1. Call to Order and Land Acknowledgement

Chad called the meeting to order at 4:06pm and delivered the land acknowledgement as well as included an acknowledgment to black history month.

Welcome Peggy Whitta to the Committee, Chad thanked her for joining us. He also welcomed Janice Arandelovic to the Committee who is not present currently.

2. Confirmation of Previous Minutes

Moved By Mary Bawden Seconded by Kelsie Van Belleghem, and Carried – That the Minutes of the Accessibility Advisory Committee meeting held January 18th, 2024, be filed as amended.

3. Election of Co-Chair

Moved By Kelsie Van Belleghem, Seconded by Heather Bird, and Carried - That Mary Bawden be elected as Co-Chair of the Accessibility Advisory Committee for a one (1) year term effective February 29, 2024 through to January 09, 2025.

4. Parks Update

Director Breen noted he is going to try and capture this as best as possible in Shaun Clifford, Manager of Facilities absence. Director Breen provided an overview of which items he would be discussing in this presentation (included as attachment to these Minutes), reflected on slide one of his presentation.

He started with the Norman Park Playground; he noted that the overall project is to be completed in the spring of 2024 with the t-dock, gravity rail, and extended pathways. He highlighted the rubber tiling that surrounds the playground, he added the audio features included in the park structure as well, continuing with explanation of the sensory and calming centres geared towards neurodivergent persons. He explained in detail the rocking boat which is also wheelchair accessible. Currently the path to the calming centre is soil but will be seeded to grass in the spring. He also shared that the family gathering spinning wheel is designed for both able bodied and disable bodied persons alike. He shared additional photos outside of his slide show highlighting the features of the discovery centre, music therapy area and unfinished gravity rail. The terrain in front of these areas will all be grass.

He then spoke to the existing and future pathways for Norman Park. This phase will be brought back to the committee once they have reached 30% design. Heather Bird made note that there is no accessible ramp to the rocking boat. She also made note that the rubber flooring will be ideal, even grass can be difficult to navigate with a chair. Chair English provided a recap of concerns with wood chip as base; Director Breen will double check that the material used under the gravity rail and climbing structure. The Chair continued that there are no ramps leading up to the main play structure and feels it is not AODA compliant, Director Breen will take this back and follow up with the Committee.

Director Breen provided an update on Keewatin Beach explaining the grooming and cleanup were done at the beach and then sand was added; he made note that the damaged retaining wall was repaired. He shared that benches are remaining, and new trees have been added, as well as fresh grass seed. He highlighted the new ramp that has been installed and explained that the Mobi-Mat will be moved to this ramp and will flow right into the water. The dock on the left end is now flush with the grass for accessible access; the height of the dock is set to allow an easy transfer into boats as well. This will be the extent to these upgrades at this beach for the time being.

Director Breen shared that the construction on the Community Club at Central Park is now complete. He spoke to the information provided on his slide for the plans for additional funding the City was awarded. He noted this will come back once the early design stages have reached 30%. Kyle clarified that there are essentially 3 different projects in this area, this would essentially be the 4^{th.} Kyle questioned whether any of this funding could be used to upgrade the play structure to make it more accessible. Kyle wanted to have these conversations now so that the City can have appropriate conversations with NOHFC on spending parameters. Staff resource will look back at past minutes to see if there was input given from the Committee on this structure moving forward. Staff resource shared her recollection of events with the Committee and this park in particular. This will be brought back to the next agenda. CAO Attanasio directed staff to ensure ramps are placed on the Central Park Play Structure, the Norman Park Play Structure and the Norman Park Rocking Boat.

5. Moncrief Construction Sports Centre Parking Lot

GM of Engineering Dave Mellor shared that a significant amount of work has been performed at the MCSC this past year and he understands that a comment came out of the AAC questioning where the accessible lots are going to be. He shared that there is an area that cannot be paved due to environmental purposes. He shared a recap of regulations with accessible lots and provided his overview of where he would like to place the accessible lots. He added that there will be accessible spots dedicated to trailer access as well. Staff Resource noted that a member who is not present has expressed that the van accessible width requirements are not necessarily big enough. Dave Mellor and Staff Resource to follow up with this member to ensure her concerns are captured accurately and reflected in these spaces at the MCSC Parking Lot.

