An Editorial

KENORA KINSMEN

Are service clubs and similar organizations dedicated to unmythical betterment, being thrust into a new role in society? There is evidence that such may be the case. For one thing, memberships are greater than ever, indicating that growing numbers of people are not satisfied "to let the government do it."

Service men are "thinking big" today, tackling problems in the past have been too ambitious or outside the scope of voluntary organizations. There is growing recognition of a new trend, which in Kenora finds expression in such organizations as the Kinsmen Club, chartered in 1937.

As might be expected, a young men's organization would have a unique area of service during the war years; Kinsmen are gratefully remembered for their heart-warming "Milk Britain" project. On the eve of the Club's latest money-making project, its annual show opening tomorrow, it seems appropriate to review the major contributions this dedicated group of young men have made to Kenora, in the last 10 years.

- The show "Kins-A-Poppin"; one of a long series of fine musical productions, proceeds to defray cost of purchase Kinhaven. (Children's Aid Receiving Centre).
- Kinsmen pledged \$5,000 to General Hospital Expansion campaign. Presented a TV set to Kinhaven.
- Presented a cheque for \$250 to the Children's Aid Society.
- Presented Kin Community Camp at Longbow Lake to the Boy Scouts. The same year plans were announced for the building of Kin Valley School for Retarded Children, which opened in June, 1964.
- Kinsmen pledged \$5,000 to the Community Centre fund.
- Kinsmen increased this pledge by another \$2,000.
- Purchased the former Lakeside Baptist Church, repaired and renovated the building for use as an Adult Rehabilitation Centre.

Kinsmen promoted fish derbies; have organized and operated Santa Claus parades locally for more years than many can remember; have provided numerous scholarships bursaries for schools, college and youth development.

From this training emerged many of this community's leaders. The legacy of Kinsmen to Kenora has been the very important lesson that true progress comes from seeking "The Community's Greatest Good" and doing something about it.

First Spring Shower Will Speed Runoff

The Lake of the Woods Control Board is closely following water levels in the watershed of the Lake, and this morning ordered a continuation of the present substantial outflow at the Norman Dam.

The Lake level at Keewatin this morning stands at 1056.83 feet, down one inch during the past 24 hours and about 3 inches lower than on this date a year ago.

The present outflow into the Winnipeg River is 23,800 cfs, down from 35,000 cfs rate which was in effect most of March. The rate of flow at Fort Frances into Rainy River is 10,000 cfs at present.

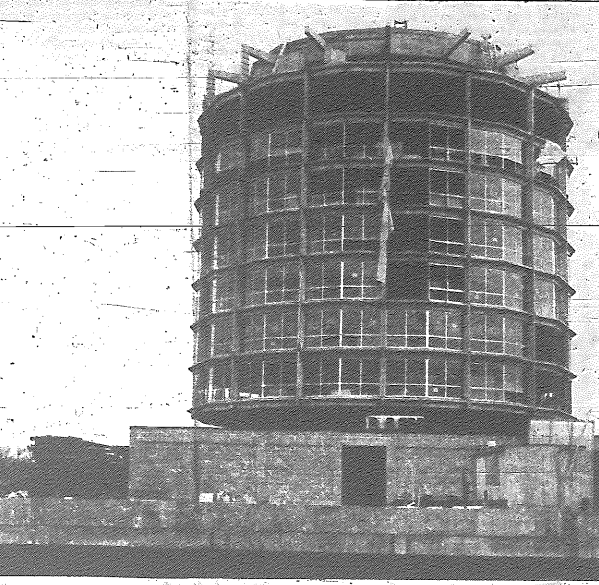
Last night's first April shower was measured at the airport at .11 of an inch up to 8 a.m. today.

From Around The World

British naval sources say seven Soviet warships today entered the Straits of Gibraltar on their way to the Mediterranean. Royal Air Force planes have been shadowing the two cruisers, four submarines and a destroyer escort since they sailed into the North Atlantic two weeks ago as part of a larger force.

The ships will bring estimated Soviet Naval strength in the Mediterranean to three cruisers, ten destroyers - escorts, about two submarines and one supply ship plus several auxiliary vessels.

In the U.S., rivers fed by melting snow have flooded parts of the upper middle-west, forcing hundreds of persons to evacuate their homes in Minnesota, Iowa,

BUILDING PERMITS TOP MILLION DOLLAR MARK

Predictions that 1969 will be a banner year for construction in Kenora seem borne out by the record of building permits taken out during the first 90 days. January set a fast pace as permits were issued for nine new dwellings to Mayotte Construction Co. Ltd. worth \$160,500.

