KIN SHOW "PACK UP YOUR TROUBLES" BIG HIT

Last night "Pack Up Your Troubles" hit the boards at Lakewood High School, as the Kenora Kinsmen presented their eleventh Annual Show. In the opinion of this writer, this is the best show the Kinsmen have ever produced and I have been at all of the previous ten shows. From the enthusiastic response of the audience at Lakewood High School, it would seem they shared the same opinion.

The theme of the Show is World War I, and this provides an unlimited amount of scope for both humor and song. Sgt. Major Peter Delamere is more regimental than some of the real thing that I've seen! He even has the build for the part! And his voice and commands are so garbled that he could pass muster in a Guards Regiment.

The Show is produced and directed by Mike Roy and Mr. Music himself, Ernie Brose, is Musical director. Together, Mike and Ernie make an unbeatable team

when it comes to putting together a musical variety show that is designed for one thing—your entertainment.

I enjoyed the whole show, but I would be remiss if I did not mention certain highlights which particularly appealed. The all-male chorus is superb. Their rendition of "Bluebird of Happiness" is the best I have ever heard and, without any exaggeration, if you did not know better you would think that it was being sung by a professional troupe. Their finale, also is tremendous and it starts the shivers going up and down your spine, it is so moving. LATE NEWS BULLETINS

PRESIDENT NIXON MET WITH THE NATO FOREIGN MINISTERS IN WASHINGTON FOR EIGHTY MINUTES TODAY. HE DISCUSSED EAST WEST RELATIONS, DEFENCE MATTERS AND HIS DECISION TO GO AHEAD WITH CONSTRUCTION OF AN ANTI-BALLISTIC MISSILE SYSTEM. A SPOKESMAN SAYS NIXON SPOKE TO THE FOREIGN MINISTERS WITHOUT NOTES AND THEN REPLIED TO THEIR QUESTIONS. VIETNAM WAS NOT AMONG THE SUBJECTS DISCUSSED. THE SPOKESMAN WOULD NOT SAY WHETHER NIXON DISCUSSED THE QUESTION OF A NATO RESPONSE TO AN INVITATION FROM THE WARSAW PACT FOR A MEETING.

SOME TWENTY THOUSAND SANDBAGS ARE ON THEIR WAY TO WEYBURN, SASKATCHEWAN, WHERE SPRING FLOODWATER IS REPORTED LAPPING AT THE DOORSTEPS OF HOSPITAL BUILDINGS. AT LEAST FOURTEEN FAMILIES HAVE BEEN FORCED TO LEAVE THEIR HOMES. WEYBURN IS ON THE SOURIS RIVER SIXTY FIVE MILES SOUTH EAST OF REGINA. SEVENTEEN MILES NORTHWEST OF REGINA, SANDBAGGING OF DIKES CONTINUES AT LUMSDEN, A TOWN OF FOUR HUNDRED POPULATION, TO HOLD BACK THE QU'APPELLE RIVER — A FLOOD CREST HAD BEEN EXPECTED AT LUMSDEN TODAY BUT LATEST PREDICTIONS ARE THAT FLOOD CRESTS MOVING DOWN THE RIVER WON'T REACH THE TOWN UNTIL NEXT WEEK.

SPANISH POLICE HAVE CAPTURED NINE SUSPECTED BASQUE TERRORISTS IN NORTHERN SPAIN. POLICE SAY FOUR WERE CAPTURED TODAY AFTER A DAWN GUN BATTLE IN A REMOTE MOUNTAIN VILLAGE NEAR SANTANDER. THE FIVE OTHERS WERE ARRESTED IN THE CITY OF PAMPLONA. OFFICIALS SAY THAT AMONG THE FOUR WHO SURRENDERED AFTER THE BRIEF GUN BATTLE WAS A ROMAN CATHOLIC PRIEST. To Protest Police Act Amendments

Port Arthur—Police Associations in Port Arthur and Fort William say they are planning letters to protest proposed amendments to the Ontario Police Act.

The Associations in a statement last night said the changes, now before the legislature, will make policemen second class citizens. The amendments include giving police chiefs power to pension an officer who becomes mentally or physically disabled and the power to suspend an officer if he is suspected of committing a crime.

The Associations said they planned to inform local MLAs of their concern.

