Call to Order

Mayor Reynard called the meeting to order and Councillor Goss delivered a blessing.

Public Information Notices as per By-law Number 144-2007

OPP Municipal Policing Bureau - New Policing Contract

A/S/Sgt. Pete Marshall, with the OPP is working with the Municipal Policing Bureau. The Bureau is primarily responsible for managing municipal policing agreements with various stakeholders, and upon requests made by municipalities to the Minister of the Solicitor General, develop OPP municipal policing contract proposals. They also oversee the transition process in those circumstances where municipal police services disband and the OPP assumes responsibility for providing policing services.

The figures presented are based on OPP reconciled costs for 2018/19 actuals. An illustration of where the money is allocated to, what services the OPP provides was presented. In the Provincial/Specialized Responsibilities section, 64% makes up the mandated provincial responsibilities, which includes areas such as traffic safety, investigations, intelligence, and specialized response teams. Under the municipal policing resources section 35% of the total makes up the costs for municipal policing that are recovered from municipalities, which include frontline detachment staff and support positions that are required to meet service demands.

Municipalities policed by the OPP fall into one of two categories. Either they have a formal contract as per Section 10 of the Police Services Act, or there is no contract, and policing services are provided under section 5.1 of the Act. Prior to 2014, the method of billing for each of those categories was different. It was complicated, difficult to explain and based on many complicated measures. It also led to a wide disparity of policing costs throughout the Province of Ontario. Some municipalities were paying less than \$50/household for policing and others were paying well over \$800/household.

A diagram depicting the development of the bureau's Model with its deep roots in engagement sessions and consultations with Ministries, Agencies, Associations and municipalities was shown. Lines representing a municipality and how much they were paying in 2014 prior to the model were highlighted indicating how the gap/ or disparity has been addressed through the implementation of the model.

To address the transparency, new reports have been created to share with municipalities specific to their billing. Annually webinars are held when the statements are distributed to explain the statements, presentations and explanations are done at the request of municipalities, and information is posted on opp.ca for public access.

The billing model is provincially focused. This means it focuses on all the municipal policing the OPP does in the province. Costs are recovered from each municipality for services provided. Those costs are estimated in a prepared statement provided in the fall prior to the billing year, and then reconciled once the year of service is completed. For example in 2020, municipalities will receive their statement this fall (2019) and the reconciliation of certain billing components will be reconciled in 2021 when the year has been completed.

The model divides the majority of municipal policing costs into 2 categories: base service and calls for service. The base service is how the equitable share for policing services is achieved. It is a per property cost that municipalities pay based on the number of properties in their boundaries. This rate is the same for all OPP policed municipalities.

Activity covered in the base service cost includes legislated requirements, proactive policing, training, administration and supervision.

The second category, calls for service, is specific to each municipality and allocated based on their individual usage level. A municipality that has more calls for service will pay more in this area than one with fewer calls for service.

While base service and calls for service are the two main categories in the billing, there are some additional costs that are recovered for. These costs may or may not be applicable to each municipality. For example if a municipality provides facilities for the OPP to work from, they will not be billed accommodation costs. However, if the OPP are policing a municipality from their provincial detachment, then the municipality will be charged a fee for accommodation costs. Another example is court security. This would only apply to municipalities with a court house and not to those without a court house.

Kenora has seen an increase in policing costs since 2015. The more significant cost increase appears to relate to Calls for Service. More specifically to drugs; methamphetamine, property crime, 911 hang ups and pocket dials. Kenora has reduced Calls for Service in areas such as other criminal code violations, traffic and violent criminal code.

A copy of the annual billing statement for 2020 that is included in the contract proposal provides a breakdown of the cost estimates for 2020. In summary there was an increase in calls for service percentage from reconciled 2018 at 2.2581% of 151,961,589 to 2.5584% - of 162,805,510. So if we take the 2020 estimated calls for service recovery of Kenora specifically it's \$4,165,201 minus \$3,431,508 we see an estimated difference of \$733,693. This is where we are seeing a significant cost increase. That is well above the provincial average of \$350. Kenora is \$748.93.

Council asked for clarification on the costs for court officers and prisoner transportation. Municipalities with a court house pay for court security however those municipalities transporting prisoners, pay to transport Kenora does not absorb those costs.

Councillor requested the ratio threshold. A/S/Sgt. Pete Marshall did not have the information available at but will provide it to Council.

Heather Pihulak advised Council that the only way to reach that threshold is for our calls for service to go up, which is something we obviously don't want. Council can advocate at AMO, and we have an excellent relationship with Detachment Commander Duggan who is always looking for initiates such as self-reporting to promote in the community as a way to reduce calls for service. D/C Duggan is working hard to reduce the numbers of calls for service in any way he can locally and it is important for the Police Services Board and Council to advocate to the Ministry for changes in the billing structure.

Mayor Reynard thanked A/S/Sgt. Pete Marshall for his presentation and thanked the OPP for their continued service in the community.

New OPP Policing Contract

That the estimated policing cost for 2020 associated to the proposal as presented in the Annual Billing Statement is \$5,991,453 which is reflective of the most current cost estimates under the OPP Billing Model, exclusive of the year-end adjustments; and further

That the Mayor and Clerk be hereby authorized to execute an agreement between the Corporation of the City of Kenora and the Ministry of Solicitor General for policing services by the OPP for the City of Kenora; and further

Discussion: Heather Pihulak informed Council that they need to provide direction on the term of the contract. It was cautioned that the term not end on the same year as the term of council.

Council agreed upon a five year term beginning in 2020, which will expire mid-term of the next term of Council. City Clerk, Heather Pihulak and Mayor Reynard will execute the agreement once received.
