Escapee Sent Back To U.S.

Winnipeg--Gordon Dale Ervin, Recaptured in Winnipeg last Saturday after nearly four years of fugitive's freedom, has been returned to the U.S. to resume a 50 to 60 year sentence for armed robbery. RCMP said Ervin waived extradition and was turned over to FBI agents at 2 p.m. yesterday in Pembina, N.D. On the most-wanted lists of both the FBI and the RCMP, Ervin was arrested without a struggle in the rooming house where he lived - under the alias of David G. Anderson. He had escaped October 28th, 1965 from a State Prison at Jackson, Michigan and had spent two years in Winnipeg employed as a floor-tile layer.

Over 1000 Youngsters Enjoy Theatre

On Wednesday, June 11, more than 1000 youngsters in Kenora area elementary schools, were treated to a performance by the Theatre Arts class from Beaver Brae Secondary School. YOUTHS PLEAD GUILTY TO BREAKING - ENTERING

Several Kenora youths appeared before Judge J.V. Fregeau this morning, to answer charges of breaking, entering and theft, and possession of stolen goods. One youth pleaded guilty to having in his possession a transistor radio which he knew had been stolen

He was remanded until June 20, while a pre-sentence report is being prepared. A second youth pleaded guilty to breaking into a home and stealing a transistor radio, record player and a small amount of cash and a number of records.

LATE NEWS BULLETINS

Federal Agriculture Minister Olson said today he is delighted about the increased prices being received by beef producers. Mr. Olson said in Ottawa it's the first raise that Canadian Beef Producers have received in twenty years. And in a statement he went on to say: "I can't think of another group of people in Canada outside of farmers—who have gone without a raise for two decades." The statement said profit margins for beef producers have been shrinking steadily for twenty years, and many beef producers gave up and left the industry.

The Toronto Stock Market reported active trading today, with prices declining for the tenth day in a row. However, there was a sign of a rally during the first hour of trading today. The market index has fallen more than 15 points in nine days—the largest such slump in the history of the Toronto Exchange.

The government has introduced legislation to provide federal subsidies to truckers and railways moving goods out of the four Atlantic Provinces, the Lower St. Lawrence and Gaspé Regions. The measure, which was given first reading in the House of Commons, would authorize payments covering up to 30 percent of the shipping charges within the Atlantic Region itself on goods bound for other parts of Canada.

The U.S. Government has brought a Civil Anti-Trust suit against United States Steel Corporation. The suit charges the huge firm with using reciprocal purchase arrangements in an attempt to monopolize sales of Steel and Steel products.

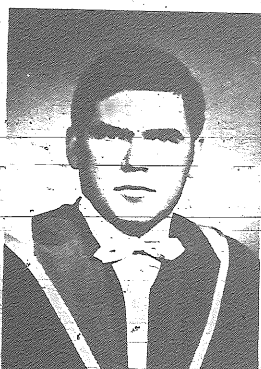
A Canadian Forces Dakota, based in Winnipeg, has arrived in the Norman Wells area, 900 miles north of Edmonton, to search for a helicopter. A second Dakota is also being brought in to help with the search. A Civilian Otter plane was out looking for the missing helicopter yesterday. 3 persons were on the helicopter which has been missing since Wednesday on a 200 miles flight.

A U.S. navy helicopter with six men aboard has crashed into the sea off San Diego, California. Two bodies were recovered and a search is on for survivors. The copter was on a medical evacuation mission.

President Nixon announced today, he will nominate Adolph William Schmidt to be new U.S. Ambassador to Canada. Schmidt is an investment management executive from Pittsburgh.

THREE BISHOPS TO BE CONSECRATED

On Tuesday evening, June 24th in Winnipeg, the Centennial Concert Hall will be the scene of an unusual service of interest to the people of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario.

The newly-elected Bishops of 3 Anglican Dioceses will be consecrated by the Archbishop of Rupert's Land, and Primate of the Anglican church of Canada, the Most Reverend Howard H. Clark. Assisting Archbishop Clark will be nine Bishops from Western Canada and the Arctic, as well as Bishops of the Episcopal (Anglican) Church from Minnesota, and

North Dakota.