Dave Mellor continued with an explanation of items where it is a bit easier for City to have wiggle room to accommodate beyond minimum. Heather Bird made note that when planning for accessible spaces please try to plan for the flattest spots possible, putting a brake on a chair on an incline or decline is not ideal. Chair English commented on the proposed accessible trailer spaces and whether there is accessible access to the dock to get into the boat. Staff will take this and look into it further.

To clarify there will be 4 van spaces, 4 non-van spaces, and 4 vehicle and trailer spaces, totaling 12 accessible spots.

6. 2024 Capital Projects Overview

Director Breen shared that staff have reviewed projects that are being taken to this committee for input and have acknowledged that these efforts are lacking, and staff are implementing an informal procedure to bring projects to this committee and gather input from the committee and have that inform final project designs. He shared that the table would be reviewing the 2023 carry over and 2024 projects.

Dave Mellor started with the 2023 carry over projects and went through each provided in the handouts (attached to these Minutes).

He went into detail on the crossing of rail tracks on 16th Ave N. He elaborated on areas that staff would like to put rest areas for the sidewalks along Railway Street. He is looking for Committee approval on the rest areas and crossing. He elaborated on what the rest areas would look like, a concrete cut out to move over from the sidewalk space, if budget allows a bench could be added. Heather Bird noted that the handrail should be on the outside not only for accessibility purposes but for protection from vehicular traffic. New member Peggy Whitta questioned why staff are doing this and Dave Mellor explained why this would occur on a new project and how staff bring items up to AODA standards throughout the community. The Committee agrees on location for the rest areas suggested by staff.

Director Breen and Dave Mellor went through the remaining projects and provided brief recaps of each to let the Committee know what items will be coming forward to them for further input throughout the year. Each was provided a yes or no on whether the Committee wants further input.

When discussing a project slated for 5th Street South, Councillor Van Belleghem questioned what the requirements for crossing regulations are, Dave Mellor will look into this and

bring it back to the Committee. She continued that the sidewalk ends, and staff clarified it has been extended. She noted she would like to see a cross walk added to have people safely cross to the A&W ball fields. Staff will take this back and look into it further. Mary Bawden noted that she saw a proposal where there are now sidewalks that are flush with the road and there is no curb cut, staff noted there are reasons for the curbs but will note this suggestion.

Item 25-152-001 will not come back to Committee, input of handles over knobs is preferred.

Item 23-313—001 will not come back to the Committee as it is just paving the roadway; staff noted if the scope of work changes these areas will be brought back to the Committee for comment but at this time these are provided as awareness only. Staff noted that if there is the ability to add a sidewalk it is done. Dave Mellor explained that neighbourhood and residential areas are required to have the curbs; he would love to be able to have the terrain to do the curb free sidewalks however there are regulations. He mentioned there is consideration to mountable curbs that the City currently has on Birchwood Drive.

7. Roundtable

The Chair made note that he is happy to see the beginning of removing barriers and there is a lot of hope to this, he appreciates the time people brought to this effort.

April is World Autism Month, the Committee will be moving forward with purchasing a flag and City Staff would provide ample communication on this. It would be great if Committee members could attend the flag raising on April 2nd, will bring this back at the next meeting.

Councillor Van Belleghem noted that money from the MAT has been set aside for a video to highlight accessibility features. This will not be ready for AccessAbility Week for 2024; as such the Committee needs to come up with an event for this week. The Chair directed that the next meeting should be dedicated to coming up with ideas. He made note that he would like to see the City partner with the committee on an event. The staff resource shared that the Library has undergone some significant accessible upgrades and this could be considered as well. The staff resource reminded members to bring any ideas forward, it helps prepare for future years and potential budget asks.

