LATE NEWS BULLETINS

The chairman of the Economic Council of Canada, Arthur J.R. Smith, says some form of Social control is needed to ensure effective competition in some facets of Canadian life. He referred specifically to the medical and legal professions, to financial institutions, to professional sport, and other aspects of the service industries.

Mr. Smith spoke to newsmen in Ottawa after the council issued a report saying the government should move quickly into the service industry field to control price-fixing and other restraints of free trade. The council calls on the government to clarify and strengthen the present anti-combines law, and to set up a new competitive prices tribunal. It would have the power to issue injunctions against mergers or other business actions it considered to be against the public or consumer interests.

The United States Senate has defeated a third amendment to the Safeguard system--this one an effort to bar deployment of the systems missiles while permitting installation of its radars and computers. Today's vote was 70 to 27.

Senate Democratic leader Mansfield says numerous other amendments on the safeguard bill may prevent its being passed by the time the U.S. Congress recesses next week.

National Grain Company Limited says that with favorable weather, a prairie wheat crop of 600 million bushels is a distinct possibility. The Company says, in a report from Winnipeg, that except for isolated spots, there is enough moisture in the west to finish the crop. The report says warm, dry weather now is needed to bring the crop to its full potential.

The distant past and the present are meeting on Amchitka Island, Alaska. An Archaeologist digging around the site of a scheduled underground nuclear test says he has turned up evidence of a culture about nine thousand years old. It predates that of the Aleuts on the island.

The United States Government has dropped its case against Doctor Benjamin Spock. It accepted without appeal a circuit courts reversal of the doctor's conviction on a charge of conspiring to persuade young men to avoid the American military draft.

The government also yielded without appeal to the court's directed acquittal verdict for Michael Ferber, one of Spock's three co-defendants. But it asked for more time to decide whether to ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review the cases of William Sloane Coffin, Yale University Chaplain, and Mitchell Goodman, also convicted with Spock. The appellate court had ordered new trials for Coffin and Goodman.

An 18 foot sloop with its sails decorated with peace symbols is sailing up and down the California coast. Floyd Nelson set out from Long Beach in the sloop yesterday--the anniversary of the Atomic attack on Hiroshima. He says he will keep sailing until the fighting stops in Vietnam.

UPSETS BY HIGH WINDS HIT SAILING FLEET

Sioux Narrows, Ontario -- Rain fog and high winds yesterday capsize two sailboats competing in Lake of the Woods sailing Association's fourth annual Regatta. Winds gusting to an estimated 35 miles an hour forced at least half of the 47 boat fleet to disqualify themselves from the day's competition by using auxiliary motors. Despite adverse conditions, the finish line remained where it had been set before the start of the day's race.

In yesterday's competition, Wendell Buckley of Hastings, Minnesota, sailed the first boat across the finish line. Richard Nickelson of Minneapolis and Bruce Howson of Fort William followed.

Official winners in Tuesday's and Wednesday's races have not been announced. The group rests today at the Lake of the Woods resort. About 30 miles south of Kenora, before setting out for Kenora tomorrow in the sixth and final day of the Regatta.

In Kenora, Monday evening he will view traffic movements and meet local officials to discuss the possible re-routing of Highway 17 at Kenora and also the development of the Cameron Bay Bridge, west of Kenora.

Greedy Anglers Pay Heavily In Kenora Court

Despite periodic complaints heard about poor angling in certain localities, two Minnesota residents found exceptionally good yellow pickerel fishing in Otakus Lake, north of Sioux Narrows.

The two anglers were apprehended by Conservation Officers as they were leaving the area for home after two days of fishing.

In their possession were 173 yellow pickerel, 161 over their legal limit. Both were convicted in Kenora Court and assessed fines and costs of \$179.00 each. They also paid an additional \$150.00 for release of their confiscated vehicle.

The total cost for their greed was \$508.00 or over \$3.00 per confiscated fish. The seized fish were subsequently donated to the needy through charitable organizations.

