Developmental Disabilities Justice Toolkit

The Developmental Disabilities Justice Toolkit is a resource for criminal justice professionals

such as police officers, designed to increase awareness about vulnerabilities experienced by people with a developmental disability when they become involved with the criminal justice system and to provide information and practical tips for interacting with people with a developmental disability.

Developmental Services Ontario Offices (DSOs)

DSOs are the central point of access for adult developmental services across the province, helping adults with developmental disabilities

connect to services and supports in their communities. The DSO is there to provide information, confirm eligibility, complete applications and needs assessments, assist with service navigation, and make referrals to services and supports.

There are nine DSOs across Ontario, operating during regular business hours. More information, including contact details, can be found on the DSO website. www.dsontario.ca

After-Hours Urgent Response

When police are responding to non-emergency situations involving an adult with a developmental disability outside business hours, officers may call:

1-800-575-2222 (toll-free) Monday-Friday 4:30 pm - 8:30 am, and on weekends and holidays.

This phone line is **not** for an emergency and/or mental health crisis. It should only be used by police officers where there is perceived risk to an adult with a developmental disability (e.g. loss of residence, caregiver unable to provide care due to illness) and assistance cannot wait until the next business day when the local Developmental Services Ontario office (DSO) could be contacted.

The responding police officer will be connected with an on-call developmental service agency that will review the situation and work in collaboration on a local after-hours response, as appropriate/available.

ReportON What Police Services Should Know

The Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) established ReportON, a toll-free phone line 1-800-575-2222, TTY 1-844-309-1025 and email address reportONdisability@ontario.ca to enable anyone to share their concerns directly to MCCSS about alleged or witnessed abuse and/or neglect of an adult with a developmental disability.



ReportON may also provide information-based referrals to appropriate supports.

ReportON does not replace existing emergency services.

If a person contacts ReportON because their own health and safety, or that of another person, is at imminent risk, ReportON will advise them to contact 911.

ReportON follows up, as appropriate, on allegations within its jurisdiction. This may include contacting local police to request a wellness check on an adult with a developmental disability. In such cases, that individual may require support/ special accommodation to participate in an interview and/or other aspects of any investigation.

In such circumstances, the duties of the officer may include and are not limited to:

- Communicating with the alleged victim in privacy, away from any alleged perpetrator.
- Connecting with additional supports as needed (e.g. an abuse coordinator, mental health worker, mobile crisis response team, etc.)

 Promotes the safety, health and well-being of adults with a developmental disability.

 Reinforces the expectation that there be zero tolerance of abuse and neglect of vulnerable individuals.

• Visiting and doing a walk-through of alleged victim's site/residence.

 Following up with ReportON staff to share the outcome of the wellness check, as the police deem appropriate.