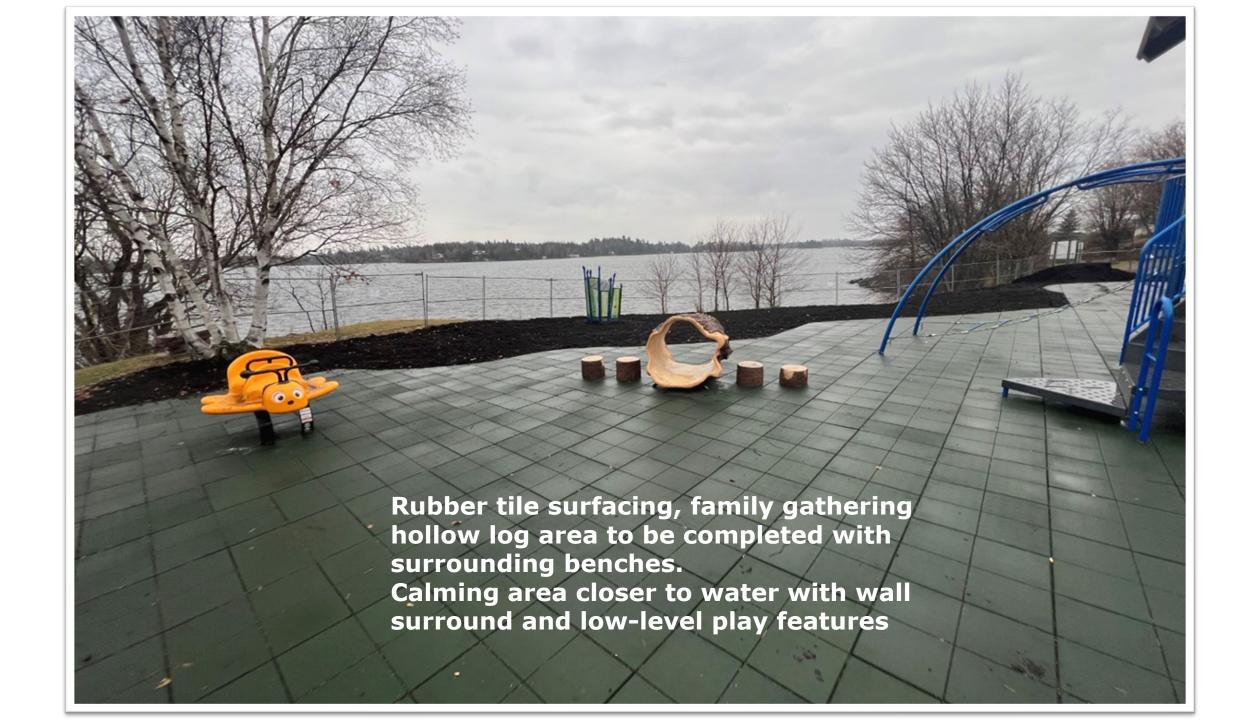




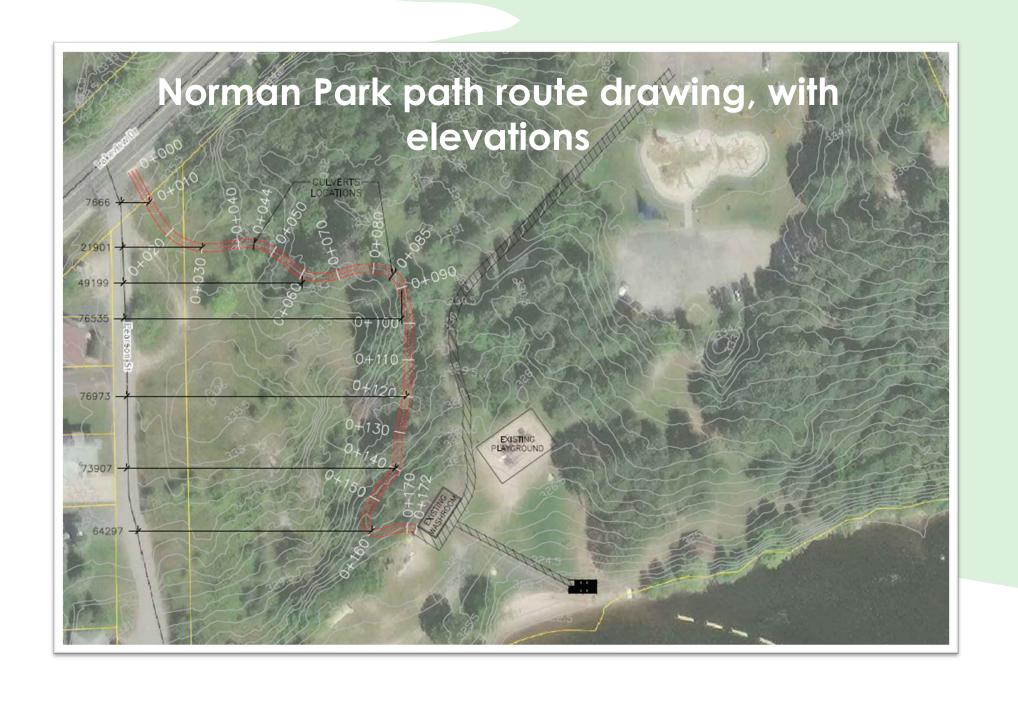


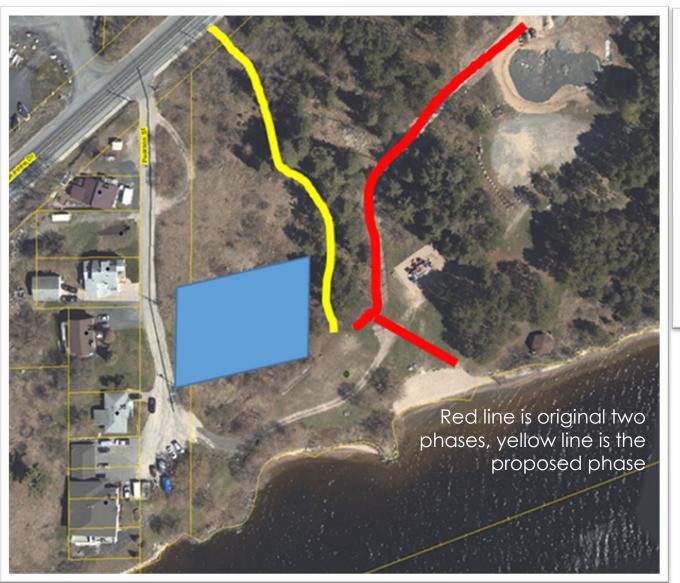

Description

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Canadian Pacific Railway (CP) is completing upgrades to the 16th Ave N crossing surface in 2023. The work entails removing the asphalt crossing surface and replacing with a panelized concrete surface. In addition CP will be removing a track that is no longer required. It is important to note this work was not planned nor included in the Railway Street Phase 3 scope and driven completely by CP.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

The City of Kenora is required to cover 50% of the total estimated costs as per a cost-sharing agreement between the City and CP. The work is required to ensure the crossing meets CP and Transport Canada engineering design and safety standards. In addition, CP and the City has received complaints from users regarding the surface condition at the asphalt and rail track transitions.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS / NOTES

The project is in its infancy and the level of detail the City has received from CP is minimal. The project scope and limits need to be confirmed throughout the winter. There is potential opportunities for the City which may arise as more information becomes available; as an example, the ability to further improve safety of the south approach grades should the south track be removed.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

2023

Realignment and repaving of Railway Street from Sedesky Road for approx. 600 m easterly including sidewalk on the north side and 1.5 m paved shoulders on both sides to the 16th Ave N rail crossing, rail crossing intersection improvements and associated grade improvements at the 16th Ave N rail crossing, and street light improvements.

Year

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