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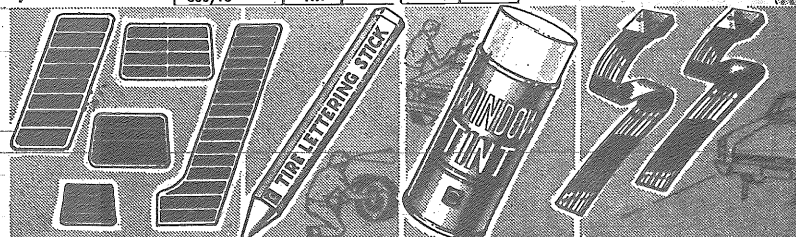

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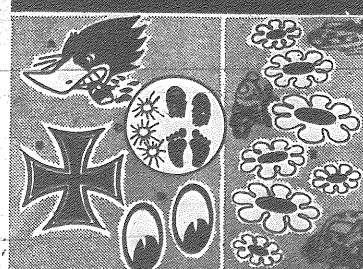

"Mountain Inn" Caters To Air Defence People

NORTH BAY, ONTARIO — You won't find pheasant under glass or crepe suzette on the menu, but when it comes to a unique atmosphere, Northern NORAD Region's subterranean cafeteria is unequalled. To reach this out-of-the-way dining spot, you have to travel up a steep hill, journey more than a mile down an access tunnel, pass through an entrance guarded by a 19 ton door, and climb to the top floor of a 3 story steel building.

Dubbed the "Mountain INN" by its military patrons, the cavern dining hall is one of the support facilities in the \$51 million NORAD defence fortress deep within the Laurentian mountain range at North Bay Ontario. It caters only to the Canadian and United States personnel who man the vital space-age electronic systems of the Northern NORAD Region and its 41st Division. Its customers man the only underground SAGE (semi-automatic ground environment) control center in the North American Air Defense Command, the joint Canadian-U.S. Defense Force. It is from here that the region commander, Canadian Forces Maj. Gen. Maurice Lipton, and his battle staff direct air defense operations for two million square miles of Canadian and U.S. Territory. While the dining hall doesn't offer the exquisite dishes provided in

such places as Hollywood's Brown Derby, its regular fare of four main courses and a buffet spread of 32 different food items, garnished to perfection, makes it a far cry from the military mess halls of the past. Top this off with a variety of fresh fruit, eight or ten desserts, and there's no reason the most critical of gourmets should not be pleased.

"The 'cavern chefs' do not specialize in a particular dish but strive for excellence in all the different food served," says Corporal Clayton G. Krausar, non-commissioned officer in charge. "We do receive more favorable compliments on our hot dinner rolls than any other food item served," he adds. The rolls are freshly baked before each meal. Flowers and white tablecloths create a pleasing effect in the underground dining area, while brightly colored paintings decorate the windowless walls. The decor helps create the illusion of dining at a restaurant with a good view of the out-of-doors.

The "Mountain Inn" diners receive the added bonus of free entertainment while enjoying their meals. This is provided by "Pete", the dining hall's myna bird mascot who does a perfect imitation of a ringing telephone followed by almost ceaseless chatter. Pete has spent more than a year on cavern perch and was recently made an honorary member of the "Brotherhood of Underground Mushroomers," an unofficial club for personnel who have logged more than 1,800 hours in the "hole".

While air defense is a 24 hour a day job for the underground defense center, shifts are arranged so the dining hall is only required to serve two meals — the noon and evening meals. It is open all around the clock, however, when additional personnel are recalled for region and NORAD exercises, conducted to check the reliability of the air defense systems.

The dining hall can feed about 500 people per meal and has emergency rations for an extended period of time should it become necessary to close off the cave from the outside. It receives rations from the adjacent Canadian Forces Air Defense Command base where one of the two main access tunnels terminates. ADC is the Canadian member of NORAD and is the largest supplier of personnel, weapons and facilities to the Northern NORAD region.

DEFENSE SHIELD

The command post for the North American Air defense Command is located deep in Cheyenne Mountain near Colorado Springs, Colo. Inside this ancient mountain, American and Canadian defense experts maintain a constant watch on North American air space.

Fire Hazard Messages Prove Of Benefit

Beginning in July this year, week-end fire hazard ratings have been presented on Thursday and Friday evenings over CBWT Winnipeg and its satellite stations. This program is a joint undertaking by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests and the Manitoba Department of Mines and Natural Resources. The program is patterned after a similar one which has been conducted in New Brunswick during the past few years. This program has proven to be highly successful from a public interest point of view. People are interested in the for-

est fire situation as is evidenced by the broad coverage given in the National Press to fires in British Columbia and Alberta earlier this season. It is hoped that hazard ratings will become meaningful terms to the public at large and that their awareness will result

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From Around The World

Britain, France and the U.S. have ended weeks of speculation and approached Soviet leaders today to explore the possibilities of improving the Berlin and inter-German situations. Similar statements by spokesmen for the 3 embassies in Moscow said: "The United States government together with the British and French Governments, have made an approach to the Soviet Government through their embassies in Moscow to explore the possibilities of improving the situation in and around Berlin." No further details of the approach were immediately available. There's no word yet on the Russian response.