This total exceeds the number of new dwellings started in Kenora during any of the past three years.

The usual winter construction lull was in evidence in February when only a single permit, valued at \$5,000 was issued. This covered work in connection with

alterations to the I.O.O.F. Block. A single permit valued at \$811,000, was the big story in March. This was issued to Peole Construction Company to cover the construction of the new Federal Building. However, a new dwelling valued at \$40,000 plus other authorized work added \$68,450 to the March total. Prospects for continuing activity appear bright, with a new provincial building providing the next major building challenge. The first three months total of \$1,038,950 augurs well for the most active period in Kenora for many years.

LATE NEWS BULLETINS

A TEAM OF QUEBEC PROSPECTORS, EMPLOYED BY A QUEBEC GOVERNMENT MINING SUBSIDIARY, IS REPORTED TO HAVE STAKED CLAIMS IN THE DEAD CENTER OF THREE THOUSAND ACRES SELECTED BY OTTAWA FOR MONTREAL'S NEW INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT. IT WAS LEARNED TODAY THE STAKING WAS DONE AS LATE AS MARCH 11TH—ABOUT TWO WEEKS PRIOR TO OTTAWA'S ANNOUNCEMENT THAT STEPHEN SCHOLASTIQUE HAD BEEN SELECTED AS THE AIRPORT SITE. THIS IS TWENTY SIX MILES NORTHWEST OF MONTREAL. THE QUEBEC GOVERNMENT HARSHLY CRITICIZED THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S DECISION, PREFERING AN AIRPORT SITE SOUTH OF MONTREAL. THIS LATEST DEVELOPMENT GIVES QUEBEC A POWERFUL WEAPON—BACKED BY THE BRITISH NORTH AMERICA ACT—TO EXERCISE AND PROTECT ITS SOVEREIGNTY OVER THE LAND.

THE OFFICIAL HANOI DAILY NHAN DAN PREDICTS VICTORY FOR THE CURRENT COMMUNIST OFFENSIVE IN SOUTH VIETNAM. IT SAYS THAT JUST AS LAST YEAR'S TET OFFENSIVE BROUGHT "JOHNSON'S WAR" TO BANKRUPTCY, THE CURRENT OFFENSIVE FORECASTS THE FAILURE OF "NIXON'S WAR." THE VIET CONG ARE CLAIMING THAT IN THIRTY FIVE DAYS BEGINNING FEBRUARY 22ND, COMMUNIST FORCES WIPED OUT OR CAPTURED MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND SOLDIERS, INCLUDING FIFTY TWO THOUSAND AMERICANS.

RUSSIA'S MERCHANT MARINE MINISTER, VIKTOR BAKAYEV, PREDICTS A FIFTY PERCENT INCREASE IN THE SOVIET MERCHANT FLEET IN THE NEXT SIX YEARS. ROTARIANS TAKEN ON RUSSIAN PICTURE TOUR

A pictorial view of Russia, with old and new buildings competing at times for prominence, with first class hotel accommodation (until at a premium, and costs of cars and trucks still away out of sight for the ordinary man, was the program presented on Monday to the members of the Kenora Rotary Club by Miss P. Shanski, Director of Nursing, at the Lake of the Woods District Hospital. Miss Shanski toured the country two years ago in company with her father, who resides in Winnipeg.

President Stuart King presided and Rev. Roger Jeal of Prince Albert was introduced and welcomed as a visiting Rotarian. Attendance was, last week 90.07% and this week 84.77%. Albert Olson was welcomed back after a holiday in the south. A proposal was submitted to form an "Inner Wheel Club" among the Rotary Anns. A meeting of Rotarians and their Ladies will be held Monday, April 28th, with Mrs. Wanda Melton of the Winnipeg Club as speaker. The ladies will be invited to luncheon. Introduced by Rotarian Jack Penner, Miss Shanski must have accomplished something of a record in the number of slides she took during the entire trip. This included a picture of the new Alyshyn Aircraft in which she made the trip from Montreal to Moscow in ten and a half hours. With seating capacity for two hundred, the aircraft carried over one hundred passengers on the trip.