Woods Safety Personnel To Hold Annual Meeting

The Annual meeting of the Northwestern (Woods) Branch, Ontario Pulp and Paper Makers Safety Association, will be held Thursday, April 17th at the Prince Arthur Motor Hotel in Ft. Arthur. Fred Soughton, Industrial Relations Consultant, Kimberly Clark Pulp and Paper Company Limited, Terrace Bay, will direct the discussion of Communications, main theme of the meeting.

Delegates representing the Woods Departments of Pulp & Paper companies from Kenora, Dryden, Fort Frances, Terrace Bay, Long Lac and Caramat as well as from the Lakehead, will be in attendance.

Author of many articles and data sheets related to accident prevention, Mr. Soughton is general chairman of the National Safety Council executive committee and a member of the Society of Safety Engineers. He was chairman of the Second World Conference on the Prevention of Occupational Accidents held in Brussels, Belgium, and was twice invited by the President of the United States to attend international seminars, earning an enviable reputation as a consultant in industrial relations.

His practical experience includes more than 20 years of active involvement in management and training and development in university and community environment for professional and trade associations and institutes.

OPP Members Get Increases

TORONTO Ontario government negotiators and Ontario Provincial Police representatives Wednesday agreed on a new one-year contract which gives policemen wage boosts of up to 14 per cent.

The agreement provides for a yearly salary of \$9,257 for a first-class constable, an increase of \$957. A corporal's salary now is \$9,975, an increase of \$1,075.

Sergeants get a \$1,205 increase for a salary of \$9,705. Staff sergeants get \$10,970 under the new agreement, an increase of \$1,197.

Clothing allowance has been increased by \$50 to \$250 a year.

New Northern Ontario Maps Now Available

The Department of Highways 1969 Northern Ontario Road Map is now available.

Copies may be obtained, free of charge, from the Information Section, Department of Highways, Downsview, Ontario and at all Department of Highways' Offices throughout the Province; the Department of Tourism and Information, 185 Bloor Street East Toronto 5, Ontario; the Department's Tourist Reception Centers at border crossing points in Southern Ontario and at Service Centers on highway 400 and 401.

D.O.T. Assumes Weather Program At Armstrong

On April 1st the Meteorological Branch of the Department of Transport assumed responsibility for the weather observing program from the Armstrong, Ontario Airport, formerly un-

dertaken by Telecommunications Staff who also provided air-ground contact with pilots. With the development of improved navigational aids and communications, the Department is now able to control flight operations from other major centers across the country. Radio range facilities were decommissioned following the installation of a non-directional beacon. Maintenance of the airfield will also be discon-

tinued. The Meteorological Branch will employ four Technicians to maintain a reporting system of hourly aviation weather reports and six hourly synoptic reports which are distributed both nationally and internationally to other countries of the world.

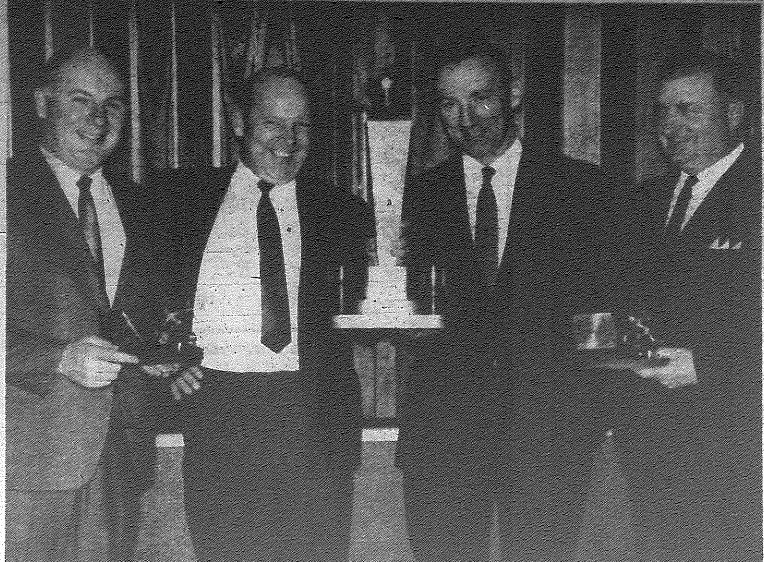

Pay System For J.P.'s To Change - Turner

Yellowknife N.W.T. — Federal justice minister John Turner indicated today that the pay-for conviction system for Justices of the Peace in the Northwest Territories will be ended. The move is part of a series of changes in the administration of justice in Canada's far North.