The Soviet Communist Party newspaper, Pravda, today devoted nearly a whole page to extracts from a speech by Romanian Leader Ceausescu at the Romanian Communist Party Congress yesterday. The extracts included his re-affirmation of Romania's independent line in the world communist movement, as well as his pledges of loyalty to East European Defence and Economic groupings.

The Czechoslovak Communist party newspaper Rude Pravo warned today that persistent agitation by reform-minded workers at the Giant Klement Gottwald Steel Foundry in Ostrava, will be met by management reprisals. The-

newspaper was commenting on a protracted dispute over pay agreements between the management and the labor unions in the plant. It accused the union of being destructive and disorienting the workers with pleasing slogans.

The British Government today set up a court of inquiry into a wild-cat strike that has closed Britain's biggest steel plant and threatened serious disruption of the motor and canning industries. The Department of employment and productivity announced the inquiry after six weeks of fruitless efforts by union leaders to make the men go back to work at the nationalized Abbey and Margam foundry in southern Wales. The strike is over a wage dispute.

Prince Norodom Kantol, a former Cambodian Prime Minister, had opened consultations on the formation of a new government for Cambodia. The meeting of a new government, asked Prince Norodom Sihanouk to withdraw his resignation as head of state.

The Prince last week announced that Prime Minister Samedech Penn Nouth would retire shortly and that the country was faced with economic collapse. In view of the situation, he felt he should resign.

The Japanese food agency said today it is ready to buy wheat from other sources, if the U.S. and Canada refuse to cut prices. The agency said it would invite wheat import bids on a global basis from next week. It mentioned France, Bulgaria and the Argentine as possible new suppliers. Purchases of Russian wheat are not envisaged at present because of high freight costs.

A psychiatrist who examined Sirhan Bishara, Sirhan and testified in the murder trial of the convicted slayer of Senator Robert Kennedy, has submitted a bill for more than ten thousand dollars. Los Angeles County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn called the fee asked by Doctor Seymour Pollack excessive. He said it should be thoroughly reviewed before being paid.

Hugh Hefner Says He's In Love

Rome - Playboy magazine publisher Hugh Hefner is in love. That's what the 43 year old multi-millionaire told newsmen in Rome last night. Hefner said that he met 19 year old Barbara Benton, a California co-ed, turned actress, one year ago. That she is his first love and that he might marry her.

Hefner rested one hand on Barbara's knee as he held court with 50 Italian newsmen. The dimpled, brown-haired Barbara, wearing a low-cut pyjama outfit, is in Rome to make her movie debut in a picture called "What's A Nice Girl Like You Doing In A Business Like This?"

In reply to questions, Hefner said: "No, we were not engaged, but yes, this is a serious relationship. I think I can say this is the first time I've ever been in love."

Hefner's first marriage - to his college sweetheart Millie Williams in 1949, ended in divorce. They had two children, Christie, now 16, and David, 14.

IMCAM Selects Guelph Man

TORONTO - Dr. Keith Ronald of Guelph, Ont., has been elected president of International Motorsport Association of Canada (IMCAN), which will promote 4,000-mile Canada car rallies beginning in 1970.

The 4,000-mile rally was not held in 1969 after being staged continuously since 1958.

Montreal Man Has Gov't Post

OTTAWA - Harold E. Baird, 51, of Montreal, has been appointed director of the new management services division in the solicitor general's department, it was announced Tuesday.

The department also announced that G. H. Abut, 47, of Edmundston, N.B., now chief of management services division, health and welfare department, will head a study group on management services for the new division.

Mr. Baird now is assistant director general of the bureau of management services with the Public Service Commission.

Ontario Charts Canoe Routes For Voyageurs

Canoeists who would like to dip their paddles in some of early Canada's most historic water routes are having their paths made easier by a three-year-old program of the Department of Lands and Forests.

Timber and fishing survey crews working north of the French River have undertaken the additional task of charting the canoe routes of the voyageurs.

The information is then used in maps and brochures available on request either from the department or its district offices.

H. J. Featherston, access point supervisor with Lands and Forests in Toronto, said the department has maps and brochures on 10,000 miles of waterways—8,000 of which are outside the Algonquin and Quebec provincial parks.

The 8,000 miles are broken down into 80 routes, including the rivers Albany, Groundhog, Mississauga (the most direct waterway from Lake Superior to James Bay), English, Kenogami, Mississagi, Temagami and Kenogami and the Lake of the Woods system.

The survey crews clear and mark portages, and the brochures and maps contain information on locations of falls, rapids and wilderness camp sites.

Mr. Featherston said inquiries to the department about the canoe routes are increasing each year. About half of them—estimated at about 500 this year—come from native Ontarians.

