NORTH EAST OF QUEBEC CITY AND WAS HEADED TO MONTREAL. AN AIR CANADA SPOKESMAN IN MONTREAL SAID THE PLANE WAS COMPLETELY DESTROYED IN THE FIRE AFTER IT RETURNED TO THE SEPT-ILES AIRPORT.

A TORONTO NEWSPAPER, THE STAR, SAYS SENATOR JOHN BLACK AIRD OF TORONTO HAS RESIGNED AS CHAIRMAN OF THE CANADIAN NATO PARLIAMENTARY ASSOCIATION. THE NEWSPAPER SAYS THE FORTY FIVE YEAR OLD SENATOR NOTIFIED PRIME MINISTER TRUDEAU PRIVATELY LAST FRIDAY THAT HE IS STEPPING DOWN BECAUSE HE DISAGREES WITH THE GOVERNMENT'S ANNOUNCED DEFENCE POLICY. THE STAR SAYS SENATOR AIRD CALLED THE PRIME MINISTER BY TELEPHONE FRIDAY TO EXPLAIN THAT HE FELT IT IS THE WRONG TIME FOR CANADA TO REDUCE ITS NATO COMMITMENT.

THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT HAS, IN EFFECT, UPHELD THE IDEA THAT A MAN'S HOME IS HIS CASTLE. IT RULED TODAY THAT IT CANNOT CONSTITUTIONALLY BE MADE A CRIME TO POSSESS OBSCENE FILMS OR PRINTED MATTER IN THE PRIVACY OF ONE'S HOME. THE RULING IS ALSO CONSIDERED A MAJOR DEFENCE OF THE RIGHT OF FREEDOM OF SPEECH.

AS THE OPINION BY JUSTICE THURGOOD MARSHALL PUT IT—THE STATE HAS NO BUSINESS TELLING A MAN SITTING ALONE IN HIS OWN HOME WHAT BOOKS HE MAY READ OR WHAT FILMS HE MAY WATCH.

THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT HAS DENIED ANGUILLAN LEADER RONALD WEBSTER'S CLAIM OF A BRITISH DOUBLE CROSS. WEBSTER TOLD NEWSMEN IN PUERTO RICO THAT THE ISLAND'S SEVEN MAN COUNCIL HAD BEEN DISSOLVED AND MARTIAL LAW DECLARED. HE SAID THIS VIOLATED THE SEVEN POINT ACCORD WORKED OUT WITH BRITISH U.N. REPRESENTATIVE LORD CARADON.

BUT THE BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE SAID TODAY: "NOTHING HAS BEEN DONE—WHICH WAS NOT STRICTLY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT WITH LORD CARADON." OFFICIALS CONFIRMED THAT BRITISH COMMISSIONER ANTHONY LEE HAD DISSOLVED THE COUNCIL BUT THEY SAY HE FORMED A NEW COUNCIL MADE UP OF THE SAME SEVEN MEN.