Mr. Turner, who is on a northern trip, issued a statement in Yellowknife acknowledging that the present pay-system for justices of the peace, requires revision, because they are paid only in the case of conviction. He said: "A more satisfactory scheme will

be implemented." This is just one of 74 recommendations made by Mr. Justice W. G. Morrow following an inquiry into territory justice. Mr. Turner said most of the Morrow recommendations have been implemented, and all have been dealt

with by the justice department. Although the Morrow report deals only with the Northwest Territories, many of its recommendations apply to the neighboring Yukon Territory and will be instituted there. Mr. Turner also spoke today of the Carrothers report prepared by a 1965-66 Commission headed

by professor A.W.R. Carrothers, then dean of law at the university of Western Ontario. The minister said this report, which recommended more self-government for the Territories, is receiving "sympathetic consideration in the light of constitutional and practical considerations."

Ottawa, April 8th, 1969—Construction on a \$2,404,480 contract to build 67 miles of trunk highway between Fort Providence and Fort Simpson in the Northwest Territories will begin in a few weeks, the Honorable Jean Chretien announced here today. The two year contract to extend the Mackenzie Highway to Fort Simpson, has been awarded to T.A. Klenke and Sons Construction Limited of Medicine Hat Alberta. The contract covers construction between mile 229 and mile 296, of this highway, mile 296 being at Fort Simpson. Eventually, the Mackenzie Highway will extend up to the Arctic coast at Tuktoyaktuk, 1049 miles from the Alberta-NWT boundary.

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From Around The World

Quebec's three teachers' unions remain uncertain today on how to enforce demands that their 20-month-old contract dispute be settled. A meeting yesterday failed to produce any concrete results. Raymond Laliberte, head of the Quebec Teachers' corporation, hinted after yesterday's meeting that coordinated action by the three groups may not be necessary. He said there are four possible courses of action: a general strike, one-day walkouts, mass resignations or black listing of Quebec School boards.

Britain's delegate to the United Nations, Lord Caradon is expected to arrive in Anguilla today on a second trouble-shooting mission. His visit comes following fresh scuffles between the islanders and British occupying forces. Caradon spent three days in Anguilla last month and concluded an interim agreement on the island's constitutional crisis.

Communist forces have shelled 45 more South Vietnamese towns and bases, possibly signalling the start of a new and more violent phase of their offensive. Hordes hit were two provincial capitals where at least 21 persons were killed and 200 wounded.

Initial reports say 15 persons were killed and 105 wounded when more than 100 mortar rounds hit the provincial capital of Vinh Long Southwest of Saigon. And at Tay Ninh, at least 100 persons were killed or wounded and about eight others have not been accounted for.

South Vietnam's President Thieu is said to have rejected a Viet Cong suggestion for a coalition government. The chief Viet Cong negotiator in Paris had suggested a few days ago the communists would accept such a government even if no communists held cabinet posts. Thieu is reported to have turned down the suggestion at a meeting today with Vietnamese newsmen. He was quoted as describing the negotiator's proposal as more evidence of "communist insolence and stubbornness."

The Israeli Foreign Ministry has declined to comment officially on the latest peace plan advanced by Jordan's King Hussein but political sources say Jerusalem does not see anything new in the plan.

One source close to Jerusalem's policy makers said, "if the Arabs have a constructive plan, let them

come forward with it to the negotiating table." Hussein outlined the plan in a speech yesterday before ending a visit in Washington.

British defence sources say the strongest Soviet fleet seen in the Atlantic in years has passed through the strait of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean. The sources say at least 17 warships have passed through the Strait and

the location of two others is uncertain. U.S. Sixth Fleet spokesmen say there now are about 45 Soviet warships in the Mediterranean. The buildup comes as Nato ships and planes prepare for battle man-oeuvres in the Mediterranean later this month.

An aide says Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery is in poor health.

The 81 year old British war hero will not be able to attend a memorial service in London Monday for former U.S. President Eisenhower. Montgomery served as British Ground Commander in Europe under Eisenhower's allied command during the Second World War.