Most canoeists ask for a specific route. Mr. Featherston said it was difficult for the department to

rate the routes in terms of difficulty and skill required, but said persons proposing to undertake the trips are advised it is wilderness canoeing.

LAMPREY THREAT

An Ontario Department of Lands and Forests biologist said yesterday that the coho salmon planted in the Credit and Humber Rivers this spring as an experiment may

fall victim to lampreys in Lake Ontario. A mutilated coho salmon—just one of the 110,000 planted in the spring—with seven lamprey wounds was washed up on the Toronto waterfront on July 25. Biologist Allan Wainio said a lot more evidence is needed and "we are keeping our fingers crossed."

RETARDED CHILDREN ENJOY CAMPING TRIP

Thirty one children, residents of Regional area 14 of the Ontario Association for Mentally Retarded have been enjoying some of their summer vacation camping out. The site was at Camp of the Woods about 12 miles from Dinorwic, Ontario, and at the end of a winding road, two miles off Highway #72. The Camp Wapoosey camp committee rented the camp for 13 days to hold the Retarded Children's Camp.

Miss Sheila Flesher, who teaches at the Lakeview School for the Trainable Retarded in Sioux Lookout, was camp director, and her able assistants included Mrs. Peggy Hall of Dryden, lay-dispenser; Mr. Paul Smith of Sioux Lookout and Mr. Jim Keddie of Fort Frances, Regional Director of Region 14, Ontario Association for Mentally Retarded.

Several Volunteers also attended and acted as counsellors and directors. In charge of the musical part of the camping program was Huala Edie of Kenora; Lynn Geary of Kenora was in charge of craft. Directing the games was Cathy Boyd of Dryden, and the swimming instructor was Nancy Eisener of Dryden. Other Volunteers, who acted as counsellors were Gary Colclith of Kenora; Jane McLeod, Betty Mongrain and Donna Bremard, all of Fort Frances; Pat Corner of Dryden and Ron Legros of Sioux Lookout. Last on the list of staff, and certainly very important, was the kitchen staff, Mrs. Ellen Myering of Holland, Michigan and Mrs. Pastirt of Dryden.

The camp is located in a peaceful setting on Troutly Lake. The main lodge includes a large kitchen, two smaller rooms, used by this particular group as an office, and as nurses' quarters, and a spacious main room, made cosy by a fireplace at each end. Another building near the main lodge is the living quarters for the kitchen staff. Four large tents, set off the ground on wooden platforms, complete the camp.

The children were divided into 4 groups, junior and senior boys, and junior and senior girls. Each group was assigned to a different tent, and two counsellors assigned to each group, accompanying them during the day, and sleeping in the tent with them at night. This is the second consecutive year that Miss Flesher has directed such a camp at this site. As previously, a theme was selected and program planned accordingly. This year's theme was the 'United Nations', and each group selected a different country to represent. Each group chose appropriate names pertaining to the particular country, for their tent or 'camp.' The junior boys had chosen Australia as their country and a sign on their tent let visitors know they were entering 'Camp Wallabi.' Next to this was the Junior Girls' camp, and as Mexico was their chosen country, their tent was named for the famous volcano—'Camp Popocatepetl.' A short distance down the woodland path, a sign over another tent read 'Windmill Wigwam,' and it was rightfully assumed that the senior girls had chosen Holland as their country. The fourth tent, set among tall trees, was home

for the senior boys. The boys had chosen Scotland as their adopted country, and their camp was 'Beaver Lodge.'

Not a moment was wasted during the 13 days the children spent at the camp. Even when the weather was too bad to warrant outside activities, the children were kept busy, and always interested, by a constantly changing program in the large room of the main lodge. Outside activities included swimming, canoeing in shallow water, and boat trips around the lake in a larger motor boat. Many trails lead into the bush around the campsite, and nature hikes were frequent and educational. The two senior groups each built huts in the woods, and not to be outdone the juniors built their own hut on the camp ground.

Each night, something special was planned, and carried out. Scavenger hunts and treasure hunts were enjoyed, as was the Obstacle Course set up on the campgrounds. Weiner and Marshmallow Roasts are a must for every camper; and each child was allowed to popcorn on the fireplace. One evening, a huge birthday party was held, each child receiving their individual cake, complete with a candle. Following the meal, games were played, with prizes and gifts awarded. A variety of craft items were made by the children, many of whom displayed much talent. Each group made costumes typical of the country they represented. Each child made a bucket in which to carry home the things he had made. Some of the children painted scenes on birch bark; others made musical instruments from things found in the outdoors; still others did weaving. A camp crest had been designed, with the words 'Camp Wapoosey', and the date '1969' on it, along with a rabbit and forest scene. The background was a circle of felt, and each small piece which formed the picture had been previously cut out. Each child finished his own crest by glueing the felt pieces to the background circle. Music was an enjoyable part of camp life; the children learned many new songs, and were most enthusiastic during singing periods.