With Russia now seeking tourist business it was reported that some 85 new airliners are available for this business. The first series of pictures showed Moscow, its well known boulevard, with pedestrian traffic directed across in safety by underground tunnels, Red Square, the Kremlin, the Volga River, the new Hotel now building with 3,000 rooms, the regular and volunteer soldiers; St. Basil's Cathedral, University of Moscow, and innumerable apartments were shown in attractive descriptive slides with Miss Shanski commenting with keen knowledge on various scenes. Then, on to Leningrad, which is mostly waterways and mostly like Venice. The immense square here, Cathedral of Peter and Paul, Museum, Historic site where Soviet papers were signed creating the Republic, the famous Babai Baller, the Russian people fond of arts and the ballet; King the famous Ukrainian city, were all depicted.

There, the citizens enjoy equal pay for men and women, six hours a day work, two months holiday for the birth of a child; wages \$50 to \$150 a month which the pension equalled on retirement. Nursery Schools, Latin Statues everywhere; Professional soldiers, and men and women laborers working on the streets. In visiting in the Ukraine they found that wages ranged for 5% of income, and that cucumbers and sour cream was a popular diet. There were few individual homes in the larger cities, but apartments were in profusion, with 5 persons to an apartment. Dean L.M. Watts thanked the speaker for her interesting story of Russia and its people, the members were most appreciative.

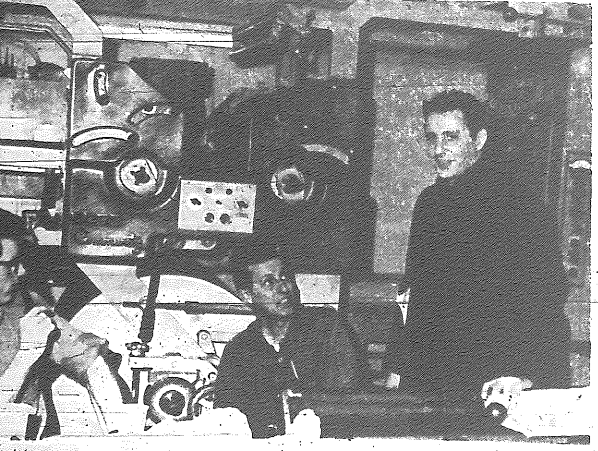
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HIGH SCHOOL POPULATION CONTINUES TO RISE

The Kenora Board of Education has been holding regular meetings to discuss academic considerations and the following items were discussed at the last meeting held in the Library at Beaver Brae Secondary School. Mr. Litt, Mr. Hayes, Mr. Cymbally and Mr. Uryniuk reported on the school enrollment and staff needs for September 1969. The enrolment in Beaver Brae has increased from four hundred and eighty (480) in 1963 to nine hundred and forty six (946) in September 1968. Next September, the number of pupils will rise to one thousand and seventy (1070) pupils. Lakewood enrolment is showing a steady increase: 1966 - 594, 1967-632, 1968-655, 1969-679. This increase in secondary school enrollment will cause additional teachers to be engaged.

The Primary Consultant, Miss Helen Steiner, gave a report on the operation of Kindergarten and grades one to three. The Board was pleased with the work being done in the primary grades and will consider the recommendations presented. A study is presently being undertaken by the Director and the Primary Consultant to consider the feasibility of opening the (Continued on Page 2)

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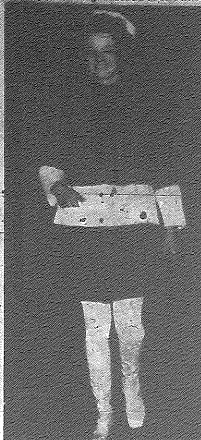
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KINETTES PRESENTED THE WORLD OF FASHION

Passenger car sales last month totalled 26,453 units compared with 19,948 in March 1967. A seven week strike which had affected sales, ended in late March last year. In March of 1967 passenger car sales were 24,754. Truck sales totalled 6,566 last month, 3,731 in March 1968 and 5,521 in March 1967. GM's calendar year to date sales of 74,713 passenger cars and 15,341 trucks are running well ahead of 1967 and 1967. Sales in the first three months of last year totalled 58,494 passenger cars and 12,239 trucks. In the same period of 1967 passenger car sales totalled 6,562 and truck sales were 13,271.