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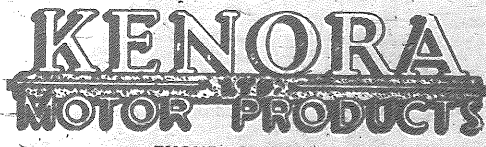

**"We Played Well Enough"
Says Bruin Coach, "But..."**

During his eleven-year National Hockey League career with the Montreal Canadiens, Ralph Backstrom has made few spectacular headlines. He generally works quietly but effectively in the shadow of the team's more prolific scorers. This season, for instance, he scored only 13 goals in 72 games.

However, the 31-year-old native of Kirkland Lake, Ontario, is considered an extremely valuable asset by the Canadiens' management. And he's well respected by rival players for his tenacious checking ability.

Backstrom underlined his value last night with one of the biggest goals of his career. His shot found the range after only 42 seconds of overtime to give the Canadiens a come-from-behind 3-2 win over the Boston Bruins in the opener of the Stanley Cup Eastern Division Final.

In addition, Backstrom tied up Boston's biggest threat, Phil Esposito, the NHL scoring champion with a record-breaking 126 points. Esposito was held to only three shots on Montreal goalie, Gump Worsley.

It was a heart-breaker for the Bruins, who held a 2-0 lead with only seven minutes left in the third period. The Bruins flew back to Boston immediately after the game and will return tomorrow in time for the second contest Sunday afternoon.

Bruins' coach, Harry Sinden said the Bruins lost because they lost sight of their game plan to forecheck the Canadiens. He added: "We played well enough, but that last ten minutes - when he got away from the game plan killed us".

Coach Red Kelly is singing the praises of his Los Angeles Kings today and hopes they are capable of coming up with one more big effort. The Kings edged the Oakland Seals 4-3 on Los Angeles ice last night to extend the Stanley Cup Quarter-Final series to a seventh and deciding game. The winner of Sunday's big game in Oakland will advance against the St. Louis Blues in the Western Division Finals.

Seals' coach Fred Glover said his team lost because of poor passing. The Seals had taken a 2-1 victory over the Kings just the night previous in Oakland.

Kelly paid particular tribute to defencemen, Bill White, Brent Hughes, Dave Almadio and Dale Rolfe for their outstanding play.

Oakland centres, Bob Dillabough and Mike Loughton suffered injuries. Dillabough, who previously had hurt a shoulder, banged it again in a collision with Rolfe. Loughton re-injured a groin and saw only limited action.

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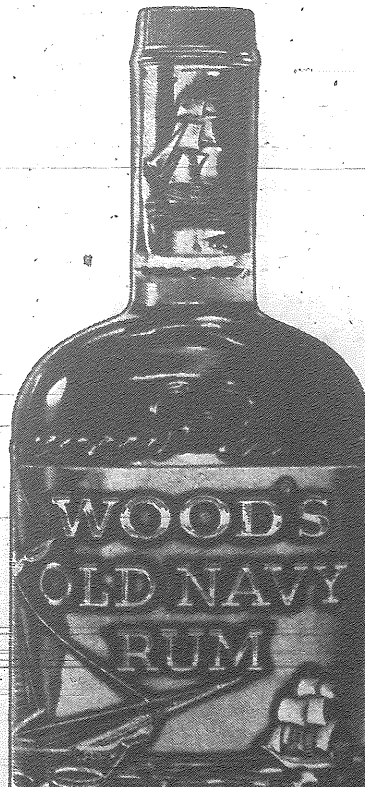

March Of Dimes Gets New Name

Inflation and changing medical needs are reflected in the decision of the March of Dimes in Ontario to change its name. — Geoffrey P. Dewar, president of the Rehabilitation Foundation for the Disabled, announced that the name of the organization's campaign has been changed from

March of Dimes to "The Ability Fund." "There are several reasons for doing this," Mr. Dewar explained. "One of them is the fact that a dime is worth a lot less than it was when the name was invented during the Hungry Thirties. Another is the fact that the public still associates the March of Dimes with polio, in spite of the fact that the fight against paralytic polio was largely won with the Salk vaccine

in 1955. The Rehabilitation Foundation for some years now has been concerned with physically disabled adults, no matter what kind of accident or disease has been the cause of their disability." The president explained that the Ability Fund also suggests the function of the Foundation, which is to take advantage of the abilities a disabled person has left by helping him to find suitable work. Mr. Dewar said the new name

would be used in conjunction with a new symbol, adopted last year—an evergreen tree with one branch missing—which replaced the maple leaf which had served as the organization's symbol, surmounted by the words—March of Dimes. "This completes the transition to our new look," he said. The March of Dimes, he said, would not be dropped but phased out over a period of time so the public would learn to identify one with the other. Mr. Dewar pointed out that the

new symbol, after being adopted by the Ontario Organization, was offered to and accepted by the Canadian Rehabilitation Council as a national symbol of help for disabled adults. The Rehabilitation Foundation is a member of the Council, as are similar organizations for rehabilitation of adults and children in all provinces. The new campaign name, The Ability Funds, has also been offered to the Council for use throughout the country, Mr. Dewar said.