Another interesting project was the studying of some of our native birds. The Department of Lands and Forests loaned the camp, study samples of the Canada Goose, duck and loon. The latter was especially interesting to the children, since they heard its call quite frequently. On Friday evening, a closing program was held in the lodge. Each group had their own act, and during intermissions, sing-songs were enjoyed. The Australian group had a map of Australia, as well as an illustration of the country's coat-of-arms displayed on the walls. They sang 'Waltzing Matilda', as a group, and put actions to the words; this was followed by a duet 'Cuckoo Burrow'. Then they presented their own band using instruments they had made from sticks, cardboard, bits of wood, and an empty ice cream carton. The band was complete with an aborigine band-leader, and his boomerang baton. Climaxing the Australian part of the program, 'Mr. Kangaroo' arrived, and was welcomed excitedly by the children.

The senior girls, representing Holland, wore the crepe paper caps and dresses they had made themselves. A solo, 'There's A Country Called Holland' was enjoyed and the group sang 'A Little Dutch Girl.' The junior girls, representing Mexico wore the huge sombreros and capes they had made. They took the audience on a trip to Mexico, describing the route, their costumes, and Mexican food. They favored with a Mexican dance, as well as the Mexican Hat Dance. The senior boys came dressed in kilts they had pleated and made from cardboard. They also favored with a scottish dance, and sang 'Mary, my Scotch Bluebell!'. Their act ended with an imitation of the bag pipes. Following this, the counsellors and staff were called on for entertainment, and they did well with their acting, singing and magic tricks.

The breaking of the 'pinata', a Mexican custom, brought the evening to a close. In Mexico, the pinata is made of a clay jar, filled with sweets and toys, covered with a papier-mache figure, usually of an animal or bird, either real or mythical, and is broken by blindfolded children during Christmas, or other festivities. Camp Wapoosey's pinata was made by one of the counsellors, from papier-mache in the shape of a large bird, and was filled with peanuts and paper covered candies mixed with shredded paper and was suspended from the ceiling. Each child was given the opportunity to hit the pinata with a long stick, until finally the goodies came tumbling out. A noisy time followed while children searched through the paper, and were rewarded with handfuls of treats.

The children had gone to camp, most of them with no knowledge of what was in store for them. 13 days later, they arrived home happy a bit tired no doubt, quite probably very much enlightened, and almost certainly with the hope of returning another year.

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EDITORIAL

WHY NOT KENORA COLLEGE?

With optimism and with hope, but fully conscious of many difficulties ahead, the president and directors of Confederation College opened the doors to the Kenora satellite school just about a year ago. The effort was in response to a recognized need to provide specialized courses of instruction for residents of this distant community. The obvious danger was the limitations imposed by population.

Civic leaders played no small part in inducing government to make the necessary expenditures to open the Kenora College. This story is well known. Those attending the first convocation this spring could not help but be impressed.

A realistic appraisal indicated that the cost per student of operating the Kenora College was possibly fifty or seventy five per cent higher than had these students attended at the Lakehead.

On the other hand, the initial year was an outstanding success in other respects. Students received exceptionally fine instruction. Traditions of Kenora College were established in a manner which will always reflect credit on the school. In the final analysis, the worth of the school must be measured in terms of pupil progress. The record is equally encouraging.

Linda Lee McIntyre, Lorrie Cederwall, Sandra Hulmes, Denise Neufeld, Karen Robinson and Barbara Allen are presently employed in local offices. Another five have registered to take their second year courses at the Lakehead.

As Confederation College, Kenora prepares to open the doors of its beautiful building for a second year, it is facing the "moment of truth". Is the college really wanted here? Was last year's successful debut the result of special conditions? Will registrations justify the heavy expenditures required to provide the excellent staff the College now enjoys?

Parents might well investigate fully the advantages of encouraging attendance at Confederation College, Kenora as a practical means of improving educational standards. Citizens, generally, can play a vital part in the life of this young college by their interest and concern.

Kenora Enjoyed Peace Celebration Back In 1919

It was under the heading "Kenora's Big Peace Celebration" and the front page item in the Kenora Miner and News of Wednesday, July 23rd, 1919 started off "Thousands take part in celebrating the great day - procession in morning and peace service at Central Park - Regatta on the Bay - Land and Water Sports."

