LATE NEWS BULLETINS

BANKING CIRCLES IN WEST GERMANY HAVE BEEN PREDICTING REVALUATION OF THE MARK MIGHT COME SATURDAY. IN THE MEANTIME, SPECULATION AGAINST THE DOLLAR, THE POUND, STERLING AND THE FRENCH FRANC CONTINUES. TRADING IS REPORTED HECTIC ON THE CURRENCY EXCHANGES. THE WEST GERMAN CENTRAL BANK IS BUYING U.S. DOLLARS IN A SUPPORT MOVE AND THE BANK OF ENGLAND IS BUYING POUNDS. THE BANK OF FRANCE, WITH THE SAME END IN VIEW, IS SELLING WEST GERMAN MARKS.

THE TWO SIDES IN THE AIR CANADA STRIKE HAVE RESUMED DIRECT TALKS IN MONTREAL. AN AIR CANADA SPOKESMAN SAYS THEY WILL TRY TO SETTLE NINE REMAINING ECONOMIC ITEMS IN A NEW WORKING AGREEMENT. IT IS NOT KNOWN WHAT THE ISSUES ARE, OTHER THAN THAT THEY CONCERN ECONOMIC MATTERS. MORE THAN SIX THOUSAND MEMBERS OF THE INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF MACHINISTS AND AIRSPACE WORKERS WENT ON STRIKE AGAINST AIR CANADA ON APRIL 20TH. THE AIRLINE'S ENTIRE FLEET OF 108 PLANES IS GROUNDED.

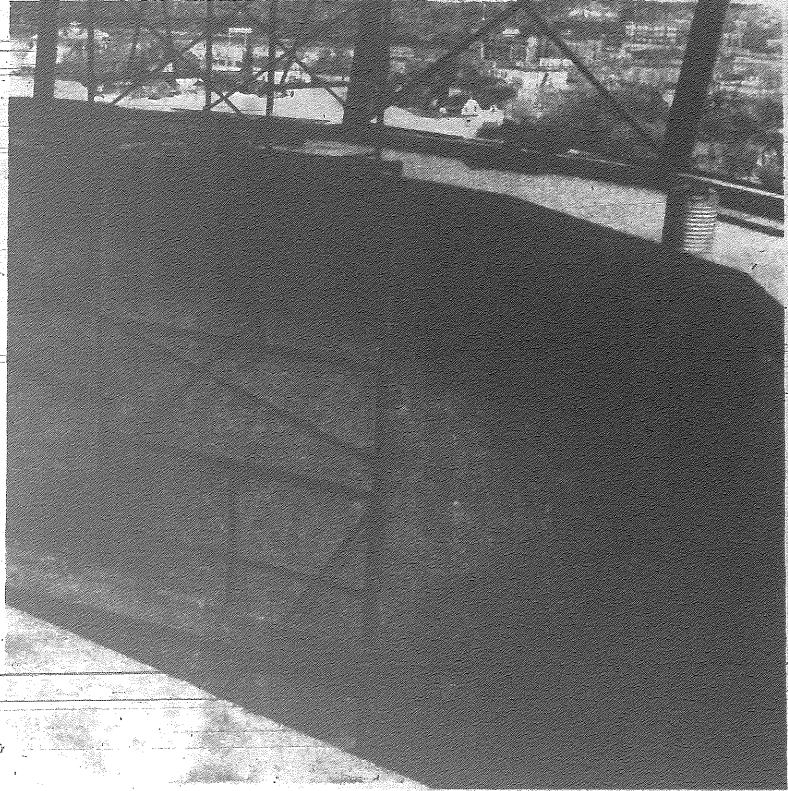
NEGOTIATIONS AIMED AT ENDING A 22 MONTH CONTRACT DISPUTE BETWEEN QUEBEC'S 70 THOUSAND TEACHERS AND THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ARE UNDER WAY IN QUEBEC CITY. THE TALKS ARE BEING HELD BEHIND CLOSED DOORS IN THE OFFICE OF MARCEL MASSE, MINISTER WITHOUT PORTFOLIO RESPONSIBLE FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE. HE SAYS THE GOVERNMENT AND SCHOOL BOARD REPRESENTATIVES ARE PREPARED TO OPEN WHAT HE CALLS "CERTAIN DOORS" ON CONTRACT QUESTIONS— BUT ARE NOT WILLING TO DISCUSS FINANCIAL MATTERS AT THE MOMENT.