To be consecrated Bishop of Brandon, is the Very Reverend Thomas Wilfred Wilkinson, Dean of St. Matthew's Cathedral, Brandon. The Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Redeemer, Calgary, the Very Reverend Hugh Vernon Stiff, will become Bishop

of Keewatin, residing in Kenora. The new Co-adjutor, Bishop of Rupert's Land is the Very Reverend Barry Valentine, Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, in Montreal.

He succeeds the Right Reverend John O. Andersen, who was installed as Bishop of British Columbia on April 17th in Victoria. The triple Consecration Service will be recorded on video tape

by the CBC for broadcast at a later date. Special guests will

include Clergy and Church leaders. Admission will be by ticket distributed through Anglican Churches in the three Dioceses.

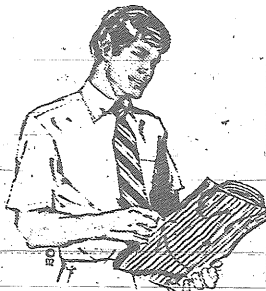

Youths Plead Guilty

The home owner told the police he had been away on vacation and on his return found that someone had entered through a window and ransacked the place, making off with several articles. Subsequent police investigation led to the arrest of the accused. All items were recovered. The youth was remanded until June 20th for sentence pending preparation of pre-sentence report.

A young Kenora man pleaded guilty to theft of a lantern and gasoline from a trailer site at Anticline Park. He was remanded till June 20th for sentence.

A Kenora youth pleaded guilty to breaking and entering two premises the night of May 30th. He was charged with breaking into the Mines and News and the Shell Marina. Court was told that entry to the Newspaper plant had been gained through a side window. The offices had been ransacked, a dispensing machine broken into from which cash had been stolen.

A punch-tape machine was damaged. A total amount of damage was estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$750.00. Police said the youth could give no explanation for his actions.

At Shell Marina, vending machines were tampered with and a total of \$68.65 taken.

In giving evidence, Sergeant Engstrom said he had received excellent cooperation from the accused and the father of the accused. This lad was also remanded until June 20th for sentence. In the meantime a pre-sentence report is being prepared.

Money-Saving Moving Tips Offered By Ken's

Planning a longdistance move this summer? And you want to keep the cost as low as you can?

Well, the first bit of advice a professional mover gives is not to shop around just to get the lowest price. This may turn out to be the most expensive thing you can do, says Ken McKinnis, President of Ken's Storage Limited, a local Allied Van Lines Ltd. member.

"In selecting a moving firm, a family should not always make the choice on the basis of the lowest estimate or proposal, Ken McKinnis indicates.

He noted that an estimate is not a guarantee of the total moving cost and is only intended to be a helpful guide to both the family and the mover.

The accuracy of an estimate is dependent upon not only the experience and integrity of the mover, but also upon the cooperation of the family in showing everything that is to be moved. "All too often it has been our experience

Ken continued, "that the customer forgets to show items to be moved that are in the attic, garage, or basement. He then has a tendency to blame us for his oversight."

A frank discussion of other services that may be required by the family, such as packing, appliance services, and the like, will also aid the mover in preparing an accurate estimate. Why do final moving costs sometimes vary from those shown on the original estimate? "That is due to the fact that moving costs are based upon the actual weight of the goods, distance to be shipped, plus costs of any other services ordered and performed.

These rates and charges are regulated by the various Transport Boards in each province," Ken stated.

"In this regard, select a reliable and conscientious mover since he will be more likely to provide the family with an estimate that approximates the actual or final moving cost," Ken added.

Ken also offers these additional points about the moving business that may help keep family moving costs down. Throw things away before you move, not after.

If you think you have items you won't be using in the new home sell them, or give them away before moving, and you'll save on the weight of your shipment. Dismantle or disconnect your curtains and drapery fixtures, win-

dow fans, air conditioners, television antennas, hi-fi and stereo sets, large wall clocks, and the like. If the mover must do these things on his own time, it will cost extra.

