Zone 1 Meeting Date – April 12 hold the date

The Board has been provided April 12 as the date for the upcoming Zone 1 meeting date. Members D. Reynard, D. Canfield, A. Poirier can attend and member W. Van Belleghem will confirm.

Police Services Board Composition – June 7 deadline /training

The Board discussed the information provided by Board Secretary H. Pihulak. Having an Indigenous representative on the Police Services Board would be beneficial.

Detachment Commander Duggan noted that speaking with the Sioux Narrows Police Services Board, they have indicated they would like to keep their board separate. They have written letters, and reached out to OAPSB to express their position.

The makeup of the Treaty Three Police Services Board they have one member from each community that sit on their PSB. The board is 20+ people and they take care of themselves.

We could bring it up at the Zone meeting and see where other Boards are doing.

Detachment Commander's Report – Resolution #4

Moved by D. Reynard, Seconded by D. Canfield & Carried: -

That the Kenora Police Services Board hereby accepts the Kenora OPP February 2021 monthly reports as presented.

Discussion: Detachment Commander Duggan reviewed the February 2021 monthly report statistics with the Board. Calls for February were 1,149 calls for service. Violent crime they are not seeing a lot of increases there with a slight increase in assaults but significant decrease in sexual assaults. The assaults themselves they had 31 for the month of February but a number of them were classed as unfounded so do not count in the numbers. 18 cleared by charge and the rest are diversions or others.

Property crime there is a slight increase in break and enters. The majority are tied to one specific person. The last break and enter the person committed the entire event was caught on video. D/C Duggan described the last event and some of the details of the events. The cameras downtown cover every inch of Main Street. That case was solely resolved on the video evidence of the person breaking the front door and exiting the back door. The investment that the City has made in the cameras is so important to the OPP and is greatly assisting them with solving crime. They are keeping track of how much they

use the video so if we require more funding for cameras they will have evidence based information to provide.

The OPP is getting calls for theft of fuel and it appears to be a province wide problem. There were four frauds which included a fraud from an Amazon package, theft of mail of picking up someone's mail.

Have had seizures of drugs a lot of great work being done by the street crime and drug units. Under criminal code non traffic charges which is down and is credit to diversionary programs and many calls were breaches and dealing with those calls in-house. The clients at the bail supervision program are taking LEAP training or taking high school education. Definite improvement and are now engaged and this is a positive improvement from the program at the Northlands location.

688 hours of patrol and 37.5 foot patrol hours and that is far too low. It was very cold in February but we will see those numbers go up. Snowmobile hours were 31 and school hours 16.5.

Mental Health stats – 31 occurrences where mental health screen was used. Voluntary escorts 3, involuntary 6, diversion referral 6 out of 33. Total time at hospital 2 hours and 25 minutes. The hospital has gone through renovation so when attending at the hospital there is a room where the patient can be locked into the room and where the person can be in a settling room. That will account for a smoother transition between OPP and hospital.

Kenora Mobile Crisis response team during the month of February they had 69 mental health calls. Attended 33 of those calls. 44 of those calls were designated true mental health calls. Were able to divert 15 people from the hospital. This is a huge success for the program and for the OPP. Front line officers apprehended an additional 11 people with a wait time of 2 hours 25 minutes.

Re: Board Composition Recommendation

Recommendation:

Whereas the new Community Safety Policing Act, 2019 (CSPA), is forecasted to be proclaimed in early 2022; and

Whereas under the new CSPA, all municipalities receiving OPP policing services will have the opportunity to participate on an OPP detachment board and make recommendations to the Province on Board composition; and

Wheres prior to the June 7, 2021 deadline, Municipalities will be required to submit one proposal indicating the recommended composition of their board; and

Whereas municipalities will not be required to identify the names of the individuals that will be participatingon the detachment board but identify the number of seats each municipality will be allocated on the detachment board as well as the number of community representatives and provincial appointments; and

Whereas the Kenora OPP detachment services more than one municipality which includes the City of Kenora and the Township of Sioux Narrows-Nestor Falls; and

Whereas the CSPA allows an OPP detachment to establish one, or more than one, OPP detachment board; and

Whereas when detachments that are considering requesting more than one detachment board should consider factors such as geography, variations in population size, calls for service/service demands, the number of municipalities and First Nations within an OPP detachment; and

Whereas the Kenora Police Services Board has assessed the options and needs of the Board moving forward;

Therefore be it Resolved that the Kenora Police Services Board recommends that the new Kenora Police Services Board is a seven (7) person board which will include one member being of Indigenous decent; and further

That due to the physicial distance, significant variation in needs of the municipalities, the Kenora and Sioux Narrows-Nestor Falls Police Services Boards remain separate and individual boards to meet the unique needs of this area; and further

That the selection of the community members for the new Kenora Police Services Board be in accordance with the City of Kenora Council Boards and Committees Appointment process.

Background:

Ontario passed the Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019 (Bill 68) and established the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 (CSP) which, once in force, will repeal the Police Services Act, 1990 (PSA).

Section 67 of the CSPA requires there be an Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment board, or more than one OPP detachment board, for each detachment of the OPP that provides policing in a municipality or in a First Nation community.

The Ministry is required to develop a regulation related to the composition of each OPP detachment board. To achieve this, the ministry has developed an "OPP Detachment Board Framework".

The new OPP Detachment Board Framework will provide civilian governance to 326 municipalities and 43 First Nations including those that:

o Are directly policed by the OPP;

o Employ their own First Nations Constables but receive administrative support from the OPP; and

o Receive "OPP Dedicated" policing (i.e. North Caribou Lake and Wapekeka First Nation).

By enhancing civilian governance, the OPP Detachment Board Framework under the CSPA will:

o Ensure each municipality and First Nation receiving OPP services and supports has an opportunity to represent their local perspectives, needs, and priorities; and o Provide opportunities for municipalities and First Nations to collaborate on efforts to improve community safety

To ensure the objectives of the OPP Detachment Board Framework are met, the ministry has developed a flexible approach that allows municipalities and First Nations to determine the preferred composition of their detachment board(s) by submitting a proposal using a digital form provided by the ministry.

Municipalities and First Nations within a detachment are required to work together to develop and submit one proposal indicating the composition of their board(s). The proposal must meet the minimum composition requirements established by the ministry.

Municipalities and First Nations will not be required to identify the names of the individuals that will be participating on the detachment board but will be required to identify the number of seats each municipality and First Nation will be allocated on the detachment board as well as the number of community representatives and provincial appointments.

The ministry will work with each municipality and First Nation to obtain outstanding information and provide support to ensure each detachment submits a completed proposal. However, a proposal does not meet the minimum requirements set by the ministry or a proposal is not submitted, and/or if a detachment is unable to come to a consensus, the ministry will determine the composition of the detachment board(s).

The minimum number of members required is five (5) and there is no maximum. 20% of the board composition must be Community Representation, and the Province will appoint community representative(s) if the municipality council/band council fail to appoint representatives by joint resolution. 20% of the board composition must be Provincial appointed.

As the current board compliment is 5 members, it is recommened to increase the board composition from five to seven members and include one specific appointment for a member that is of Indigenous decent. This would provide effective leadership on the Board and ensure that there is effective cross compliment on the board at all times.

Budget: This would increase the annual operating budget for the Police Services Board by a minimu of \$4,080 as each member receives annual remuneration of \$2,040. There would also be an impact to travel and training once travel resumes again following the pandemic for conference attendance.