IN THE QUEBEC CITY AREA, MORE THAN NINE HUNDRED TEACHERS ARE ON A ONE-DAY STRIKE. SOME TWENTY THOUSAND STUDENTS ARE HAVING AN UNSCHEDULED HOLIDAY.

IN WASHINGTON, J. EDGAR HOOVER HAS DENIED RUMORS HE WILL STEP DOWN SATURDAY ON HIS 45TH ANNIVERSARY AS DIRECTOR OF THE F.B.I. THIS IS HOW HE PUT IT IN AN INTERVIEW: "I HAVE MANY PLANS AND ASPIRATIONS FOR THE FUTURE, BUT NONE OF THEM INCLUDES RETIREMENT." AT 74, HOOVER IS MORE THAN FOUR YEARS PAST THE MANDATORY RETIREMENT AGE FOR U.S. FEDERAL EMPLOYEES.

Work Stops At New Hotel

Workmen have left their jobs at the construction site of the new Holiday Inn of Kenora, but hopes are voiced that the dispute will be settled by the weekend. While no official locally would speak for publication, the M&N learned that the troubles of the project will be discussed at a meeting in Winnipeg, tomorrow.

A M&N Photographer toured the structure today, and found solid progress from a visit a month ago. Hopes had been entertained that two of the suites in the hotel would be open for public

Elevators have been tested with temporary power, and other major work completed.

A few workmen on the job today are clearing the parking deck of many heavy timbers used in the earlier stages of construction.

The charges were laid following investigation into the death of the Bruyeres' nine-month-old son, Michael Paul Jr.

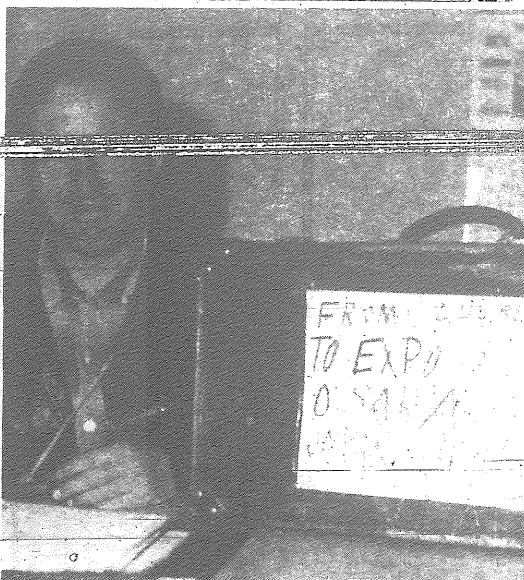

I have been assured, stated Mr. Reid, that the Indian Bands will be fully consulted on any decision to close down an Agency Office, or to remove existing services.

Warns Against Kite Flying Near Wires

Ontario Hydrs today warned parents and children against flying kites and model airplanes near power lines. The warning came in the wake of incidents across Ontario in which young people have been injured when kites have become entangled in electrical wires. While Kite Flying provides endless hours of fun for the young—and the not-so-young, caution is needed. A sudden gust of wind can carry a kite into a power line, which carries many times the voltages found at home. Because electricity will take the shortest route to the ground, metal struts, metallic wire, wire-reinforced string and even damp string will act as a conductor. The best way to enjoy kites and model airplanes is to fly them in open spaces, away from power lines.

C.B.C. To Cut Out Tobacco Advertising

Ottawa—The CBC is giving up tobacco advertising and all sponsorship of programs by tobacco companies on both its radio and television networks.

Direct tobacco promotion and sponsorship of programs by tobacco firms will disappear as current contracts end. This step means the last tobacco ad on the CBC likely will be seen this summer.

The Publicly-owned Corporation announced the step yesterday, and a spokesman said today he knows of no contracts for such advertising or sponsorship extending into September. Starting immediately, no new contracts for tobacco ads or for sponsorship of programs by tobacco companies will be accepted.

A spokesman said dates vary on the advertising contracts for tobacco now in effect with the CBC. Some will remain valid through the summer season. But here are none in effect for the Fall season starting in September, and none will be signed for that season.

Murray Chercover, president of the CTV network, would not comment on whether CTV is likely to follow the CBC lead.

John Bassett, publisher of the Toronto Telegram and head of CFTO-TV, said the Toronto Station has "been considering for quite some time" ending tobacco advertisements and that a decision will be reached before the signing of advertisement contracts this fall.

Earle Richards, Vice-President

and General Manager of the Toronto Globe and Mail, said the newspaper will follow the law with regard to tobacco advertising. He said: "If it's legal we'll carry it."

Beland Honderich, publisher of the Toronto Star, said: "You tell me what the Globe is going to do and I'll tell you what the Star will do."