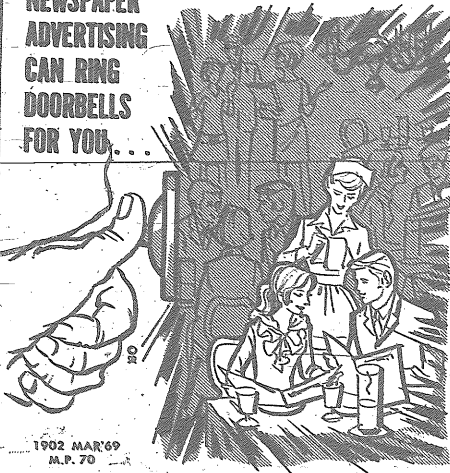

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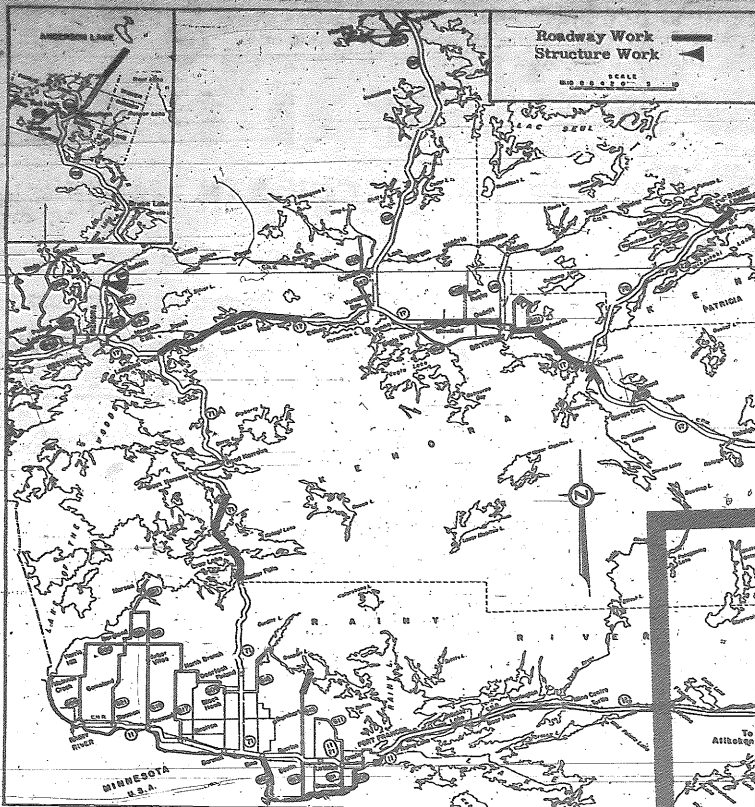

Police Seek Man In Stabbings At Winnipeg

Winnipeg—Two of four victims of a series of stabbings in Central Winnipeg Saturday night remained in hospital today but their conditions are not considered

serious. The other two were released after treatment.

A 24 year old man is being sought in connection with the stabbings which started in a laneway at the rear of the Maryland Hotel and continued into a nearby apartment block at 725 McGee St. Stabbed were one man and three women. Names of the women were withheld by police.

Twenty five year old Nestor Panisiak, who suffered a superficial wound on his left side, said he was awakened by the screams of a woman in a suite across the hall for his apartment. He said: "I went to the door of my apartment and he (the assailant) was coming out of the suite across the hall. He turned and saw me and walked toward me with a vague sort of grin on his face. I felt a sharp pain in my side and stumbled back into my suite. He just walked away down the hall, and then I heard another woman scream."

The first victim was a 23 year old woman who was stabbed in the lower left chest as she walked from her car behind the hotel. The woman whose screams awoke Panisiak was next; then Panisiak. The fourth victim, stabbed in the shoulder, was a woman who apparently came from her suite in the basement to investigate.

TORONTO—Defenceman Tim Horton and Goaltender John Bower have announced their retirement from the Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League.

Concern Expressed ...

Ontario Mayors and Reeves reads as follows:

The Municipal leaders in this province are very concerned with the legislation that gives authority to school boards to issue their own debentures without having to seek approval from municipal councils. This concern was crystallized at the recent Executive Meeting of the Association of Ontario Mayors and Reeves, when a resolution was unanimously passed to "register, with every Minister of the Ontario Government, the strong objection of this Association to the provision of debenture issuing powers of school authorities". The Executive is composed of 55 chief officers of Ontario Municipalities.

The reasons for this stand, we

believe, are apparent and valid.

There are limitations, enforced by the Ontario Municipal Board on municipal capital debt. These limits include the debt incurred for both municipal and school purposes—a reasonable condition as they are both liabilities of the same property taxpayers. Until this year, councils had control, subject to certain appeal rights of the boards, over the issuance of all such debentures. This assured some local responsible control (apart from the O.M.B. limitations) over total debt, and where limits were reached, a balance of retrenchment between school and municipal capital expenditures.

The legislation providing debenture issuing powers to school boards destroys all this local control and balance of total debt. It poses such questions as the following:

Will the school board and the council even know what debt the other is incurring?

Will the O.M.B. still consider

the portion of school debenture debt for which the local municipality is responsible as part of the total municipal debt?

In approaching the debt limit, will the O.M.B. treat the applications on a first come, first serve basis?

When considering a school debenture issue, where some municipalities have reached the debt limit while others have not, how will the Ontario Municipal Board draw the line?

With the county school boards being much more powerful than most local municipal units, won't the school boards tend to get priority on their requests?

There would appear to be no answers to these questions that would justify by-passing councils consideration of all debenture issues. It may be that school debenture approval should be dealt with by the counties (where they exist) and the separated cities, but, in any event, this Association is of the firm opinion that school boards, with the property tax as their base, should not have independent capital debt incurring powers.

It is not unfair to state that municipal capital requirements have suffered extensively to date from the priority given school boards requirements. The situation will now be severely aggravated.

This association, therefore, urges you to take the necessary action to have this policy reversed.