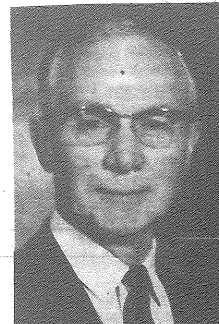

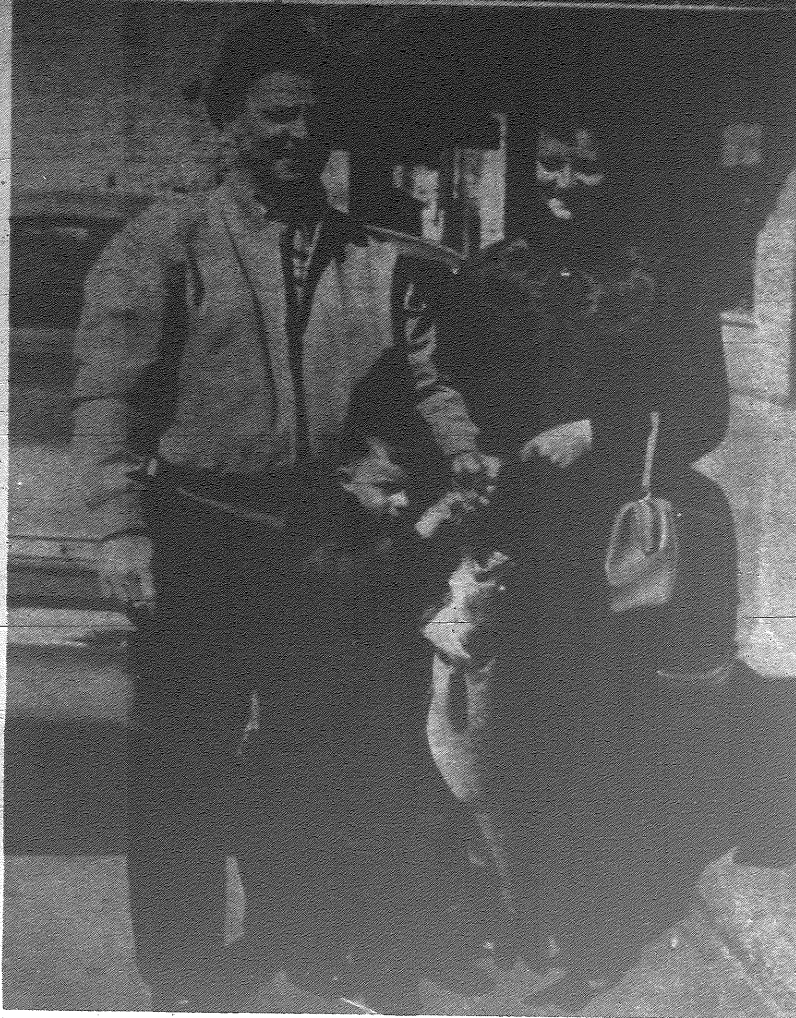

Editor,

Miner and News,
Kenora.

I thought perhaps I could relay my thoughts to you that your influence may be felt amongst those with which my thoughts are directed. Also that the Lord may give direction to men in high places.

What purpose this war is, I do not understand; to see the young not but run, up to beg a cigarette and hear the youth of our beloved country shout curses at them and hear some returned. They know not why we've come. Good old Uncle Sam! Give them some food, a pack of cigarettes, a poncho liner in payment of a man's 10 minute staffaction because he can't control his lust. These thoughts and obscenities

are burned upon the minds of the people.

Ask—any man; is this war purposeful? Do you believe you are fighting for a cause? Are you helping these people? But one answer is ever heard—No! We only help those who live in high places, not the villager. We fight not for our country but for politicians. It could be ended suddenly with one bomb or one withdrawal, and yet they talk so aimlessly. We are so afraid to take a stand, to be demanding, because after all, what is the life of one man you do not know?