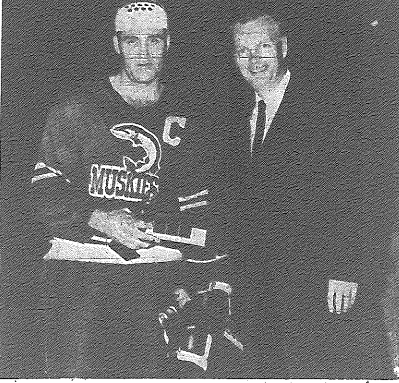

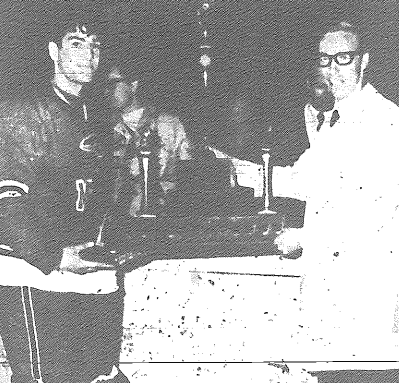

Lakehead "U" Faculty Asks 18% Pay Raise

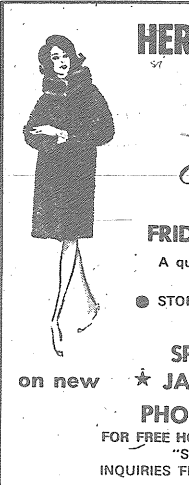
Port Arthur—The Faculty Association at the Lakehead University at Port Arthur is backing its salary demands with a program of sanctions against the University's administration. Doctor John Mothersill, President of the Association, said today the Faculty will withdraw from all Senate, President's and University committees. He said eight other sanctions will be implemented if necessary to support their demands. The Faculty is asking an 18 percent across-the-board salary increase. Doctor Mothersill said the salary schedules at Lakehead University are about 30 percent lower than at other Canadian Universities. He said the University has offered only a general nine-point-four-percent increase.

School Costs Causing Concern Says Wm. Davis

TORONTO—there is some concern over the way Ontario's schools are financed. And provincial education minister William Davis said yesterday he is taking another look into the matter because some county school boards say they face a financial crisis. Mr. Davis said he will make a statement shortly. The Government consolidated more than one thousand local school boards into county-sized boards, effective January 1st, 1969, and raised grants to them by six percent over last year's. In recent weeks, however, members of the legislature have received complaints about tax increases in some municipalities to meet rising school costs.

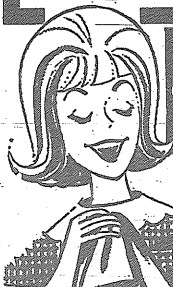

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Ice Fields Block River

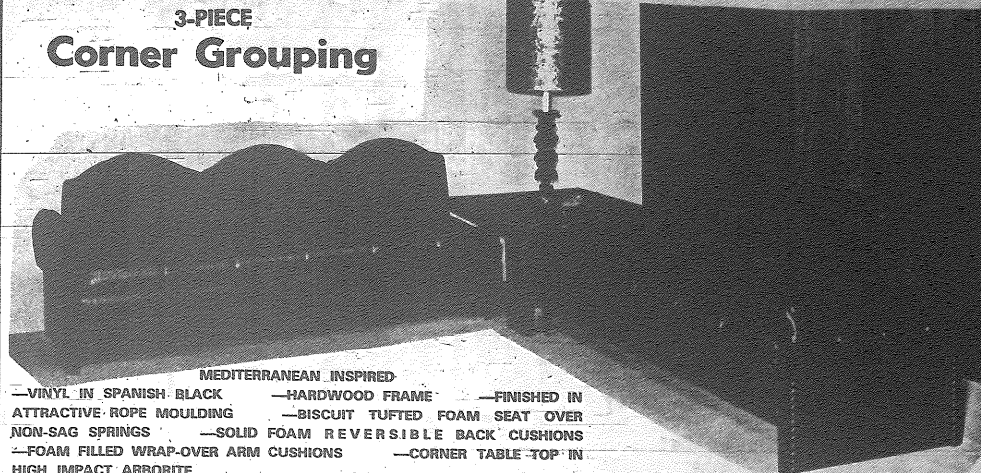
Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.—Three U.S. ice-breakers are trying to

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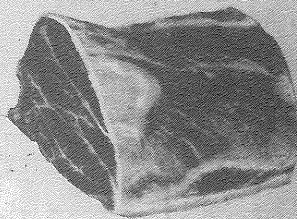
