Call to Order

Mayor Reynard called the meeting to order and Councillor Van Walleghem delivered a blessing.

Deputations

Dr. Kitt Young Hoon – Northwestern Health Unit

Dr. Kitt is before Council to speak to the benefits of Public Health in our community, and the services that the Northwestern Health Unit provides.

The Provincial Government has directed to establish 10 regional public health entities and 10 new regional boards of health to replace the existing 35 local public health units. Change the cost-sharing model to reflect an increased share from municipalities.

There are financial Implications to municipalities for this proposed change. For the Northwestern Health Unit, the new cost-sharing arrangement will be 70% Provincial to 30% municipal. This new funding model includes prior 100% MOHLTC funded programs with the exceptions of Unorganized Territory Grant, MOH Compensation and dental program for low-income seniors.

This change is anticipated to result in an overall \$200 Million saving annually for the MOHLTC across public health in Ontario by 2021.

The 70%-30% split would be applied to the budget amounts that were approved for 2018 Northwestern Health Units cost to obligated municipalities will increase by an estimated amount of \$1,100,000 or 46%. The Northwestern Health Unit has not increased its Municipal levy for seven years and understands the impact is significant and will be difficult for municipalities to achieve. The MOHLTC will provide one-time funding in 2019/2020 to assist municipalities with the transition.

Risks related to this change - A shift towards increased centralization of services to larger centres which could result in less services provided in communities, a reduction in local partnerships, closure of local offices, and a decline in public health jobs in small communities. Increased travel time and cost as a consequence of one agency covering a larger geographic area are concerns especially for the north. Reduced municipal representation on the board despite an increased financial contribution from municipalities will be a reality. Changes in public health programming to meet regional, rather than local, health needs will see impacts locally.

The structural change to a regional public health entity for Northwestern Health Unit is unlikely to result in cost-savings as the organization is already fiscally lean. The NWHU is a flat organization with no director level in the organizational structure. Multiple managers have 17 or more staff reporting to them, which is larger than what is considered best practice. NWHU regularly collaborates with other local health units and partner agencies in order to allow efficiencies. A regional public health entity will lead to increased travel costs over the large geographical area of Northwestern Ontario; weather could also lead to hazardous or dangerous travel conditions.

There is a cost with changing to a regional public health entity, including potential costs from wage harmonization, collective agreements and change management.

In summary, such a large change in Northwestern Ontario towards a regional public health entity has little cost savings for the province, increases financial burdens for municipalities while decreasing municipal representation on boards of health, could be overwhelmingly disruptive to the system, and the resulting system may be less effective and may reduce services for smaller communities.

Previously the funding was a 25/75 split. In 1998, it was 100% provincially funded. The municipalities for the NWHU were paying more than the 25% right now we are paying just slightly over the 25%. There are a number of different funding envelopes and where some were as high as 40%. One should not forget about the many funding envelopes that were once 100% and are now 70% provincial and 30% municipal.

The uncertainty for staff has significant impact on service delivery and on families and our community. As a Council whatever we can do to help it is a significant issue. It is important and a personal issue. Provide service in the community but lack of detail of what future model will look like it is difficult.

Provincial Legal Aid Funding Cuts

Whereas the budget cuts to Legal Aid Ontario will have a devastating impact on the Northwest Community Legal Clinic's ability to provide legal services to Ontario's most vulnerable population aimed at ensuring that people with low incomes are able to meet their most basic needs, which in turn gives them the ability to live with health and dignity as active members of their communities; and

Whereas the Northwest Community Legal Clinic has been providing service to the Kenora-Rainy River Districts for over 40 years;

Therefore be it Resolved that the Corporation of the City of Kenora calls upon Premier Ford and Attorney General Caroline Mulroney to make a commitment to access to justice; to respect the commitment of their government to not decrease front line services; and to confirm that funding for community legal clinics will not be decreased; and further

Discussion: The neighbourhood has addressed their concerns and Council is only making a decision on the sale of land. Council received an email late this morning from the KDSB advising that the intended use of the land will be supporting youth and individuals who are aging and coming out of foster care. It is important to be a community partner.

The lack of communication is the struggle and it is a critical piece to this. The property that is there is already zoned for a group home and have the utmost respect for the residents who have come forward. This is a very difficult decision but housing first and Council is dedicated to that in our community. We need 750 units or more in this community. This decision won't please everyone but deserves a chance. We haven't addressed the election survey in which 70% of the respondents feel that housing is an important issue in the community that they want to see addressed.

Council will continue to advocate for more consultation with our community and this will be critical with our success and keep involving the neighbourhood in the next steps.