Also, other services, such as packing and storage, are subject to additional charges and should

be discussed beforehand with the moving company representative. "Packing services cost extra, but with dishes, china, glassware and other breakables involved, it can be a very good investment to let a professional do it for you," Ken said. If you pack these items yourself, the mover is not res-

ponsible for breakage resulting from improper packing and retains the right to repack any containers not properly packed before accepting them.

A realistic appraisal and evaluation of your household goods for proper transit coverage should be considered in advance. Your mover will be glad to explain in detail the types of coverage available to you.

"One final thought," Ken concluded, "is that an overwhelming

number of customers want to move between the 25th day of one month and the 2nd day of the following month to take advantage of home or apartment leases. We certainly would like to have our customers give some thought to moving in the middle of the month as we could accommodate them much better during that particular period."

From Around The World

The Soviet Union and Congo Brazzaville today recognized the new Provisional Revolutionary government - of South Vietnam. Premier Kosygin announced the Soviet move during a meeting of the Kremlin with a representative of the South Vietnamese Liberation Front. A number of Communist and Leftist countries also have recognized the Provisional Government since it was proclaimed Tuesday. Among them are North Vietnam, North Korea, Yugoslavia, Romania and Cuba.

The U.S. Command in Vietnam has acknowledged that American Army observation helicopters violated Cambodia air space on May 30th. One helicopter was shot down and another heavily damaged.

The Command said today the violation was "accidental and unintentional." Earlier this week, the Command announced that two U.S. Navy helicopters had violated Cambodian Air space before they were shot down April 28th. Four Americans were killed and four wounded in the incident. And one American was injured May 30th.

A former Prime Minister of France, - Socialist Pierre Mendes-France, today urged fellow Frenchmen to vote for Centrist Alain Poher in Sunday's Presidential election. Poher--underdog in the fight against Gaullist Georges Pompidou--also won encouragement from a new poll. The poll shows Poher cutting into Pompidou's lead. But it still predicts victory for Pompidou by a comfortable margin--56 percent of the vote to Poher's 44. That survey makes Poher four percent closer to Pompidou than a similar poll published last week.

Some 200 Dutch riot police early today battled with two thousand demonstrators in Amsterdam. The police used water cannons as the demonstrators hurled smoke and plastic bombs from behind improvised barricades. Five civilians and eight police men were injured. Twelve persons were arrested. The riots followed a march to protest trials of squatters who occupied the Amsterdam University administration building last month. About 500 students have been charged in connection with the sit-in. A court heard 60 cases yesterday and sentences imposed included prison terms up to two years.

Several British MPs are struggling to get a decisive vote on a bill to make divorce easier. Supporters of the Bill are pushing ahead against filibuster tactics by opponents. And after an all-night battle of words, the House of Commons has scrapped its normal Friday business to let the debate continue.

The sweeping reforms would make irrevocable breakdown of marriage the sole grounds for divorce. It also would allow divorce by agreement after two years of separation and at the request of one partner after five years apart. Existing laws demand that a partner accuse the other and prove some marital offence, such as adultery, cruelty or desertion. The reform is a private

member's bill, meaning that it does not have the official sponsorship of the Labor Government. But the government has given sponsors some help by trying to arrange enough time for the bill to be fully debated and voted on.

The president of the shipbuilders council of America says the problems of Canadian and U.S. Shipbuilders are more governmental than technological. Edwin M. Hood of Washington, D.C. made the comment in Vancouver last night in an address to the annual meeting of the Canadian shipbuilding and ship repairing association. Mr. Hood, said he understands the Canadian-flag merchant Marine has dwindled from 170 to four. He termed it an incredible figure for a great nation. He also charged that the Canadian Government, in his words, listens but does not hear the maritime tune.