The occasion was to mark the

official end of World War I. Although the Armistice had been signed November 11th, the preceding year, communities set aside a day in 1919 for observance of the historic occasion as they awaited the return of the enlisted men. Kenora declared a public holiday that day.

The item in the newspaper read in part "The peace celebration in Kenora on Saturday was a decided success in every particular, due mostly to the manner in which the returned soldiers and citizens generally entered into the spirit of the occasion. Though there had been only three days to make the arrangements, the program was pretty well arranged and carried out." Peace services at Central Park were ably conducted by Rev. Edward Diamond and other members of the clergy. Mayor George A. Toole delivered a short patriotic address after which he read the 82 names of young Kenora residents who had made the supreme sacrifice for the cause of liberty and justice on the battlefields of France and Flanders.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS SUBJECT OF ROTARY TALK

Kenora Rotarians enjoyed a business man's talk Monday when T.A. Saul gave an illuminating talk on The Interpretation of Financial Statements, emphasizing the importance of having a complete understanding of the various components which to make proper statements for business purposes.

The President, Charles Hayes was in the chair, and thirteen visitors were welcomed, four from the United States Clubs, seven from Canadian Clubs and two personal visitors. Attendance last week was 82.76% and this week 81.03%. The President advised that the Governor's visit would take place on Monday, September 22nd, and urged all chairmen of committees to prepare reports in time for a pre-governor's visit meeting.

The three principal financial statements required for any business, said Mr. Saul, are the balance sheet, the statement of profit and loss and the statement of retained earnings or capital. Of course, many businesses prepare a variety of subsidiary statements providing details in support of information presented in the principal statements mentioned. Dealing first with the balance sheet which Mr. Saul described as the most important of the three, he pointed out that this is comprised of assets (things owned by the business), liabilities (debts owed by the business), and net worth being the owners equity, the difference between the total assets and total liabilities.

Current assets are liquid assets which are converted into cash during the succeeding fiscal year. Current liabilities are those debts which must be paid off during the succeeding fiscal year. Working capital is the excess of current assets over current liabilities and is one of the key features of the balance sheet. Working capital is increased by cash profits, long-term loans, sales of fixed assets and new capital invested. It is decreased by purchases of fixed assets, repayments of long-term debt — dividends, etc.

Want coffee house

WOODSTOCK, N.B. Teen-agers here want a "coffee house" centre where they can spend their idle time and they haven't been idle in gaining the sympathies of older folk. A rock 'n' roll dance, a bottle drive and other projects have provided a small stake toward the project. The Old Home Week Commission promised \$200 toward the centre if teens would handle the canteen work during the annual celebrations. And town council has given a reserved stamp of approval providing the teen-agers meet the hidden liabilities in the coffee house project such as insurance, responsibility for policing and over-all control.

Trustees Little More Selective

TORONTO A surplus of graduates from Ontario teachers colleges this year has allowed hiring authorities of elementary schools to be a "little more selective," a provincial education official said Monday.

Of 7,700 graduates, between 600 and 700 still are job hunting, but many could find positions in small towns if they took the trouble to look, said John Bain, assistant director of the education department.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

I noticed in your issue of July 29/69, page 4, an article headed, "Fluoridation by-law passed by Council".

The Fluoridation question was voted on last December 2nd, and the result of the vote was: 1620 - in favor and 1280 - contrary, and not only 128 - contrary as your article stated.

How can a Town Council pass a Fluoridation by-law, without complying with the Municipal Act? It was the DUTY of the council to pass the by-law within six weeks after the voting took place. Failing this, they must make application to the Municipal Board, for an extension of time for passing said by-law.

I have written to The Municipal Board requesting that an extension of time not be given. My reasons for doing so are: The unnecessary cost to the Kenora taxpayers for adding artificial fluorides to our water supply, when a laser beam has now been perfected, that will stop cavities in human teeth before they start, by glazing the teeth in 20 Billionths of a second making them impervious to decay organisms, without hurting the pulp of the tooth or the patients mouth. Scientists say, "There is no reason the technique should not be a standard tool of dentistry by 1971". The estimated cost of this laser beam is quoted as \$12,000.00.

What a wonderful advance this will be, and only a matter of 1 1/2 years away, - why add to the burden of the Kenora taxpayers by adding artificial fluorides at this time?