Here we sit upon a hill inside our bunkers waiting for someone to climb up so we can kill him. Is this the road to peace? What have we accomplished at hill top? We are defenders of what? To Thwart A Thief

GUN THEFTS are on the rise. Many of the victims are gun dealers and collectors, but most are sportsmen. There's not much the honest, run-of-the-field hunter and shooter can do about it except insure, take certain precautions, and trust to luck. Your guns may be fully covered in your home policy under "household contents"—but don't count on it. Check with your agent to be sure. You may even want to insure them under a special rider. In any case, be sure an exact valuation is placed on

each gun, by serial number, and that you have a full list of the serial numbers of your guns on file.

What can be done to keep guns from being stolen? Little snuff—but these steps may help:

While on a hunting trip, even for the day, never leave guns or gun cases in a car where they can be seen. If you stay in a motel, always take your guns in with you at night. A thief can spot a hunter's car a mile away, and knows it's a treasure trove of guns, cameras and binoculars.

We know city shooters who won't even put sportsmen's club decals on their car windows.

If you have a gun cabinet at home, place it where it can't be seen from the outside. Better yet, keep your guns hidden. We know a hunter who keeps a full gun cabinet stocked with "Leaner" guns as a decoy for burglars, and his good guns are stashed elsewhere. A farmer friend keeps only his work guns at home—a couple of .22's and an old shotgun. The rest of his muskets are kept hidden with a friend in town. One of our local trapshooters, who also lives on a farm, may take his best guns with him in the trunk of his car when he leaves home for the day. Don't keep guns where they can be seen by casual visitors in

your house, and never display them to strangers. It doesn't pay to advertise. In the past two years, three of our personal friends have had all their guns stolen from their homes. In each case, it was public or semi-public knowledge that they owned good guns:

1. A well-known outdoor writer and editor who works at home.
2. A hunter who displayed his guns on the walls of his family room.
3. A business man who received publicity as a big-game hunter. It doesn't pay to advertise. In fact, some of this increase in gun thefts may be a reflection of all the publicity that guns and gun ownership have gotten

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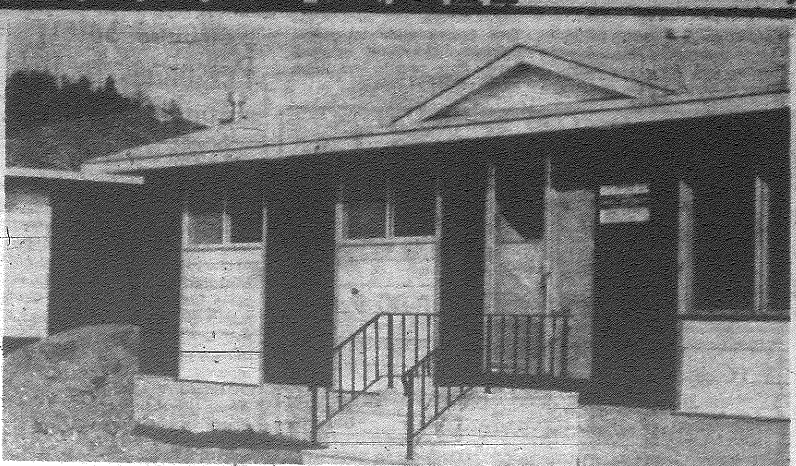

Mills Big Pollution Problem

TORONTO — An official of the Ontario Water Resources Commission said Tuesday only 30 of the province's 42 pulp and paper mills control pollution at a satisfactory level, but all

would be brought up to OWRC standards eventually.

"The pulp and paper industry is the one big pollution problem industry left in Ontario," said the official, who refused to be named.

He was commenting in an interview on remarks Tuesday by Thomas Bell, president of Abitibi Paper Co. Ltd., who said it would cost his company \$35,000,000 to clean up pollution at its Ontario plants. The official

said it was a reasonable estimate.

He said it could cost \$100,000,000 to clean up industrial pollution from pulp and paper plants in Ontario.

"Many of these mills are 50 to 60 years old and to install proper pollution control equipment involves tearing them all apart to get the equipment in," he said.

He said the consumer will end up paying in the long run.