Williams Leaves Stampeders

The man who guided the Calgary Stampeders to their first Grey Cup game in 19 years, Jerry Williams, has left the team to seek a coaching job with the Nat-

ional Football League's Philadelphia Eagles. Eagles' General Manager Pete Rozelle says the selection of a head coach has not been settled by Williams' resignation as coach of the Canadian Football League Team. However in Philadelphia, the Associated Press learned that Williams will get the coaching job. An official announcement is expected to be made within the next week.

Previously, Rozelle said that Williams is a top candidate for the job, but he said he was also talking to other candidates.

Williams made his resignation from the Stampeders official yesterday, when he told a news conference in Calgary he was exercising his contract rights by terminating his agreement with the club. He spent five years with the Stampeders, the last four as head coach.

Last season, Calgary finished second in the Western Conference but won the playoffs. The Stamps lost to Ottawa Rough Riders in the Grey Cup final in Toronto. It was the first time the Stampeders had competed in the East-West Classic since 1949.

The Canadian embassy in Stockholm says Canada will meet representatives of Communist China in Stockholm to negotiate on diplomatic recognition. A spokesman for the embassy says the negotiations will begin in the middle of May and the embassy has no knowledge of external affairs Mitchell Sharp being in Stockholm for the negotiations. Instead, Blair Seaborn, head of the Far East Division of the

External Affairs Department is expected to be in Stockholm for the negotiations. Seaborn took part in establishing a Washington-Hanoi Contact in 1966-67. At that time Canada acted as messenger for the United States in fruitless peace contacts with North Vietnam.

The Soviet government has taken a major step toward ratification of the nuclear non-proliferation treaty. And the official news agency Tass indicates final parliamentary approval could come next month.

Tass says the Soviet Council of ministers submitted the treaty to the presidium and the presidium passed it on to the foreign affairs commissions of the two houses of parliament. Tass adds the Soviet parliament will make the final decision and is expected to hold its next session in June.

The Soviet union has rejected the U.S. concept of a treaty to ban nuclear arms and weapons of mass destruction for the sea bed. The Soviet delegate told the 17 nation disarmament conference in Geneva today the kind of ban proposed by the U.S. would be insufficient. In another development at the conference, Brazil called for speedy agreement on a treaty to ban underground nuclear tests. But it demanded exceptions for peaceful explosions.

The West German news Magazine Der Spiegel says Israel has at least five and probably six 20 kiloton atomic bombs. In this week's edition, the publication adds that the bombs were produced in a top-secret Israeli Atomic Reactor in the Negev Desert.

There were reports in January that Israel had the bomb or was about to develop it, but Israel denied the reports. Israel remained silent today on the report.

Saigon police say the Viet Cong apparently have launched a new terror campaign in the city. Five attacks last night and today -

killed five Vietnamese and wounded 43 Vietnamese and six Americans. In the worst attack, two bombs exploded in a crowded

room of Saigon's Central post-office. Military authorities today disclosed an operation begun May

5th and designed to put the Saigon Government back in control of an island southeast of Da Nang.

**NURSING DEPARTMENT
NOW FULLY STAFFED**

The report of Miss P. Shanski, Director of Nursing at the Lake of the Woods District Hospital reveals a very happy situation regarding the nursing staff, in which an acute shortage of nurses during the summer months has now been overcome. This reported as due to the recruitment program, now at a level where it can supply staff needs as required.

A system of permanent Staff Health

program was established and maintained by the newly appointed staff Health Nurse. Later it was planned to make this program an integral part of the personnel department. In-service education of nursing staff, along with other personnel has been more accurately defined, with a definite program and under an in-service coordinator.

Last fall, the Candy Striper Program was renewed. This time it included the students from Lakewood High School, as well as Beaver Brae Secondary School. This was a most encouraging response by the students, so a quota had to be established to provide the most efficient care of the patients.

The establishment of the Nursing Assistant Training Center in 1967 was hailed as a most notable event, with the first class graduating in June, 1968. This graduation provided several new staff members. Praise is given to Sister Carignan for her direction and preparation of Nurses. The nursing personnel was encouraged to participate in institutes, conferences and conventions, as well as local lectures and demonstrations by Medical Staff.

The passing of Miss Pearl Affleck was mourned as a great loss of a dedicated nurse. Sister T. F. Carignan, R.N., B.S.N., Director of the Training Center reported on its activities with 25 students graduating from the first class, including one male; and twenty eight admitted for the second course, of which three withdrew for personal reasons.