Most taxpayers will agree, that our Property taxes are rising too high and too rapidly, particularly in the past two years, since the value of our mill rate is five times greater. It is my fervent hope that our Mayor and Council will seriously consider not implementing fluoridation at this time, as this measure would become obsolete in less than 2 years. Why adopt "Chemical means" to inhibit tooth decay, when "Physical means" will be available in so short a time, and not just inhibit but, stop decay? 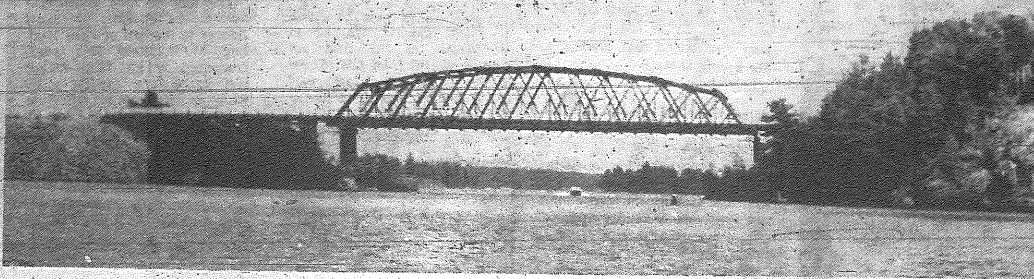

\$100,000 raid leaves 3 hurt in gun battle

Three men were arrested yesterday after a gun battle in which a bystander and a policeman suffered bullet wounds and another policeman was cut by flying glass.

Police said the chase followed a holdup at a Lower Town branch of the Banque Canadienne Nationale. Four armed, masked bandits grabbed canvas bags containing about \$100,000, delivered moments earlier by a Brink's Express armored truck.

They forced about 20 bank employees and one customer to lie on the floor and fled in a car with the money, exchanging gunfire with pursuing police.

The bystander, hit in the left thigh by a bandit's bullet, was in satisfactory condition in hospital. Also in satisfactory condition were the two Quebec policemen, whose cruiser was knocked out of the chase by the gunfire of the fugitives.

Police said the men smashed the back window of their car and sprayed the pursuing cruiser with sub-machine gun fire, hitting it with about 15 bullets. Constable J. B. Martel was cut when the cruiser's windshield was shattered and Constable Leo Moisan was shot through the thigh.

The bandits abandoned weapons and money and fled on foot when their car was cut off by police in the northeastern suburb of Giffard. Three men were picked up immediately. A police helicopter was called in to look for the fourth man, the object of a house-by-house search in the area.

Police identified the three captured men as Gordon Gecraghty, 36, Paul Mikulis, 28, and Claude Doyon. Gecraghty and Mikulis escaped from a maximum-security section of Montreal's St. Vincent-de-Paul jail on July 5.

The fourth man apparently escaped with them.

Toronto police say 'slain wife' may be alive

NEW YORK The wife of a Hungarian immigrant accused of killing her husband may be alive in Canada, the Queens district attorney's office said yesterday.

A spokesman said Toronto police sent a teletype message, saying the woman, Margit Horvath, 24, was seen there by an informant.

Toronto police have been asked to take the woman's picture for positive identification, the spokesman said. The husband, Csaba Horvath, 24,

of Queen's is being held in hospital for psychiatric examination.

He told police July 25 he had killed his wife, but later said she was still alive.

In Toronto, Deputy Chief Bernard Simmonds said a woman named Horvath, who spoke little English, had been interrogated by police and photographed. The pictures have been sent to New York.

"We think we may be on the right track, but the name Horvath is as common in Hungarian as Smith is in Eng-

lish."

He would not reveal the woman's whereabouts in Toronto because positive identification has not been made.

Horvath said he threw his wife's body into the East River, but no body has been found.

Police said that an unidentified person, who had read newspaper reports of the case, advised them that Mrs. Horvath was in Toronto.

MOOSE TAGGING PROJECT ENDS ON RED LAKE ROAD

A moose ear-tagging operation was carried out in the Red Lake Road moose study area during the latter part of June and early July. A total of sixty two moose were ear-tagged during this period. Since the study area is common to the Kenora and Sioux Lookout Forest Districts the project was undertaken co-operatively by Lands and Forests staff from both districts. The purpose of the project is to determine patterns of moose movement between heavily and lightly hunted areas, or in other words, how far can we expect a moose to move to repopulate areas where high hunting pressure exists. Moose sighted near shore were herded into deeper water by a helicopter, piloted by P. Peterson of Kewatin. While the noise of the helicopter motor is usually sufficient to drive moose into the

water, a loud-hailer system was used with the pilot's voice or a siren to augment the effect of the helicopter's motor to drive the more stubborn moose into the water.

When the moose is swimming freely, the helicopter lands, taxis up and "straddles" the animal. The person tagging the moose reaches out from his perch atop the pontoon, grasps the moose's right ear and fastens an ear-tag with a pair of special pliers. All moose ear-tags bear consecutive serial numbers on the one side and are inscribed with the words "Lands and Forests" on the other side. In addition to ear-tags, twelve moose were outfitted with large colorful plastic collars. These collars are designed so individual moose can be recognized from both the air and the ground.