Railway Street has been in a poor condition for a number of years and lacks a safe pedestrian corridor and paved shoulders, including improvements that are required at the rail crossing to make it safer. Phases 1 and 2 of the project have already commenced in 2020 and 2022 respectively with Phases 3 and 4 in 2023 and 2024 to complete the project. In July of 2022 the City of Kenora was ordered by Transport Canada, the inspection authority for railways, to improve the safety of the crossing. Phase 3 of the project will improve safety at the 16th Ave rail crossing to satisfy Transport Canada.

Description

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Implement phase protection for pumps & motors throughout the Kenora Rec Centre, replace flooring in multi-purpose room, reposition front desk, replace hot water tank, Wellness Centre roof curb replacement and roof replacement, walking track replacement, dectron lifecycle study, BAS electrical efficiency project, digital video recording system replacement.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

Majority of the pumps and motors in the Kenora Rec Centre do not have phase protection. This process would protect against damaged caused by phase loss (ie. Power Outage due to storm). This will be a two stage approach with a second capital budget request for the following year. Staff will prioritize which units should receive phase protection first.

Repositioning front desk allows for restriction of access to pool/gym area.

Hot water tank replacement is needed every three to five years.

Building Automated System (BAS) heating/cooling computer program is expired and no longer serviced. Updates allow direct reporting to our central terminal to assist with energy reporting and trends.

Wellness Centre roof leaks in multiple areas.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Install a lift at the Keewatin Memorial Arena to go from the main lobby to the second floor community hall. Replace the thermastore, rooftop dehumidifier and replace the flooring in the community hall, lobby and concession.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

Installing a lift will allow for accessibility between the main floor and the community space above. The thermastore reallocates excess heat generated by the ice plant and reallocates it to heat building areas. The dehumidifier is no longer supported by the manufacturer and parts are difficult to source.