A man about 20 years old tried to flee to West Berlin

today. But he was captured by East German guards as he made his way across the so-called "Death Strip" along the Berlin Wall. The Border guards fired - about 50 shots at the man, but West Berlin police say he apparently was not injured.

Cleaning Ivory

Ivory objects, all in one piece, can be cleaned safely with soap and water. However, if several pieces are glued together, better take a piece of raw lemon, dip it into salt, and rub over the surface with this. Let the juice dry on the ivory before wiping it off with a damp cloth.

For quick results in the cleaning of stainless steel kitchen utensils, add baking soda sodium perborate, borax, soda ash, trisodium phosphate, or any non-abrasive commercial cleanser to your wash water. Or, wash the utensils, then scour them with lemon juice and water.

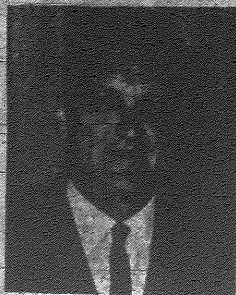

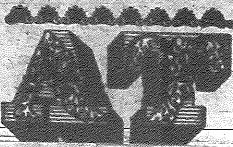

Parade Of Liquor Offenders

A total of 26 men and women appeared before Judge J.V. Progeau in Provincial Court this morning to answer charges of offences against the Liquor Control Act. Each in turn, entered pleas of guilty. Charges ranged from drinking while under age, drunk in a public place, and drinking in a place other than their residence.

As evidence unravelled in each case court hear of a variety of circumstances. One man had been plucked from the waters after rolling off a dock where he had been "Sleeping it off". When he was ordered to pay a fine of \$10 and costs, Crown Attorney E.C. Burton enquired of the accused "do you realize you came close to drowning? -Reply "yes".

A couple of the accused had been found prostrate on the sidewalks of downtown Kenora, unable to navigate under their own power; some had been arrested as they imbibed in backlanes and parking lots, while one woman was observed to be drinking wine at the corner of Main and Second Streets in the downtown area. One lady was arrested as she was observed to be chasing a male companion down the street.

A visitor to the community pleaded guilty to failing to yield the right-of-way while driving on a Kenora Street. He was ordered to pay a fine of \$10 and costs.

Pleading guilty to driving while his ability to do so was impaired, a local resident was ordered to pay a fine of \$125 and costs and had his driving privileges suspended for a period of three months. His car had been involved in an accident in the early hours of the morning one day this month and when police arrived to investigate the accident he still was at the scene and was staggering about and police said the man could not speak or think clearly.

For failing to remain at the scene of an accident, a local man paid a fine of \$50 and costs. He pleaded guilty to the charge. Police evidence told of a witness taking down the license number of the vehicle driven by the accused after it had struck a parked car.

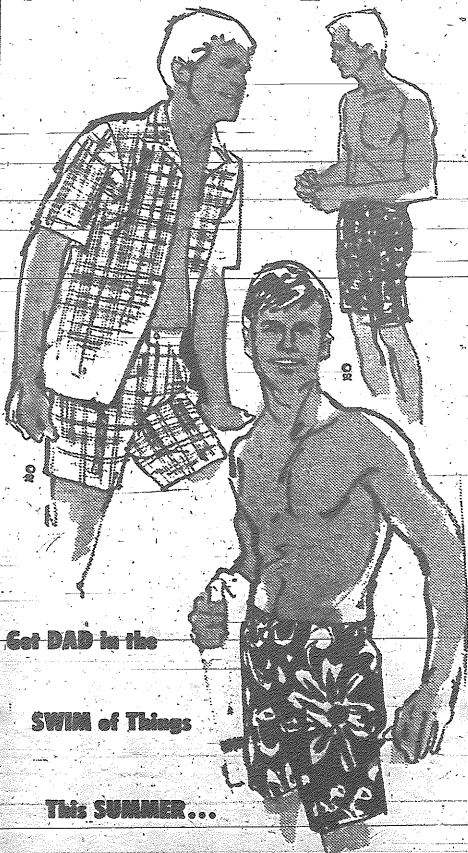