Lairfallom said the first areas designated probably will be eastern Becker County, Beltrami County and Clearwater County. All are in northwestern Minnesota where farmers have long complained that predators are killing sheep.

Lairfallom said there is no

danger that the timber wolf or other species will be hunted to extinction.

"The program is designed to remove the individual animals that are causing the predation, not eradicate an entire species within the control area," Lairfallom said.

Hunting from airplanes and snowmobiles, and the use of poison will be banned under the predator program.

Lairfallom said he anticipates declaring predator problem areas ranging in size from one township to two or three counties. Only hunters living in these areas can be certified as controllers, thus prohibiting Twin Cities hunters from participating.

Once an area is listed as a problem area, Lairfallom said, payments will be made on all animals, declared to be predators in the 1969 law.

Thus, even though wolves are causing the problem, payments also will be made on fox, bobcat and coyotes.

The payment schedule includes \$50 on timber wolves, \$35 on brush wolf and coyote, \$6 on fox, and \$35 on lynx and bobcat.

Lairfallom can order a program halted in any area when he feels the problem is over.

Controllers will be certified by local conservation officers. Lairfallom said they will be given a test to determine if they can identify signs and tracks of predators, and they also must be experienced and have a "reliable reputation" in their community.

Predators taken under the program must be presented to the local conservation officer within 48 hours.

Canadian Wheat Exports Down

OTTAWA

The value of wheat exports dropped to \$249,051,000 in the first six months of 1969 from \$309,057,000 in the same period last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Exports of passenger cars and

chassis rose to \$378,831,000 from \$363,778,000 and newsprint exports were up to \$542,322,000 from \$484,375,000.

The figures were given in a preliminary analysis of export figures to the end of June totaling \$7,077,112,000 this year, compared with \$6,354,393,000 last year. June exports alone were up to \$1,240,430,000 from \$1,085,196,000.

ROMANCE of STEAMBOATS

THE SHAMROCK

Captain Lewis had the Shamrock built and ran her as a freight and passenger boat between Fort Frances and Rat Portage for years. She was a good sized boat, with plenty of room for passengers and freight. The Lewis family lived on her for the summer. I think Mrs. Lewis did the cooking and gave the men some of the orders.

Fort Frances anyone? If you had been a resident of this town, bustling, pioneering Rat Portage in the 1880's you could have hoped a steamer along with a bunch of incoming settlers and have made the trip by water. And speaking of hopping, one crew-member set a world record with one, big, unexpected hop from boat to shore.

The Shamrock ran a long time and brought lots of produce from the river, and took a lot of freight back to the people on the river and Fort Frances. In October, 1894, the S.S. Shamrock was towing a barge carrying settlers' supplies, and in passing the Highland Maid, the barge struck a rock. She had a hole punched in her and a lot of her supplies were damaged. I am not sure what became of the Shamrock.

THE N. MOSHER

In the fall of 1885 Mosher's of

Fort Frances had a boat, the N. Mosher. She was bigger than the Thistle. They sent her to Rat Portage for a load of freight for the Hudson Bay store at Fort Frances. On her way back with the freight she was caught in a storm on the Big Traverse. They had to run with the wind and beach her on a sand beach. The Indian pilot who was at the wheel lost his nerve. He left the wheel and ran and jumped from the bow of the boat just as it hit the shore. Some of the crew measured from the bow of the boat to the place where he hit the sand. He had beaten the World Record for the Long Jump. I think that was the end of the N. Mosher. I never saw her after that.

Plan Control Of Predators

St. Paul - Conservation Commissioner Jarle Lairfallom announced details today of a predator control program authorized by the 1969 Legislature. Under the program, Lairfallom will designate areas in which animals such as wolves and coyotes are alleged to be preying on livestock.

Once the areas are designated, local hunters designated as "controllers" will be paid a fee for each predator trapped or

Pipelines Net Income Drops

Calgary—TransCanada pipelines limited has reported increased operating revenues during the first half of this year, but net income dropped 28 percent compared with the same period of 1968.

The decrease in net income was caused by a shutdown of sections of the Northern Ontario pipeline during May and June for sandblasting and testing, the Company said in its semi-annual report. Revenues during the first half were 110 million, 602 thousand dollars,

an increase of 14 million, 189 thousand dollars from the year before. Net income was 5 million, 12 thousand dollars, or 61 cents a share

compared with seven million 47 thousand dollars or 86 cents a share in 1968.