Description

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Replacement and rehabilitation of sanitary linear assets and associated point assets.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

There has been a long time neglect of sanitary sewer main assets and divergent correlation between the work being done on these assets versus their condition and age related to the infrastructure deficit. In the last few years both funding amounts and work have increased to start closing this gap and this initiative needs to be maintained to make head way in keeping the sanitary sewer system in an acceptable state of repair.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS / NOTES

2023: Location 1: 5th Street S from 6th Avenue S to A & W Ball Fields

The project proposed in 2023 is a high traffic roadway with medium to high asset risk ratings and very poor asphalt condition ratings.

2024: Location 1: Park Street from 10th Ave S Intersection to Maple Street

Location 2: Preston Street

Location 3: Mikado Ave N of 10th Street N and 10th Street N from Mikado Ave to Rupert Road

The project areas proposed in 2024 are residential areas with medium to high sanitary asset risk ratings and very poor asphalt condition ratings.

These locations contain large volume of Operations Service calls.

2025: Location 1: Rupert Road from 9th Street N to Dead End and 10th Street N to Mellick Ave

Location 2: Laneway between 3rd and 4th Ave s and 7th and 5th Street S

2025 locations are areas with atypical infrastructure design, high asset risk ratings and large volumes of service calls.

2026: Location 1: River Drive from 7th Ave S to 9th Ave S

Location 2: 13th Ave N from Dead end to Ninth Street N and 8th Street N from 14th Ave west

2026 planned locations contain very poor asset condition ratings and major sanitary infrastructure due for replacement.

2027: Location 1: Mascott Ave from Veterans Drive to Dead end and 10th Street N to Mikado Ave

2027 planned locations contain very poor asset condition ratings and major sanitary infrastructure due for replacement.

Description

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Resurfacing and rehabilitation of major arterial roads.

The Arterial Roads Resurfacing Program proactively identifies arterial roads in need of resurfacing ahead of complete degradation. The City's Engineering Dept. receives an updated pavement condition assessment every 3 years. Work is prioritized pending the results of the assessment and available OCIF and Canada Community Building Funding. This work impact residents during construction with delays traveling through the City. Work on arterial roads is scheduled to begin as early in the construction season as possible to limit impacts during peak tourism and activity during summer months.

Proactive management of large arterial roads provides flexibility during project planning to address areas of concern prior to critical failure. Furthermore, alternative pavement resurfacing methods can potentially be used thereby reducing capital expenditures and reducing traffic interruptions to the public.

2024: Lakeview Drive from the Round About to WPG River East Branch Bridge

2025: HWY 17 from Winnipeg River West Bridge to Winnipeg River East Bridge

2026: Phase 3 of 3 HWY 17 E Resurfacing and Transmitter Rd Intersection

2027: Veterans Drive from CP Underpass to 9th Street N Intersection

2028: Jones Road from HWY 17 E to Homestake Road

2029 to 2034: Veterans Drive from 9th Street N to HWY 17 and Airport Road from CP Rail Crossing to HWY 17

This section of Railway Street requires significant rehabilitation. The project will undergo rview for the potential addition of sidewalk and paved shoulders.

Phases 1, and 2 were completed in 2020 and 2022, and Phase 3 is currently nearing completion in Fall of 2023.

Phase 4 is the final phase of the project. The Project has been substantially funded through Provincial ICIP and NORDS funding, but is projected to be exhausted during Phase 3 in 2023.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Downtown Revitalization (DTR) project involves the surface and storm reconstruction of Matheson Street South from Second Street South to the Matheson Street Bridge and First Street South from Matheson Street South to Main Street South.

The next phase of DTR is required to renew and beautify the downtown core that will unify the previous ares completed related to Main Street South (2008), Second Street South (2014) and Chipman Street (2018).

During 2023 budget deliberations the project was deferred to construction planned for 2027 and the design update occurring in 2026, in favour of the Harbourfront Development project. The design update should now occur in 2024 with construction in 2026. This allows Administration and Council time to source additional funding with a complete, updated detail design and tender package and the flexibility to advance the project to 2025 if funding is secured.

Note project 27--411-001 and project 27-431-002 within the sewer and water utility budget to support underground infrastructure rehabilitation have been adjusted to reflect construction occurring in 2026.
